

Seeing Eye Dog Zorro Carves The Path For His Handler, Local, Tony Clark

Moving to the country is a transition for anyone. When you're living by yourself and blind, having a Seeing Eye Dog makes navigating roads without footpaths and bush tracks possible.

For Tony, the decision to get a Seeing Eye Dog wasn't easy. 'I resisted a guide dog for thirty years. I perceived it as not being independent, which is really silly in hindsight', he said.'Then I questioned my thinking, those reasons aren't valid anymore. I needed to take that extra step for increased mobility, and to truly become independent.'

Tony Clark was diagnosed with atypical Retinitis Pigmentosa at nineteen and declared legally blind at twenty. That didn't stop him developing a career that takes him across the country and travelling internationally for work. Zorro will now be Tony's partner in travel, guiding him to meetings in the city where Tony works on boards leading organisations providing strategic insights and looking after governance.

Having a Seeing Eye Dog has been an interesting transition for Tony, but means he can now go bushwalking safely and independently around St George's Lake and across the spillway.

'I couldn't do this sort of walk using a cane, it was too hard. Zorro will find the path, keep me there, avoid things and keep away from the more tricky falls', he said. 'I simply couldn't, do it not by myself. Zorro and I can now do that.' Tony has big plans for Zorro including some overseas travel. Daily life like shopping independently is made easier with a Seeing Eye Dog.

'Putting all of your trust into a dog, isn't easy. People think that it's all easy and smooth sailing it's not, it's hard work. But it's worth it', he said. 'The things like visiting Smokeytown, IGA, the Post Office, Leaver's and all of the other shops, I wouldn't have done that by myself, not in the same way and certainly not as confidently. He did take me into the back of the deli at IGA once ... you can't blame him really!'

Zorro has fit into Tony's family nicely. 'We're working each other out, he's training me well', he said. 'I enjoy the companionship and it makes lots of things like country

roads, shopping in Ballarat and doing things with the Scout Group heaps easier.'

Vale – Geoff Rawson

Geoff Rawson passed away with calm dignity and minimal fuss at eightynine years of age, on 19 January, 2022.

As a father of three girls, he is remembered for his home workshop, smelling of resin and wood shavings where he created with recycled materials at minimal cost. Geoff made boomerangs and threw them with great skill. He was a Moomba Champion and champion of the local children who he patiently taught. Geoff also taught his girls to sail, fish, find lost golf-balls, play chess, 500 (the card game), table tennis, and most importantly, how to scrounge at the tip.

Geoff drove along winding, smoke-

covered roads, then hitched a ride on a fire truck to get to his home in Gembrook to defend it during the Ash Wednesday fires. He later lived in New Zealand where he rediscovered his love of sailing and later in a commune in the Victorian Snowy Mountains. Finally, Geoff settled happily in Creswick, where he turned his attention to helping out in the community.

'He was the last of the scallywags', says his old and dear friend, Frank Walsh. Geoff was a man with a welldeveloped sense of humour. Gentle and kind, he helped many people in his community, even teaching carpentry to local primary school children. If you needed help with anything, he was there, often in his shed making a toy or practical object for someone.



the time, hands down. He became known as *Dead Eye Dick*.

For years Geoff rode his bicycle everywhere until recently, when he found it too difficult with his painful gammy leg. Refusing any treatment, he stoically soldiered on. Geoff was artistic and he made friends easily and his home was adorned with his paintings.

His earlier life was colourful and adventurous while he travelled the globe, working his passage on cargo ships or overland. His adventures took him to Japan to learn Judo and to America, where he worked in a circus as the elephant poo collector. Geoff was a thinker, philosopher and a prolific short story writer, reading

stories at *Words In Winter* and other events. He published an eBook about his life which can be found online.

Geoff never succumbed to the lure of fancy material possessions or sought social status. He quietly went about living a life that was embedded in principles that were true to him. His courage to do so endured to the end. He will be greatly missed, but he was the type of character who lives on in some way in everyone who knew him. Geoff chose, at the end, to use the Voluntary Assisted Dying Laws.

There's a new warmth at the heart of Creswick. Ernie Terry - or the *Lucky Monkey Blacksmith* as he calls his business has set up his forge just behind the old Pasco building in Albert Street.

Ernie moved from Melbourne thirty years ago and now lives in Smeaton. Having worked as a forest firefighter with Forest Fire Management Victoria since 1986, Ernie is now channelling his energy and creativity into forging beautiful creations in metal.

The trade of blacksmithing came to Ernie later in life. He had an old forge at home and when he saw that the Creswick Neighbourhood Centre was offering weekend classes a few years ago, he jumped at the chance to learn. 'The opportunity came at the right time. I was always fascinated by metal, and those classes opened up a whole new world for me.' He credits his early success to his teacher, Murray Shaunaghan from Horsham. Ernie's work is very organic in nature with forms inspired by the forests he worked in, as well as a love of sea creatures such as whales and sea dragons.

His works comprise commissions or whatever moves him. He can be found most days at his forge 'quietly learning about myself and blacksmithing...' Ernie reflects: 'Creating stuff is great but letting go and passing it on to the right person has been hard'. He now feels he has reached the point where he can sell his earlier pieces as his art has grown and evolved. There's certainly no lack of offers for his creations on show.

A visit to the forge where Ernie is always ready to show you his work is well worthwhile. Just follow that lovely ping ping of hammer and anvil as you walk down Albert Street.

COUNCIL PLAN FOCUS AREAS



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CONTRAILHEAD UNDERWAY

Work is underway on the Hammon Park Trailhead, which includes a community space with additional parking, nature play, cycling jumps course, learn to ride circuit, shaded seating area, water bubbler and cycle wash area. To protect community safety, the pump track will be closed at certain points during construction. Effort will be made to minimise the length of closure and signs will be in place.

Sport and Recreation Victoria have provided \$2.1 million for this project through the Community Sports Infrastructure Stimulus Program. The expected completion date is November. The trailhead will complement the 60km network of mountain bike trails planned as part of the Creswick Trails. A planning permit for the trails was issued in January. We expect to go to tender for construction later this year once we have secured a Consent to Construct from land managers.



Seppearman street update

Works are underway to upgrade a section of Pearman Street in Creswick, between the supermarket and Water Street. The project also includes construction of a 2m wide bike and pedestrian path, which will connect the Pump Track to Calembeen Park. Works are expected to be completed in May.

Creswick Capers Cyber Safety Sessions For All

Last month Creswick Primary School was fortunate to have the opportunity of working with Susan McLean, Australia's foremost expert in the area of Cyber Safety for young people. Susan was a member of Victoria Police for twenty-seven years and was the first Victoria Police Officer appointed to this role. She has worked to protect students by explaining the dangers that exist in the *cyber* world.

Part of Susan's visit was funded through а Hepburn Shire Community Grant, which enabled a parent forum to be held in the larger venue of Mount Rowan Secondary College Theatre, opening up her expertise to all the community stakeholders of primary and secondary parents. This session included the topics of cyberbullying, online grooming, exposure to damaging content and top tips in keeping your child safe online. Feedback from this presentation

included the increased understanding of what parents are required to adhere to by law in relation to age appropriate online programs.

Students themselves were quite surprised with the factual information that came from these sessions, as they did not realise the implications of some of the activities that they were engaging in online could prove to be so detrimental. Susan also worked with staff members explaining many of the legalities surrounding the role of a teacher in these matters.

The T.H.I.N.K. acronym sums up what we all should do before engaging in any online activity.

T - Is it thoughtful? H - It is helpful? I - Is in inspiring? N - Is it necessary? K - Is it kind? If you cannot answer 'yes' to each of these questions, then the comment is probably not warranted.

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

My Garden Post Storm

My current gardening hours are spent pruning back bushes that have tripled in height this year and attempting to control the grasses and weeds, particularly dandelions. I drove towards my house about a week after the storm and saw a floating cloud of gold in someone's front garden and thought how glorious it was, only to realise it was my house. All the impending dandelion plants had suddenly exploded into bloom simultaneously, despite hours spent annually yanking them or prising roots loose before they puffballed.

With the recent strange summer alternating rain and heat and culminating in the storm, once again my idea of what I would be doing this time of the year bears no relation at all to what I actually have done. The need to mow continued longer. Hours in the garden involved wearing long sleeves and occasionally gumboots with sunscreen, hats and no gardening at midday. Autumn now is a mix of cool to sometimes cold nights with winds, the same heat during the day and occasional promises or outpourings of rain but despite that, things still need to be watered.

My garden is still showing after effects of the storm, albeit in some unexpected ways. Like the feral tomato growing a few feet from my flooded compost heap in the suddenly deeply watered, rich soil.

My viminalis, reduced to a bare trunk half its previous height by the storm, has shot a swathe of fresh green sprouts from the base up to the shattered top, looking strangely like a lanky ballerina wearing tutus of frilly green tulle. My precious apple and apricot are now a vision of frothy fresh green growth in the shape of weirdly shaped bushes. Unfortunately, I hacked them back ruthlessly in the days post storm, planning to dig them out as they were obviously beyond saving, but that can't happen now. Time to locate experts.

My other decision, to create a wildlife friendly space, has resulted in all sorts of useful information from Kim at the Creswick Neighbourhood Centre. Kim introduced me to Wombat Native Plants nursery in Bullarto which provides indigenous native plants tubestock for the Central Highlands region, and the Gardens for Wildlife course to be offered in Creswick in the future. Kim also directed me to Jill Teschendorff's excellent book *Grow wild: gardening to sustain wildlife in the Hepburn Shire*, which I have now from the library.



100 Years Ago Compiled by Creswick Museum

April 4, 1922

As several councillors desire to be present at the Glengower State School on Thursday afternoon, on the occasion of the visit of the Prime Minister (Mr. W. M. Hughes), the Creswick Shire Council will meet at 10 a.m. **instead of in the afternoon.**

April 7, 1922

Borough of Creswick – For Sale by Tender –

Tenders for the purchase of the Glass House in the Botanical Gardens will be received up till 7 p.m. on Tuesday, 11^{th} April, 1922. Dimensions – 15 ft x 10ft pine weatherboards, glass roof. Highest or any tender not necessarily accepted. Arthur B. Grose, Town Clerk. Town Hall, Creswick, 6th April, 1922.

April 11, 1922

During the last week or two the Honor Room at the Creswick State School, No. 122, has been enriched by the addition of four volumes of the "Times" History of the Great War, and by two gas masks presented by the Rev. F. H. Ingamells. Mr. R. Gurr also presented a collection of native weapons, beautifully mounted. It is very gratifying to the committee and the staff to note the interest taken in the Honor Room by these gentlemen, and it is hoped that many others will follow so good an example. The room is always open for inspection by anyone interested.

April 14, 1922

The Botanical Gardens – "Deplorable Condition"

Speaking at the Borough Council meeting last Thursday evening, Cr. Tait said he had been awfully taken back with the condition of the botanical gardens. It had been one of the beauty spots of the town, but was in a deplorable condition just now.

April 21, 1922

Notice appears in our advertising columns that persons desiring to take up shares in the Creswick Brick, Tile and Potteries Limited can obtain same through the Creswick representative of the company, Mr. Arthur B. Grose. All information concerning the company and copies of the prospectus, with application forms, are also obtainable.

April 25, 1922

A public meeting is to be held in the council chambers tomorrow (Wednesday) evening at 8 o'clock to decide the form the Fallen Soldiers' Memorial in Creswick is to take. A large attendance is desired.

April 28, 1922

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The Art of Living By Craig Barrett



Watching the nightly news horrors from around the world on my TV and wondering how do things ever change? What perspective on life do people need to see what is really important and what is not so?

Those two or three of you who may have followed my column over the years would know that I am a bit of a hermit who spends a lot of time on his own in his garden or bushwalking. That is where a lot of creative thoughts and insights come for me, (often at three o'clock in the morning).

The forest is a wonderful place to just listen to inner thoughts. One of my 'go to' places for contemplation in the forest near Creswick is Eatons Dam. I usually walk there from the poor old neglected Koala Park. The reasons that this place has become special to me are varied. I try to imagine the life of Dja Dja Wurrung people living along this waterway. There is the history linked to the Creswick mining days – the sheer effort needed to hand build this drystone wall and clay bank in the first place. There are the myriad water races through the surrounding bush that supplied water to the prospectors.

For me however, the really special thing is sitting on top of the old dam wall, just watching and listening. The height of the wall means that I have a view several metres up from ground level. To see the trees both up and down at the same time is magnificent. I watch ants climbing from ground level up and up a tree trunk till they disappear from sight. What is up there that they reach for I wonder? The exquisite Grey Fantails flitter all around me catching insects on the wing. The fantails come very close, they know I am no threat to them. Many other birds fly through or stopover in the tree canopy, wrens chitter their way through the undergrowth. I have a new mate out there now. The last few visits I have met with a Black Swamp Wallaby. He seems to tolerate my presence, as I walk slowly, quietly, and just sit. When mountain bike folk or walker groups or the dreaded awful noisy trail bikes come our way he scarpers damn quick – I would like that ability! Alas, I cannot hop so easily through the bush, I sit there and wait for their passing.

Which leads me to another thought that I had sitting up high on the Eatons Dam wall thinking about these dark days. Some words from the late, great George Harrison from his song *All Things Must Pass*:

'Now darkness only stays the night-time In the morning it will fade away Daylight is good at arriving at the right time It's not always going to be this grey. All things must pass All things must pass All things must pass All things must pass away'.
