The Creswick and district community has been shocked and saddened by the recent tragic death of well-known and respected local resident, Mark Spenceley.

> Mark was a dedicated and committed member of the Creswick Country Fire Authority of which he had been a member since 1982. In this organisation, of which Mark was a Life Member, he

held many positions including being Group Captain for ten years and Training Co-ordinator and Wildfire Instructor for the past eighteen years.

Tributes have been recorded from local organisations who have benefitted from Mark's dedicated involvement including the Creswick Imperials Cricket Club, the Creswick Bowling Club, Creswick North Primary School community and the Creswick Football/Netball Club, along with the local and extended CFA community.

A large crowd attended Mark's funeral and listened to moving tributes from family and CFA members. The Guard of Honour was comprised of CFA members and locals. The CDN Team and readers offer sincere sympathy to wife Kerrie and children Tynan, Erin, Gemma and families, as well as to the extended Spenceley and Neil families.

Local Teenager State and National Success

Creswick teen, and Ballarat High School student, Wil Barbary, became the Under 15s, 400m Gold Medallist on Sunday, 3 March at the Athletics Victoria State Championship. Running a time of 54.15 seconds in stifling 36-degree heat, Barbary (aged thirteen) fought off runners from all over Victoria and New Zealand to claim the win. Barbary also took the bronze in the 200m the following weekend.

Part of Ballarat based Neville Down's athletics training group, this is Wil's first year of competing in Athletics Victoria events after winning Gold at the State School Victoria competition last November.

In a busy past few weeks, Barbary has not only broken a thirty-year-old BRAC U14 and U15 400m records at Llanberris with a 53.13 second run, he also recently claimed three Ballarat High School records in the 200m, 400m and high jump at the School's 2019 Athletics Carnival.

Following his U15s 400m win at the State Competition, Wil has also competed in this event at the Australian National Athletics Championships Titles in Sydney earlier this month. Up against some stiff competition from across Australia, he was seeded third after the heats. Wil then went on to win the Silver Medal in a new personal best time of 52.47 seconds.

The Lasagne of Life Creswick Garden Club's Learning Day

Who would have thought that a component of gardening could be compared to lasagne? But that is exactly how Jane Edmanson OAM, well known presenter of ABC *Gardening Australia*, likened the art of good composting when she was guest speaker at the Creswick Garden Club's Learning Day.

Over 240 keen gardeners from right across Victoria came to listen and learn from Jane who regaled the attentive audience with stories of a lifetime of gardening, filming with the ABC *Gardening Australia* and the need to instil an interest in and love of gardening amongst young people.

As a child Jane was extremely shy but realised she couldn't hide under her fringe forever. Following university, she was sent to Dimboola to teach and it was there that the headmaster started her on a lifelong career in gardening, suggesting that she study in depth a subject that she had shown an interest in when teaching at Dimboola.

'I love gardens and gardening and this has had a huge impact on my life. I am truly grateful to Kevin Heinz from 'Sow What' who believed in me and pushed me in the direction of broadcasting. I have been with Gardening Australia since its inception and I just love the stories behind the gardens, the people, and of course, the other presenters on the show. I know how lucky I am. But I also understand that we live in a fragile environment and we have to take care of our great rivers like the Murray and the Darling Basin. They are so important to our history. It's up to all of us, and especially the young people, to save what we have to make sure we have a sustainable future,' Jane said.

Jane is passionate about helping children become excited and inquisitive about gardening, vegetables and plants, where they come from, how they grow, how good soil will sustain the earth and that nature will always respond to help. Jane said that the best thing about gardening is the anticipation of waiting for a plant to flower, a bulb to force its way up through the ground or the look of wonderment on a young person's face as they scrunch a plant that releases a wonderful fragrant perfume.

And as for the lasagne – Jane shared her tips for making the best compost which is layers of different coloured plants, fruits, vegetables, papers and cardboards, each doing its job to provide the gardener with the best soil for free. 'As gardeners we are ever hopeful, always optimist and love the challenge which gardening presents to us,' Jane said.

President of the Creswick Garden Club, Phyllis Wright, said that for the assembled gardeners it had been a day of immense fun with fantastic stories and wonderful information. 'We are so grateful that Jane was able to join us. It's been a huge success and we will be starting to organise next year's very soon!'

Just a reminder – personal medals are worn on the left hand side and family medals are worn on the right hand side.



Men's shed groups can apply for grants of up to \$80,000 for the construction of a new shed or the replacement, extension and refurbishment of an existing shed.

Garden Memories

My current garden has plants from other gardens throughout my life, representing different stages in my and my family's lives. So when I go out into my garden now I run into people I rarely or no longer see. Memory is ignited by plants shared as cuttings, sometimes bought, because it identified with someone important, or someone whom I really liked, so I tended to link with the person or event connected. There are plants from the Wimmera Mallee farm and small town of my childhood and Melbourne, Buninyong, Mallacoota, Canberra, and now from new friends here in Creswick – from small gardens, big gardens, country, city and seaside gardens all with memories attached, all living representations of so many people in my life

My memory is pretty ordinary but in my garden memories rise unbidden. Each plant carries with it a face, a voice, or an event. I used to think I was alone in this but when talking to other gardeners about their plant choices they too often have stories attached to particular plant choices, 'it was my mum's favourite', 'an old friend gave me a cutting', 'I found it at the Creswick market and my son bought it for me', 'the lady across the road bought it over when I first moved here', or simply 'got it at that nursery where I got the gnome'.

With the memory of the face or event related memories slowly drift in. You wonder where they are now, if you will see them again or have they died?

In the case of my beloved Nan, whose garden made me a gardener, I often greet her in my mind, sometimes I sing *Danny Boy* to her as I work because it was her favourite. When something in the garden is suffering I ask her what I should do, emptying my mind and allowing memories to rise, images floating up of something she said or did. Sometimes I question her methods. She didn't mulch for example, surrounded by sheep poo and hay as she was on the farm close to a lake full of fabulous water weeds! I know houses and objects bring back memories too but every time my May bush flowers I feel like Nan is saying hello to me.

Heart of Creswick Supermarket Story Continues...

By the early 2000s, Bill and Ian Huntley were ready to retire from the grocery business. As their own children did not take up the opportunity to carry on the family business, it was decided to sell the iconic supermarket in Albert Street. Steve Sellars, then CEO of the *Food-way* group, decided to purchase the business along with three other partners. For nearly fifteen years, the *Foodway* and later *FoodWorks* store continued at Huntley's original premises. Steve is now the sole owner.

Realising the need for expansion, a brand-new supermarket was finally given the go-ahead across the road next to the CFA station last year. It became clear that more time would be required to build than originally planned, however Steve was unable to negotiate an extension to their lease and so was forced to move into temporary premises as a 'pop-up store' next door at the old British Hotel which had just been renovated.

'It's a rabbit warren, it's inefficient to operate and difficult for our customers to navigate, but I didn't want to leave Creswick without a supermarket.' Steve is full of praise for his staff, many of whom have been there since Huntley's days - and for his customers who have continued to shop there throughout this difficult time.

Steve is excited about his plans for the new building which is expected to be completed in the middle of this year. There will be just under 1100m² of selling space, plus a 199m² mezzanine floor for offices and staff rooms.

The tradition of innovation will continue for this supermarket of the 21st century with the very latest technology in energy saving. The refrigeration system is CO² which is a lot better for the environment, and the heat reclaim from the state-of-the-art refrigeration system will also run the heating in winter and the air conditioning in summer to keep the store at an even 21°c all year round. The lighting will all be LED, the customer trolleys are also

made from recycled milk bottles, and even the scale labels will save paper with no backing sheets to throw away.

As well as the grocery, delicatessen, freezer and dairy sections, there will be an in-house butcher. The focus will be on fresh foods, healthy food with ready-made meals and easy catering for entertaining. There will also be a larger range of Gluten Free and Vegetarian food. Local suppliers will be supported where possible with current vegetable supplier Haintz Brothers from Newlyn to continue as well as Creswick Open Range Farm Eggs. Steve is quick to point out that current laws require that 'free range' eggs should come from no more than 1,500 chickens per hectare, while Creswick Eggs have only 200 chickens per hectare. Steve is happy to hear from any other local suppliers with good quality produce and local wine.

All full-time, part-time and casual employees of the current store will move to the new supermarket, but Steve expects the staff numbers to double within the year. *'We are looking for people now: customer focused, reliable, team oriented and community minded are the main attributes we require, the rest we can teach them.'* It seems that the tradition of employing locals is set to continue at Creswick's new *IGA*.

Steve is planning a special launch for the new supermarket when it finally opens later this year, and hopes that Creswick continues to support this very important heart of the community.

I sat there watching the shadows wax and wane according to the sun and the clouds – lengthening minute by minute as the sun lowered slowly in the sky.





100 years ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

April 1, 1919

A pleasant Sunday afternoon was held in the Smeaton showgrounds last Sunday, when the Smeaton Brass Band, assisted by Clunes bandsmen, rendered a programme of music. Cr. A. L. Nase presided, and Sir Alexander Peacock gave an address. The threatening weather interfered with the attendance, but the collection in aid of the Creswick Hospital and the band realised £10/16/1.

April 4, 1919

A meeting is convened to take place in the supper room at the town hall buildings on Monday evening at 7.30 o'clock with a view of forming a band to play in connection with the Peace celebrations in the borough. All interested in the movement are urged to attend, as this meeting might be the forerunner of establishing a band in the town, which is badly needed. April 11, 1919

A meeting has been convened for Tuesday evening next, at 8 o'clock at the town hall, of fathers of soldiers and sailors, for the purpose of discussing the question of forming a district branch of the Sailors' and Soldiers' Fathers' Association of Victoria.

April 13, 1919

Smeaton- the fortnightly meeting of the A.N.A. was held last Friday, the president (Mr. W. McLeod) presiding. It was resolved to purchase a book of tickets in connection with a carnival promoted by the Port Melbourne Welcome Home Committee for returned soldiers, and also to arrange a welcome for two soldier members returning shortly.

April 18, 1919

ANZAC DAY – a memorial service will be held in the Creswick Town Hall on Friday evening, 25th April, at 8 o'clock, under the auspices of the Creswick Borough Council, the Clergy, and the Creswick Branch of the R.S.S.I.L. collection in aid of the latter.

April 25, 1919

Ex Cr. Richard Hender has a residence for over 55 years to his credit. He arrived here from Smythesdale on Good Friday in the year 1864. He first met his wife on Smeaton Show day in 1864, and on 25th February the following year the marriage took place. They had 14 sons and four daughters.

April 29, 1919

Soldiers In-Memoriam Ward

£1500 - Required - £1500

Mr. John Graham of Creswick, has offered £100 if three or four others will give a similar amount to erect a fitting memorial to the noble soldiers who sacrificed their lives in the Great War. Donations of £100 and upwards will be thankfully received from residents of Creswick and the surrounding Districts towards the above object.

This appeal will remain open until Wednesday, 30th April. Remember he gives twice who gives quickly.




