The State Government has announced the Animal Welfare Fund Grants Program is seeking grant applications that benefit creatures great and small. Consideration will be given to applications covering a range of areas including:

- Community education programs on responsible ownership of animals
- Animal relief services and facilities for emergencies
- Facilities to promote dog exercise and socialisation in parks
- Upgrades or extensions to facilities to improve the welfare of companion animals.

To be eligible for a grant, organisations must be not-forprofit and meet a range of criteria – including projects to support the improvement of companion animal welfare. The program will be run in 2018/19 with \$250,000 available.

Friday 10 August 1918 - 2018

On this day at 2.00pm at the Kingston Showgrounds, a tree will be planted commemorating 100 years since the official opening of the Kingston Avenue of Honour by Sir Alexander Peacock. Catherine King, Federal Member for Ballarat, will plant the tree to honour the horses that didn't return from the Great War. *Sandy*, the horse belonging to the late Major General William T Bridges, was the only horse returned. Kingston Avenue of Honour Centenary Event

Planning is well underway for this significant event to be held in the Avenue on Armistice Day, 11 November 2018. This event is a commemoration and celebration of the end of the first World War and of the local community who came together in 1918 to plant 286 trees remembering the service and sacrifices of relatives and work mates associated with the former Creswick Shire.

The free family event starts at 9.00am and concludes at 4.00pm. We expect in excess of 1000 people to attend from across Australia. The corner of Alcorns and Kingston Roads will be the hub with food trucks, trade stalls, displays and entertainment. Towards the Midland Highway, steam machinery and vintage vehicles will be displayed. The Interactive Tree Trail will encourage families to walk the Avenue.

The formal part of the day starts with the Creswick Brass Band performing at the obelisk and a parade led by the Creswick Light Horse approaching down Alcorns Road at 10.30am. With Michael Ronaldson as MC, the Creswick/ Smeaton RSL will conduct the Remembrance Day Service.

IN FOOTSTEPS OF HEROES *By Creswick Resident Rosemary Gay*

On 23 April, 1918, St. George's Day, my Grandfather Able Seaman Leopold T Newland, a Ballarat boy, aged twenty nine was aboard the primary assault ship *HMS Vindictive*, one of 165 ships including Cruisers, Destroyers and Submarines involved in the Raid on Zeebrugge; an audacious raid on the German held port of Zeebrugge in Belgium. Leo Newland was one of many Australian Seamen who volunteered when the British Navy called for volunteers for a hazardous secret mission. Only twelve seamen, all serving on *HMAS Australia*, were selected, as the criteria was for single men, with no family to care for, as the British Navy considered this to be a mission with little or no chance of survival.

Throughout February and March 1918, eighty-two Officers and 1698 men were given specialist training at Chatham Dockyard and The Royal Marine Barracks at Deal, near Dover in the United Kingdom. The mission called for the *Vindictive* to pull alongside the Mole, a mile-long curved seawall protecting the port of Zeebrugge from the North Sea and create a diversion, while three obsolete ships filled with concrete were sailed into the harbour and sunk, to block the entrance of the canal where German U-Boats were housed. The Mole had been converted by the Germans into a minor fortress supporting gun emplacements and housing garrison troops.

The *Vindictive* made her approach at midnight under a hail of heavy fire and bombardment which inflicted heavy casualties on her crew and killed most of the Officers in charge of her storming parties. As she pulled alongside the Mole, *Vindictive's* upper works were being pounded by the gun battery on the Mole and were soon reduced to a mass of twisted steel. Many of her guns had been knocked out and casualties were mounting. Grandfather was in one of the storming parties whose job was to carry explosives up the gangplank from the *Vindictive* to the Mole, to be placed at strategic positions, detonated, with the sailors then to make their way back to the ship. When the block ships were sunk, the recall was sounded and the storming parties withdrew to their battered vessels, carrying their wounded.

After just seventy minutes of intense battle, the vessels made their way to open water and their return to Dover. In total, 214 personnel were killed, 383 wounded and sixteen taken prisoner. Miraculously all twelve Australians returned to Dover unscathed. The exceptional bravery shown by those who took part was recognised through the award of Victoria Crosses, Distinguished Service Orders, Distinguished Service Crosses, Conspicuous Gallantry Medals, Distinguished Service Medals, with my Grandfather being one of 283 mentioned in Dispatches.

On Leo's return to Ballarat, several functions were held in his honour including a Civic Reception hosted by Mayor George Crocker, and his story, and that of the other gallant sailors was carried by numerous newspapers across Victoria, including the *Ballarat Courier* and *Ballarat Star*.

My brother, Ray Newland, had been researching Grandfather's involvement in this sea battle of WWI, and our plan of attending the 100 Year Commemoration Services began to unfold. As a result of my brother's intense endeavours, we were among the few descendants, and the only Australians representing the twelve sailors, who were honoured guests of the Belgian Organising Body representing the Belgian Government, the British contingent and the British Navy. On reaching Dover, on the fourth day of the Commemoration Services, we were honoured to be guests of Commander TJ Berry of the Royal Navy at an Official Reception on board the current warship *HMS Somerset* on its return to Dover from the Commemoration Services at Zeebrugge.

Although Ray and anticipated the four-day Commemoration to be one of extreme importance, we were unprepared for the enormity of what we experienced. The hospitality and grateful thanks bestowed upon all who attended by the Belgian Government and representatives was beyond belief. The Services over a three-day period, included, among the Guest Speakers, the Hon Randolph Churchill, great-grandson of Sir Winston Churchill and the attendance of Princess Anne as the representative of The Queen.

Ray and I were invited to participate in Wreath laying at the St George's Day Monument in Zeebrugge and at St.James Cemetery, Dover, to commemorate our Grandfather and those who served in this battle. We also

placed a wooden cross, endorsed with our Grandfather's name and service details, at the St. George's Day Monument in Zeebrugge. We included a photograph of our Grandfather, in his Naval Uniform in both wreaths, which subsequently appeared on the website of *The Daily Telegraph* in the UK. During the Commemoration Parade in Dover, I was interviewed by the BBC and the story of the twelve brave Australian sailors was aired on BBC News throughout the UK. We presented a copy of this photograph to the Curator of the Exhibition of the Battle for the North Sea, housed in The Palace in Bruges, where we were among the invited guests at the opening on Friday 20 April. The Curator has since placed our Grandfather's photograph within the Exhibition which runs until August this year. At the opening of the Exhibition, we were interviewed for Centenary News, a website dedicated to the coverage of the 100-Year Anniversary of WWI. The story now forms part of their Zeebrugge coverage.

While attending the Services in Dover, Ray and I met Captain Shane Craig RAN, Australia Naval Attaché, based at Australia House, London, where we were warmly invited to join him on our arrival in London, for a personal tour of Australia House. Another of the many incredible experiences we were exposed to during our unforgettable journey retracing our Grandfather's footsteps 100 years on.

Leo Newland lived to eighty-four years of age, and Ray and I were most fortunate to have shared in his life as part of his beloved family. He spoke very little of his involvement in this battle over the years and the story as we now know it has evolved as a direct result of our research, and has been enriched by our attendance at the recent Commemoration Services.

Tim Drylie : Sustainably Creswick

Tim Drylie has really made his mark in Creswick. When he first moved to Creswick eight years ago from the northern suburbs of Melbourne, he found it had lots of visual appeal with beautiful trees and buildings. Tim also saw plenty of potential in what he calls, *'obvious signs of a living community'*. In talking to him, one quickly realises that *community* is a very real and practical concept to Tim.

With a country background (originally from a Warrnambool family), it seemed a natural fit to Tim to come to the Central Highlands, though it has taken him a while to get used to the climate!

Tim had a Second-Hand shop in Montmorency and kept it running for a few months after first moving to Creswick but quickly realised after a lot of commuting back and forth that it made more sense to open a business here. That became his first business venture in Creswick – the 2ndHandShop at 105 Albert Street. Tim specialises in vintage and midcentury furniture and collectables, and his stock has attracted people from around the region as well as selling through his established on-line business.

The business has since moved into the busy central shopping strip in Albert Street (at number 55), which has given him and his partner Holly more room to expand into vintage clothing as well.

Tim took on the Co-ordinator position at the Creswick Market at the end of 2017. He was a member of the Market committee prior to that, and his experience with running his own market stalls has been invaluable. Tim's background is in media production. He worked at the ABC for a number of years, so he brings to his role as Market Coordinator a good blend of the promotional side of running the market combined with knowledge of the practicalities of setting up and running a stall.

Tim emphasises the value of the Market in allowing the local community to access local producers and local products, and providing an efficient and sustainable way for locals to sell to locals. Tim is very proud of the way neighbours can catch up with neighbours for a natter every third Saturday at the market but he is also quick to point out that the market has now become a *destination* with people coming up from Melbourne to experience a 'real country market'.

Running a business allowed him to get to know the local scene very quickly, but Tim also identified a gap around environmental issues, and this led him to set up *Transition Creswick*. Co-founded with Sarah West, they took their model from Transition Towns in the UK. It is run by a core group of six passionate locals, and its goals are to foster community resilience to move away from dependence on fossil fuels in practical ways and to address issues of climate change in a local setting.

So far, these practical initiatives in Creswick include:

A *Monthly Food Swap* which is held in conjunction with the Community Garden at the Neighbourhood Centre on the fourth Saturday of each month. It's a great morning of home-made and home-grown swapping culminating in a pizza lunch.

Soup Sundays took place every Sunday evening in June, and co-hosted with Creswick Community Garden. They aim to encourage people to get together and enjoy the fruits of the Community Garden at the Neighbourhood Centre. Around twenty-five people enjoyed tomato soup and a talk from the Shire Sustainability Officer at the first event last month.

Transition Creswick has partnered with the *Boomerang Bags* program encouraging volunteers to make shopping bags from recycled materials. All single-use plastic bags will be banned in Victoria from 1 July this year.

Transition Creswick has become a strategic partner in Z-Net (Zero Net Energy Transition) - a pilot program with the Hepburn Shire Council and Hepburn Wind. It is a community-focused approach to reducing the local community's dependence on fossil fuels in an efficient and sustainable way. *Transition Creswick* is also keen to attract new membership. Z-Net has conducted a 900 household letter drop around Creswick informing locals of the information night held on Wednesday, 20 June at the Creswick Town Hall. The event ran from 12 noon until 7.00pm, featured solar bulk-buy presentations and stall-holders to assist with understanding your electricity bill, financing options for solar and batteries and energy audit information for businesses, homes and farms. To gain an understanding of what households are doing now with their energy needs, Z-net is conducting a survey at www.surveymonkey.com/r/ hepburn-znet which will continue until mid-July.

However, business and sustainability are not the only strings to Tim's bow. With a degree in music and drama from LaTrobe University and previous experience as a teacher of post-grad cinema studies, Tim continues his love of performance art by singing with the Creswick Brass Band. He has lent his fine tenor voice at Christmas, Australia Day and Anzac Day events, and really enjoys this aspect of community living.

Tim has three children: Lucan who attends Mt Clear College in Ballarat, and Aida and Sorrel who go to Creswick Primary School. All three children also play with the Creswick Brass Band.

In taking on so many roles and local projects - all with the aim of making Creswick a better place - and in such a relatively short time, Tim Drylie has made a difference here.

COUNCIL ADOPTS 2018/19 BUDGET

The Hepburn Shire Council Capital Works program for 2018/19 will be \$10.4 million, excluding projects that may be carried over from the 2017/18 year. Of the \$10.4 million in capital funding required, \$6.7 million will come from Council operations, \$1.7 million from external grants and contributions, \$0.8 million from reserves and asset sales and \$1.2 million to be funded by new borrowings.

- Annual asset renewal program including road reconstruction and resheet, buildings, fleet and equipment, bridges and footpaths (\$4.5 million)
- Drainage maintenance program (\$718,184)

- Jubilee Lake remedial works (\$190,000)
- Outdoor exercise equipment (\$40,000)
- Implementation of Youth Strategy (\$55,000)
- Newlyn netball court upgrade (\$150,000)
- Toward Zero Energy Saving Initiative Council (\$258,000)
- Weed eradication (\$108,005)
- Implement biodiversity strategy actions (\$60,000)
- Creswick Trails Mecca (\$1,710,000)
- Online system of forms and payments (\$30,000)

100 years ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

July 2 1918

A meeting has been convened, to be held in the bank chambers tomorrow (Wednesday) evening, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of making arrangements for the annual ball in aid of the Creswick District Hospital. It is hoped that there will be a large attendance of those interested in the hospital.

July 5 1918

The erection of tree guards in connection with the Creswick Shire Avenue of Honor will be continued tomorrow (Saturday) morning, commencing at 11 o'clock. Everybody in the shire is cordially invited to help in this matter, the "working bee" continuing all day.

July 9 1918

Kingston - Narrow Escape- A very narrow escape from a serious accident occurred on Friday evening last. Two local ladies were coming home from Creswick when a motor car without lights, travelling fairly fast, came round the bend of the road. The horse shot off the road and down an embankment. Fortunately, the occupants of the gig got off with only a severe fright. It is time this sort of thing was stopped.

July 12 1918

Coursing- Champion meeting at Smeaton- The Champion meeting of the Smeaton Coursing Club takes place today and tomorrow. A total of 32 nominations was asked for, but the stake did not fill, 21 entries being received. This must be considered good in view of the fact that there is a great scarcity of racing greyhounds this season.

July 16 1918

The scholars of the Allendale State School were much interested on Monday afternoon in a descriptive account of the extensive travels and war experiences of Sergeant Louis Hopkins, who was among the first volunteers from the shire to proceed to the front four years ago, and who was in the famous landing at Gallipoli. Possessing a very retentive memory, he outlined many phases of the war, and described in realistic language the battle scenes he has witnessed. Mr. A. W. Lawson, head teacher, conveyed their thanks to the returned soldier in very appreciative terms.

July 19 1918

A local Land Board will sit at the Smeaton Mechanics' hall on Tuesday, 20th July, at 10.30 am, to reconsider the question of the disposal of the Smeaton experimental farm, formerly controlled by the agricultural society.

July 23 1918

Mollongghip- School Concert- In the Mollongghip school hall next Friday evening, there will be a school concert in aid of the patriotic fund, when assistance will be given by the Dean and Newlyn schools. There will be supper afterwards, and the admission to both is 1/6.

July 26 1918

The wattle blossom is now coming into bloom, and at a special meeting of the Borough Council on Tuesday Cr. Broom mentioned that people were already picking the blossom in Davies Park, which would have a tendency to spoil the look of the trees. He moved that notices be placed at the various parks, warning persons picking blossom that they would be prosecuted. Councillors agreed that the trees should be protected, and Cr. Haines seconded the motion, which was carried.

July 30 1918

Sir Alexander Peacock, M.L.A., has accepted the invitation of the vicar and vestry of St. Paul's Church of England, Clunes, to give on Sunday evening next, the address on the Fourth Anniversary of the British Empire's entrance into the Great War.
