Pouches for Injured Wildlife on Kangaroo Island



During the last few weeks the Creswick community rallied behind local resident Angeline Treacy in response to the devastating fires on Kangaroo Island. In Angeline's words, 'I feel very blessed to live in Creswick, however 'home' to me

is my beautiful Kangaroo Island. I've wept as I learnt each day of more destruction and death'. Angeline decided she needed to do something to help care for the many native animals left burnt, injured and orphaned.

Thanks go to the Creswick Woollen Mills for their generous donation of offcuts of woollen fabric which were used along with donations, from locals, of fabrics suitable to be used in the making of marsupial pouches.

One day recently saw a number of women arrive at the RSL Hall, courtesy of the RSL, armed with their sewing machines, fabrics and scissors. During that day they produced thirty pouches, of various sizes, which could be used in the care of joeys, baby koalas and even tiny possums! Under instruction from those with experience in this field including Jan Bosher Carmel Roads and Vicki McArthur, many hands made light work of the cutting out and sewing of the pouches. Each pouch had three liners, which makes cleaning and re-use much easier for the stressed animals, for a total of one hundred and twenty pouches. What an achievement from a day's work!

The group also want to thank the Creswick Bakery who provided lunch for the workers on the day and the Creswick Pharmacy for the donation of bandages, ointment and other



products which would be used in the treatment of burns.

Fortuitously, local residents Elaine and Michael Clark were travelling to Adelaide and were able to take the pouches and other donations with them and within a week they were already on Kangaroo Island where they are being used at the Kangaroo Island Animal Recovery Centre. A second sewing bee has already been held.

As Angeline expressed, 'I feel humbled and thankful to live in such a caring community'.

One hundred per cent of Donations to the Kangaroo Island Mayoral Fund will go directly to those affected by the fires.







W.G. Spence... Founder of the Australian Labor Party

Creswick's William Guthrie Spence is the unsung founder of the Australian Labor Party.

Born at Eday, a village on the Orkney Islands, Scotland, in 1846, he came with his family to Victoria in 1853. They made their home in the bush at Jackass Gully, four kilometres east of the booming gold mining town of Creswick.

Two years later William Spence was working down a Creswick deep lead mine under conditions, which strengthened his determination to improve the working conditions of labourers. At a young age, he became Secretary and Sunday School Superintendent of the Creswick Presbyterian Church. Already an avid socialist, he believed all property should belong to the government.

The opening up of the Berry deep leads at Broomfield in 1872 provided work for thousands of Creswick's unsuccessful previously self-employed shallow-mining diggers; however their new working conditions were deplorable. Miners laid on their backs in narrow drives (tunnels), often in water, hewing out gold-bearing ore. When it was dry, they inhaled foul air containing a quartz dust that created phthisis, a disease which would eventually eat away their lungs.

William Spence set about improving these conditions with a movement leading to an interstate trade union organization. Ever since the founding of Australia, craft unions and scattered trade unions had come and gone, but no successful effort had been made to amalgamate them into a formidable force. Bendigo, in 1872, under the banner 'Amalgamated Miners of Victoria' formed several branches. Six years later this organization comprised only three branches and just two hundred and fifty members.

William Spence, in 1878, seized an opportunity to launch his fiery union movement when local mine managers clubbed together to reduce miners' wages. He organised, on 11 July, a protest meeting in Dibden's Speculation Hotel, Broomfield, which formed an Amalgamated Miners Association branch (AMA) with Spence acting as Chairman.

Revealing Spence's vision for the future of trade unions, a resolution, now of momentous historic significance reads, 'that an advertisement be inserted in the leading newspapers of the principal mining districts stating that the miners of this district intend resisting a reduction of their wages'. (Creswick Advertiser 12-2-1878).

Eventually under Spence's leadership, and using rules he laid down, branches were formed on all Victoria's deep lead goldfields. While still Secretary of the statewide AMA, Spence was to extend his campaign to improve workers' conditions.

He was approached by Creswick shearer David Temple, whose profession took him across Victoria, NSW and Queensland. Temple, after explaining the hardships, imposed on shearers and, claiming that they were being exploited by graziers, asked Spence to form a shearers' union. Motivated by Temple's stories, this still Creswick miner and leader of Victoria's united miners unions, accepted Temple's invitation.

Later Spence stated, between 1886 and 1916, he had visited every shearing shed in Victoria, NSW, and all the main sheds in Queensland and South Australia. Simultaneously with his shearers' union activities, Spence fostered political groups, many eventually developing into ALP branches.

Spence's outstanding success in forming a strong interstate shearers' union, with his political activities at the same time, was the foundation of the Australian Labor Party, the political wing of the unions. Vance Palmer in his history, Unionism in Australia, recorded: 'More than any other man he was responsible for the drive that made unionism a great force in the country and a significant phase that ended with his death'.

With Federation, Spence was elected to the Commonwealth Parliament where unionism always remained his top priority. After nearly fifty years dedicating his life to improving the conditions of the working man, Spence's crusade came to a harsh end. In 1916, he supported, with Prime Minister 'Billy' Hughes and some other Labor MPs, conscription during World War I which was against ALP policy. Spence explained that he was compelled to choose between his party and his Country; he chose his Country.

There is no place in the ALP for any member who lets his conscience take priority over party policy so in 1916 its founder was expelled.

The Creek was beautiful

In tidying up papers for an elderly relative, a Creswick resident came across this letter which was published in the Creswick Advertiser in the early 1990s when the author was in her 90s.

To the Editor -

I have lived with fond recollections of seeing the Creswick Creek as a lovely welcome sight, not the poor, smothered slum and silt-filed (sic) stream covered with brush and weeds, and in parts, fully grown trees.

The council, about 100 years ago, straightened the creek, which took a sweeping turn below Tremayne (sic) House from the vicinity of the Creswick Sound - not called the football ground then - and all along parallel to Albert Street, it was made a straight stream.

This was a built-up road with a row of willow trees to hold the bank and it was called 'Lovers' Walk'. The trees were later cut out as the wandering cows camped there at night. Nearly every family kept a cow.

But this bank and road were lined with beautifully cut and dressed large bluestone blocks, the bank six-foot deep. I do not know if the bottom of the creek near the Water Street bridge was also lined.

I, with other children, ran along this stone parapet. It was a sight to behold - such beautiful skilled work. Not a trace of this can be seen now, all it was all filled up by the dredges and the battery.

I cannot remember any clearing ever being done. And don't forget, we had floods often.

I have seen the huge, deep, dredge dams burst, along with the Tovie Dam overflow, plus three inches of rain causing terrible flooding from the Water Street bridge and on the west side pouring through Lyalls blacksmith shop, the Farmers Arms, etc., and out through Pasco's yard and the brewery and sweeping through the grocery and butcher's shop and the turn below Davis' Bridge in Albert Street.

Our downfall was caused by the dredges and battery, which filled the creek with slum and silt. I can never remember anything being done to clean out the creek.

The amount of gold that was obtained from the dredges and battery will never compensate Creswick for this ruination. Mr. Coughlan, the battery manager, showed me the pattypans and blocks of gold, all pure gold, shining yellow and very heavy. A small pattypan of gold was worth 80 pounds.

I still recollect the beautiful stream with minnow and black fish - all native - swimming about the deeper pools.

Couldn't we clean it out and dump the soil as a fill on lower land? I would be glad to supply further information. Those on the eastern side owned the creek.

To the poet who wrote this:

Breathes there a man with his soul so dead, Who never to himself has said, This is my own, my native land.

I walked up to Hammon Bridge last year and came home along the creek bone dry. I am 92 and walked along the bed of the creek, the bottom all lined with quartz stones and boulder. Was this put there?

The creek has never widened or gone deeper, only self-sown trees overgrowing the banks.



Summer Proofing My Garden

Dedication to watering and mulching underlines my approach to summer gardening but recent temperatures, combined with Creswick's hydrophobic soil and a windy block, meant that this year I looked for what else I could do to protect my garden and create better survival conditions.

My biggest change this summer is that I now check weather conditions a week ahead, planning water and mulching in terms of which days it needs to be done by, and identifying which tasks can wait. This is a direct result of seeing high temp days coming up and knowing those will be days spent mainly inside and out of the sun, so I can't count on getting it all done on that day. The garden needs to be prepared in advance.

My go-to information sources include trustworthy sites on the internet like Gardening Australia. I also use local permaculture and other gardening Facebook groups to read what others are doing, or put up photos of struggling plants or unfamiliar bugs and converse with other gardeners at my level or more experienced. My familiar and carefully selected back up collection of print gardening books are still a favourite for browsing.

All sources agreed watering should be morning (9.00am latest) or evening, up until 10.00pm, allowing time for roots to hydrate before the hot midday hours but that supplementary watering during the day on especially hot days may be needed. Whether getting water on the leaves caused scorching was disputed. It's difficult sometimes to avoid and I have noticed in my garden it doesn't seem to result in any damage, however I would avoid it in midday heat. The superiority of slow drip watering was repeated.

The repeated do nots across all sources were — don't let the ground around plants dry out, don't fertilise, prune, repot or relocate, and learn to recognise and minimise stress. However, I am tempted to test lightly pruning an already suffering plant.

What have I learnt by error in my garden recently? Don't slow drip with an ordinary hose during the day. The water in that hose could brew tea!

100 years ago

January 6 1920

The Creswick Victory Brass Band serenaded the town on New Year's Eve and was well received. The members were entertained at refreshments by the president (Mr. T. Cushing), at a sumptuous supper by Mr and Mrs H. Peacock at their residence, and Sir A. J. Peacock regaled them with cigars. At midnight the band played "Auld Lang Syne" in front of the residence of Mr. R. H. Down, when a number of people joined in singing the favorite air. The collection taken during the evening totalled over £7.

January 9 1920

A meeting of the committee of the Creswick branch of the Protestant Federation will be held in the Victoria Street Methodist Church vestry next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock.

January 13 1920

Old age pensioners will this week receive the increase granted by the Federal Government of 2/6 per week. On each payment being made, a blank receipt form is handed to the pensioners for completion for the next payment, to facilitate that payment.

January 20 1920

The presentation of medals to Creswick returned soldiers and to relatives of fallen soldiers will take place next Saturday in the town hall buildings. Invitation cards have been sent out to relatives of fallen soldiers requesting them to attend a private gathering in the council chambers at 7.30, where the Mayor will preside and Sir Alexander Peacock will present the medals.

January 23 1920

A finishing department in connection with the Clunes Knitting Mill has been opened in Creswick, in the premises adjoining Mr. F. C. Lloyd's shop in Albert street. Yesterday a number of girls commenced work. Mr. C. W. Jebb has charge of the local department.

January 30 1920

A meeting of those interested in the formation of a swimming club in Creswick will be held in the A.N.A. Hall this (Friday) evening at 9 o'clock. It is hoped that the attendance will be large, for a swimming club in the town will be a most useful institution, and will be the means of preserving the changing sheds and other property at Calembeen Park swimming basin. The district school committees have decided to erect a changing enclosure and spring board at the basin.
