

REDHEAP REVISITED

A guide to 1896 Creswick based on Norman Lindsay's novel *Redheap* has recently been published by Creswick newcomer, Andrew Bell.


Andrew's maternal grandparents came from Creswick and he and his siblings used to holiday in Bald Hills Road as young children. On a visit fifty years later, with a copy of *Redheap* tucked under his arm, Andrew was astounded by how many locations in the book were still recognizable. Inspired by this, he decided to track down other sights that had long disappeared.

Redheap is the pseudonym given to Creswick by Lindsay, named for the red mullock heaps left over from the gold diggings. The guide, consisting of twenty picture cards, follows in the footsteps of Robert Piper, the protagonist of Lindsay's novel, through his romantic dalliances, pranks and general adventures about town. Accompanied by extracts from the novel, we revisit some of Creswick's forgotten old sights; including the imposing Fire Brigade bell tower that once soared behind the Town Hall; and the stone parapets of Davies Bridge, over which Robert Piper leaned to watch the sluggish flow of Creswick creek. (Some things never change.)

So, take a walk around Norman Lindsay's Redheap, and see how Creswick appeared 120 years ago. You'll be surprised at how much has changed — and how much hasn't.

FUTURE OF FORESTRY EDUCATION IN CRESWICK Community Meeting



A community meeting was held recently to discuss the future of education at the University of Melbourne's rural campus in Creswick, the former Victorian School of Forestry. The University has released its plans for the future of its forestry Masters program, which include rebranding the program and moving much of it to Melbourne, to be based 'mostly out of the Parkville campus'.

Enrolments in forestry have declined in recent years and the University hopes that moving the course to Melbourne will see student numbers go back up. The relocation of the program to the city will mean that the majority of forestry coursework will no longer be based in Creswick, though some forestry courses, forestry research and coursework for other disciplines will still continue at the historic campus.

The meeting took place at the Creswick Town Hall, with over fifty concerned locals attending. Leon Holt, meeting organiser and Creswick graduate, said 'we were very happy with the turnout, it just shows how much the community cares about maintaining Creswick's long history as the home of forestry'.

State MP Louise Staley was present at the meeting to hear the community's concerns, as was Hepburn Shire Councillor and Deputy Mayor, Cr Don Henderson, and a representative from the office of Catherine King MP, the Federal member for Ballarat. Councillor Henderson opened the meeting, reflecting on the long history of forestry in Creswick. 'The School of Forestry is an important part of this town's history and helps the local economy, we want to work with the University to make sure it has a strong future here', he said.

Professor Ian Woodrow, Head of the School of Ecosystem and Forest Science, spoke on behalf of the University of

Melbourne. He told the meeting, 'we have been working on our plan for the forestry Masters for over a year, and we have listened closely to all our stakeholders. The new course will build on what we already offer. With more subjects based in Parkville, we expect student numbers to increase, and that's a good outcome for forest science education'.

The meeting ran for over an hour and a half, with many locals and others connected to the historic school getting a chance to have their say. Leon Holt said, 'it was great to hear how well-informed the community is about this issue, I think the University got the message - if there's any way for them to keep the forestry Masters program based in Creswick, that's what we want to see happen'.

Meeting organisers will be preparing a submission to the University of Melbourne, calling on the University to suspend their planned changes to the current forestry Masters program. Leon Holt said, 'there's definitely more that can be done before committing to these big changes, we want to work with the University, the forestry industry and the government to find a way to keep the forestry Masters program focused on teaching foresters, and to keep it based at the historic School of Forestry in Creswick'.

'Courses like forestry should be taught at rural campuses like Creswick, where the forests actually are, not in the middle of Melbourne.' - Leon Holt, Forester and Creswick graduate

HONOUR ROLL INDUCTEE 2018 DOUGLAS MCLEAN LINDSAY 1904-1974



Douglas McLean Lindsay (known as Doug), was born in Kerang, Victoria on 30 June 1904, the elder child of John and Alice Lindsay. He had a younger sister, Jean. He grew up in Kerang and completed his education at the local High School (by coincidence, being taught by E. J. Semmens who was later at the Creswick School of Forestry). Doug finished his schooling at Year 11 – Leaving Certificate, but returned to the school after the summer holidays as a teacher of Maths and English.

After a year or two of teaching, Doug returned to work on the family farm as his father was ill. He later applied for and started work as a reporter on the *Kerang Times*. He was still working there in 1928 when, on a train trip, he met Talbot Nolan who was then the owner of the *Creswick Advertiser* and was in need of an Editor. An agreement was reached and Doug moved to Creswick as Editor of the Creswick paper which was then published twice weekly.

The company was not simply a newspaper. It was a thriving printing business that did work for scores of businesses throughout the Ballarat district and further afield.

As Editor, Doug also had the responsibility of reporting the doings of all the many organisations, clubs and sporting teams, local news and anything else that happened in

Creswick. Of course this gave him entree to all of these entities and eventually he joined many of them and took office in several.

In 1941, Doug married Marguerite (Marge) who also became involved with the newspaper, particularly supporting Doug when he was ill in 1960, when she edited the paper while he recovered. They lived at first in Clunes Road before moving to 118 Napier Street and they had three children: Jennifer (1943), David (1946) and Jeanette (1949).

In the late 1930s Doug became State Secretary of the Potato Growers Association of Victoria, a position he held for many years. Coming from a farming background, he had a broad appreciation of problems affecting farming people and retained a personal interest in country affairs and betterment of country towns.

Doug started and published a weekly newspaper called *Potato Grower News* which had a circulation to local producers, national and even overseas organisations; and his enthusiasm, work and advice was greatly appreciated by growers. During WWII especially, farmers were anxious to know what was happening in the industry under wartime controls, as potatoes were considered to be an essential food and the Government supported production. This involvement continued until his retirement in 1974.

As well as his duties at the paper, Doug became involved in nearly every community organisation around the town and district. He was a Government appointee on the Creswick Hospital Committee for over thirty years until his death. He was Treasurer for many years and President of this Committee from 1941 to 1943. In the Annual Report of 1974/75, the Senior Vice President, Mr Colin Wrigley, expressed the Board's sympathy and acknowledged his outstanding contribution to the Committee.

Doug was on the Committee of Management of the Koala Park and St. Georges Lake Reserve. This was a Government appointment, as noted in the *Victorian Government Gazette*. Mr Lindsay served on the Committee of the Koala Park and St Georges Lake Reserve until his death. He played a part in the Elderly Citizens' Club, Creswick Progress Association, Creswick Swimming Club, Creswick Golf Club, Creswick Tennis Club, Sportsmen's Club, Anglers' Club and the Clunes Football League, which Creswick was part of at that time.

Calembeen Park was important to the town - the centre of town in summer - special trains coming from Melbourne for swimming and diving competitions and *Music for the People*. Many people will recall the Australia

Day Carnivals and the Miss Creswick Competition. Doug was on this Committee for at least twenty-six years.

Doug was a long-time member of the Board of Management of St Andrew's Church, of which he was an Elder. He also served as a Justice of the Peace for many years. Doug was a regular and talented member of a troupe of singers and actors called the *St. Andrews Players* who entertained throughout the district over many years. Marge, who was also a member, and Doug often played opposite each other in productions.

His community involvement also extended to teaching clubs how to conduct meetings. Doug was a member of the Creswick Havilah Lodge for fifty years, being Master of the Lodge from 1941 to 1942 and Treasurer from 1956 to 1970.

At the *Creswick Advertiser* Doug Lindsay and his business partners, moved their business from a very old run-down building on the site of the ANZ Bank, (now Twin Needles) and erected a new, purpose-built premises in Albert Street. This was a real confidence booster for the town. The paper usually sustained about five families and did so for decades. It was the second oldest continuing newspaper in Victoria, after the *Geelong Advertiser*.

Doug showed real leadership qualities in the way he treated people equally. He did not take sides and whilst urged to stand for Council on many occasions, he always took the middle ground so that everyone could get a fair hearing. He was courted by both sides of politics but always treated them equally and courteously.

Through his position with the paper, Doug was instrumental in creating appeal funds for people who had suffered disasters, and district people always contributed strongly. For years there was a radio appeal for funds on 3CV (Bendigo) for all the hospitals of the region, and Doug was the voice of Creswick Hospital. He was also the usual suspect when a compere was required for events like a beauty pageant at Calembeen Park on Australia Day, or *Music for the People* concerts in the pines behind the lake.

Doug and his business partners worked right through the Depression years, through the wartime and postwar years when times were tough for everyone. They sustained the district with information that was vital for everybody's spirits.

Doug was highly regarded by his peers. Many tributes were given when the business was sold in early 1974 and the Shire Council held a celebratory dinner and presented Doug with a picture and a plaque to be attached to the Advertiser building. Hepburn Shire acknowledged Doug's contribution and support as the roving reporter of sport in the community by naming the sporting reserve *The Doug Lindsay Recreation Reserve*, on the western edge of Creswick, in his honour.

When Doug Lindsay passed away in 1974 many tributes were given for his newspaper work, his work with potato growers, his many community involvements and most of all for his contribution to the spirit of the town through his activities.



THE ART OF LIVING

I have always loved gazing at the sky and the clouds.

As many young kids did, and hopefully still do, I would search for pictures in the clouds – animals, toys, buildings – anything I could find that would connect me to the sky and the clouds and bring us together as being of the same stuff.

In more recent years, my mum and dad with my wife and myself, would sit on their back verandah at Bright in north east Victoria and gaze skyward. Mum was especially taken by a deep blue summer sky filled with colourful parachutes of the paragliders that would launch themselves into the heavens from the nearby mountain top. She loved watching them wheel round and round searching for the thermal updraft that would take them higher and higher again and keep them high in the sky as long as possible. Alas, they all had to come to ground eventually.

We would also marvel at the high altitude contrails - the lines formed by the jets flying so very high overhead. These lines scribed across the sky are formed when the water vapour from the jet exhaust mixes with the extremely cold air way up there to form ice crystals. Sometimes the contrails last for a few moments, sometimes they last for hours. My wife and I, living in the south of France many years ago, could count fifteen or more contrails at a time in the winter sky over our village.

With mum, we also watched the massive summer thunderhead clouds passing over, threatening violent storms or the risk of lightning strikes – never welcome in the mountains in summer. We would contemplate the quiet of the low lying clouds nestled against the hills – and the silence of the fog (really just a cloud at ground level). And of course, the rainbows!

We all had great enjoyment from those gravity defying beasts of the air – the birds. Especially the flocks of yellow tailed black cockatoos that would come down from the high country during rough weather and glide effortlessly to feeding and roosting places in the valley.

Last week, whilst pruning the roses for dad, I witnessed something I had never seen before. A large flock of black cockatoos were coming out of the pine forest where they had been feeding on the seeds of pine cones, to a roost tree nearby. One of them had something large in its beak. He was carrying a pine cone.

He decided to grab a take away as they left the forest!

Mum passed away on the second of July.

The sky now will always be mum for me. Blue, or cloudy, hail or shine. From horizon to horizon. Every rainbow.

Creswick Wholefoods Collective

Like many good things, the Creswick Wholefoods Collective was initiated by a local group of enthusiasts. In this case the group was keen to source locally produced food, grown organically or chemically free and purchased in bulk to be available at very moderate prices. Growers were sourced, interested consumers contacted and the Creswick Wholefoods Collective was launched two and a half years ago.

During this time, the membership has grown to over fifty, the range of foods has increased, and a sense of community and friendship is growing. Home produce is donated for free distribution.

It is now located in the Creswick Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) which gives security of tenure; and the group can rub shoulders not only with the Community Garden and Transition Creswick, but also with the many people in and out of the Centre.

Members pay a small joining fee. They bring their shopping bags, paper bags or containers to the venue and choose the bulk foodstuffs they wish to purchase - after a quick lesson on how to use the price calculating scales! Being a Collective, the members work together to make it a vibrant little hub on shop days.

The 'shop' is open twice a week for three hours – 1.00pm to 4.00pm on Friday and 11.00am to 2.00pm on Saturdays at Creswick Neighborhood Centre. On Creswick Market Day, the Saturday hours are 1.00pm to 4.00pm. Pop into the Wholefoods Collective via the back door of the CNC and see the amazing array of local and mostly organic grains, dried fruit, honey, fresh fruit and sometimes vegies and eggs - being just some of the luscious goodies available. Organic vegetable boxes from Mt Prospect Organics may be ordered. These are available year-round except for January.

Creswick Brass Band members Rob, Tamara, Alex and Janice were privileged to be invited to play with the Ballarat Wind Orchestra on their recent tour of Austria for the annual Mid Europe Festival, which is one of the most important international blow music festivals in Europe. The band played eighteen pieces of music from all around the world that represented *Carmen's* tour of Europe looking for love (played by internationally-acclaimed Mezzo Soprano, Sally-Anne Russell). The Band performed a preview of this show at the Wendouree Performing Arts centre prior to the trip with members of the Haddon, Ballarat Memorial and Creswick Bands helping out.

Tamara and Alex play trumpet, Janice plays French horn and Rob plays tuba. All were asked by the Ballarat Wind Orchestra, with Mario Dobernig (Conductor), if they would be available for two weeks in July to go on the third Ballarat Wind Orchestra tour. The first tour was also through Austria (which included the Mid Europe Festival in Schladming), and

the second tour was through China. The Ballarat Wind Orchestra was the only Australian band at the Schladming Festival, along with bands from Sweden, Holland, Italy, and other countries, forty-three bands over five days, over six different stages throughout the town.

The tour started on 30 June with a day stopover in Bangkok. Here, along with the other band members, everyone enjoyed the sights of the city on Tuk Tuks, river boats and admiring amazing temples. It was a very early (or late) start to Vienna with a 1.00am flight that was delayed until 3.00am, so some very tired bandies arrived in Vienna at 9.00am Austrian time. Once the group was booked into their accommodation, the first stop was to the local shopping area, Rochusgasse to shop for Lederhosen and Dirndls (Austrian traditional dress). Most of the band were outfitted and looked fantastic with all the colours of the Dirndls.





The Wind Orchestra had their first rehearsal in the Vienna Konzert House, in the room where the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra practise, which was amazing; ready for their concert of Sacred hymns and music, at Stephansdom (St. Stephen's Cathedral) the next day. This was a very special treat for the band as getting to play at St. Stephen's is extremely difficult to do. Luckily Mario knew the right people to ask and the band played during a Mass and then at a small concert afterwards. St. Stephen's Cathedral was amazing - and to top it off, outside we met some people from Ballarat who were also doing a tour of Europe!!

The following day with free time to explore the city the group visited the Summer Palace of the Habsburgs, WOW! It was astounding. As well, they took a tour of the catacombs under St. Stephen's in the city which was very interesting; and from the top of the North Tower gained a fantastic view of the city. The next day in Vienna they headed to the wharf for a catamaran trip down the Blue Danube to Bratislava in Slovakia. Beautiful scenery the whole way, and then a tour of the town; some of the group by bus, and others completed a two-hour walking tour.

A double-decker bus, complete with bar and hostess, picked everyone up the following morning and took the group to Stainz, where the next concert was being held in the main square of the town. The group stayed in a lovely hotel on the square and the band, dressed in their Austrian costumes, performed their concert for the local townsfolk after the local band had played. The performance was well received with two encores played.

After staying the night at Stainz they headed to Kleinlobming for the next concert. Here the band was asked to put up a team to play human table soccer. It was hilarious. Amazingly one of the teams came third and another gained fourth place against locals who had been practising all year!!

The concert went well and after an overnight stay in a lovely

chalet at the edge of town, the group then headed off to Vipiteno, Italy then on to Swarovski Crystal; and then Kleinwalsertal, for a day of bike riding and visiting a gorge with a three-and-a-half kilometre walk to the top. Spectacular!

After dinner that night the band had an impromptu gig on the balcony of their hotel to warm up for the concert - 2088 metres up in the Alps. This drew a crowd of about fifty people and the hostess of the hotel brought out schnapps for the band as a thank you. The concert the following day was amazing again; and it was most interesting getting the equipment up in the gondolas for them to play.

From here the band members headed off to Munich for two rest days; exploring the town and travelling to Dachau to visit the concentration camp, which was very moving. Their tour of Munich was fascinating, starting with a bus trip around the old town then walking for one and a half hours through the old quarter.

The next destination was Schladming where the Mid Europe Festival was being held. On arrival here, after cases and equipment were unloaded, the group then hopped back on the bus to visit the glacier 3000 metres up at Dachstein. WOW!! This was amazing again. The views were unbelievable and the road up the mountain was windy and quite long.

Then it was concert time again in the square. Fabulous crowds attended and everyone joined in and had a wonderful time. The Italian Band *The River Boys* even joined in playing and singing when the band played *Dem Land Tirol die Treue*. The following day the band played in the Congress (Hall) and again another great concert was enjoyed by many people. The band were then invited to play in the *Austrian Tattoo* which was fabulous and enjoyed by several thousand people.

The following morning they were off to Vienna airport for the long journey home. What a wonderful two weeks with a bunch of wonderful people in a stunning country.



CRESWICK & DISTRICT HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The next meeting of the Creswick & District Historical Society will be on

Thursday, 23 August, in the Seniors' Club Rooms, Water Street, Creswick, at 2.00pm. Planning is underway for the Society's contribution to Family History Week in October, so bright ideas are needed.

The cairn near Davies Bridge is about to be installed, the kitchen in the Town Hall is complete and the book on WWI soldiers is almost done. The members do not sit idle and watch history go past. We are too busy making it happen. Join us if history is your interest.

Last year, the Creswick boys who were at the Battle of Beersheba were mentioned. In compiling the list of Creswick volunteers, WWI, another lad was found - not with the 4th Brigade but the 3rd Light Horse Field Artillery. Private John Thomas STILL, enlisted on 22 September, 1914, in 'C' Squadron, 8th Battalion. By May 1915, he was in Egypt and heading for Gallipoli. He suffered a gunshot wound and was moved from Casualty Clearing Station to Port Said. Following that he contracted tonsillitis. He spent time at the Overseas Base, Helouan in December and was at Serapeum in February 1916, but was in hospital, Road Head with peritonitis in May. June saw him back in action. John was transferred to the 3rd Light Horse Battalion, Machine Gun Squadron at Bally Bunion in November but tonsillitis struck again in November. He was then wounded in action at Gaza in April, 1917. Another stint in hospital at Cairo, then back to the front. More tonsillitis and another abscess followed. On 18 October, 1917, he re-joined his unit, only to be wounded at the Battle of Beersheba on 31 October and died of his wounds the next day.



100 years ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

August 2, 1918

The new bell donated by Mrs. Tremearne to St. John's Church of England, Creswick, will be dedicated on Sunday morning by the Rev. J. W. Arnold, a former vicar, and an intercessory service will be held in the evening.

August 6, 1918

Mollongghip- Gifts of Potatoes- Through the generosity of residents, a good number of potatoes is being accumulated at the Newlyn railway station for the Caulfield Military Hospital.

August 9, 1918

A meeting of those desirous of forming a district anglers' club will be held at the American Hotel on Saturday (tomorrow) afternoon, at 1.30 o'clock. It is hoped that there will be a good attendance.

August 13, 1918

Allendale- Tennis club- The annual meeting of the Allendale Tennis Club was held in the library on Thursday evening last, and the following officers were elected: - President, Miss Kidd (re-elected); Treasurer, Mrs. Finch (re-elected); secretary, Mr. A. W. Lawson. The club has many lady members but the secretary is hopeful that more gentlemen will join, for it is his intention to re-organise the club, and challenge Creswick, and come down on them "like a wolf on the fold."

August 16, 1918

On Friday evening, the 9th inst., at the usual meeting of the Forestry School Debating and Literary Society, a competition was held in connection with one of the two trophies donated by Dr. Sleeman, the prize to be awarded for the best prepared speech. Sir A. J. Peacock and the Rev. W. H. McCook B.A., adjudicated. Some very fine speeches were given, and the honors were finally divided between N. MacDonald (Repatriation) and G. Liston (Appeal for War Bonds).

August 20, 1918

It having been found that the 225 trees planted in the Creswick Shire Avenue of Honor were not sufficient to recognise all those who had gone from the shire to the war, it has been agreed that 25 guards and trees additional be procured. A "Working bee" will take place next Saturday, at 1 p.m., for the purpose of erecting the guards and planting the trees.

August 23, 1918

Dean – Honor Roll – An honor roll is to be obtained for the Dean Public Hall. When complete it will contain over 50 names. It is now being constructed by Messrs Tunbridge, of Ballarat, and will be placed in position towards the end of September.

August 27, 1918

An examination for appointment as telegraph messenger, Creswick, will be held locally on the 7th September next. Condidates must be between 14 and 16 years of age. Applications close with the postmaster, from whom application forms and full particulars may be obtained, on the 5th approx.

August 30, 1918

The euchre tournament in St. Augustines' hall next Wednesday evening will be a champion contest, the lady and gentleman winners being entitled to rank as champions for the season. Twelve games will be played and the prizes will be the gifts of Messrs John Charleson and Hy. Peacock. There should be a large attendance to take part in this tournament.
