community bonfire was born out of the devastating storm that hit Creswick on 5 January, earlier this year.

'As we started to pile up the debris, the genesis of an idea started to form. Why not have a bonfire and make it a celebratory community event? It's also symbolic that the foundation of the bonfire was built from the destruction left by the storm,' Andrew said.

And that is exactly what happened. Little by little, the bonfire grew and grew until on that Friday night, to the joy of people of all ages, it lit up the sky and was reflected in Park Lake.

Following the skin check, visitors will be issued with a referral to their GP if there are any suspect spots or lesions. The air-conditioned van has three fully equipped screening rooms and an entry foyer, as well as a disabled lift and entry at the rear.

JOHN BENNETT KNOWN AS JACK 4.1.1921 - 20.4.2002 HONOUR ROLL INDUCTEE 2022

Born in Creswick in 1921, Jack lived in Newlyn all his life operating a busy and successful business, Bennett Contractors, which is still operated by his son Peter. His contribution to the Shire of Creswick was well known and he is remembered as a man who often did jobs free of charge. The family business was based on hard work and commitment to the Creswick district in which he was raised.

Jack was the third child of Daniel and Adelaide. Dan worked at Tyner's Mill as manager and as an agent to Tinney's Potato Merchants at Bungaree. His siblings were Eileen Nestor (Nellie), Ron, Joyce Hunt and Delia McDonald.

Jack attended school at Newlyn, leaving after obtaining his Merit Certificate. His mother would walk the children to school but on returning home would often find Jack back at the family home.

In 1934 he commenced an apprenticeship at A J Wilson, a builder and plumbing contractor in Ballarat. The *Creswick District News* Personality of the Month in 1999, records Jack as riding his bike to Ballarat from Newlyn, earning thirty shillings a month and on completion of his apprenticeship he continued to work for Wilsons.

Early in the war years, skilled tradesmen were drafted to reserved occupations. Jack was posted to the Allied Works Council and spent time in the Williamstown and Newport areas building air raid shelters and gun emplacements.

There followed a short period building the Kiewa Valley Hydro Electric project before Jack was released to join S J Weir, Ballarat, to build a hospital for American Army personnel then based at Ballarat.

At the end of the war, Jack returned to Newlyn to develop his own business and raise a family, having married Eila (Eileen Grace Clohesy) in 1943. They had three children, Noelene Prendergast, Annette Mahar and Peter.

Jack's work included installation of farm water supplies and irrigation schemes. He is recorded as being a man who would tackle any problem and was noted for developing irrigation systems when little was known about this science.

Major projects started in 1949 included the maternity wing at Creswick District Hospital, St Augustine's Primary School and an extension to Ballarat Redemptorist Monastery.

In the 1950s, Creswick Water Authority invited Jack to tender for water and sewerage projects. Consequently, Bennett staff travelled widely in Victoria, laying pipe lines and sewerage mains.

Bennett constructed the new diving tower at Calembeen Park. In 1958 they installed the reticulated water supply to



Smeaton and in 1970 constructed Cosgrave's Reservoir.

Jack employed local boys as apprentices, many of whom are now well known and respected builders in the district.

Newlyn football oval and Community Hall, for which Jack drew the plans, are lasting monuments to his commitment. His voluntary contribution is honoured by a room in his name. This complex was built by the amazing generosity of district farmers, Jack being just one.

At the opening of the complex the program recorded the following:

'Although the Community Complex has two committees which have made multiple decisions throughout the construction, there have been countless day to day decisions which have been left to one man, Jack Bennett. Jack has shouldered a tremendous workload during the past two years ... He has spent countless hours planning, pricing, and co-ordinating and in many instances actually doing the jobs at the complex. Jack's dedication to the project has been without equal and hopefully in future years the younger members of the community will follow the example set by Jack in the maintenance of our complex as well as other community activities. Thank-you Jack from the entire district.'

Always a keen tennis player, Jack became President of Newlyn Tennis Club in 1957 and was very involved in Country Week tennis. In 1967 due to drought, Country Week could not be held in Ballarat. It was Jack's expertise in the preparation and marking of courts which allowed all games to be played at the single venue of Hammon Park. He also assumed responsibility for watering these courts which involved running water and pipes from Blue Waters to Hammon Park to maintain the surface suitable for tennis. This enormous task, with the assistance of men from the tennis clubs, football clubs, farmers and surrounding district club members, was completed in just eight weeks. Subsequent to this, and for his contribution to the original Creswick grass courts, Jack was awarded a life membership of Mt Prospect Tennis Association in 1967.

Probably an inaugural member, Jack received a forty year medal from the Newlyn Fire Brigade. One member tells of him always having the truck out and ready to go when the alarm sounded, before anyone else arrived. Several anecdotal reports record that on total fire ban days, Jack would return his heavy equipment back to the district to ensure there was support in case of fire.

As the children grew, Jack was always involved in school projects and functions. In the early 1970s Jack and the committee at the Creswick Golf Club instigated a plan to convert the sand scrapes to greens. Bennetts were responsible for the construction of watering systems and greens at the golf course. Much of the time and machinery involved was donated.

Jack was a supporter of Creswick. From small beginnings, Jack Bennett and Bennett Newlyn created a family contracting business, capable of undertaking projects ranging from farm water supplies, building reservoirs and installing state of the art water treatment plants for regional water boards. His skill in installing irrigation systems to potato growers enabled farmers to be at the forefront of modern production requirements.

As a carpenter, builder and plumber Jack was well liked and much respected, a worthy inclusion on the Creswick Honour Roll to acknowledge his contributions. Most of his community work was done quietly and efficiently, making research into his contribution difficult, as he never looked for accolades. His legacy, however, is all around us.

The Creswick & District Historical Society and the Honour Roll Committee is committed to honouring people who contributed time and effort into the development of Creswick and district – Jack was one of these.

St Augustine's 150th Celebrations 17 - 18 September, 2022

A story of worship, leadership, service and community

This year is the 150th year since the bluestone church of St Augustine's was officially opened.

In researching the story and history of St Augustine's over the past 150 years it has become clear that this is not just a church building or a place of worship. The significant contribution made by many families and individuals to both the Parish and community of Creswick and district is very evident.

Families, many of them Irish, who first settled in the district during the mid-1800s still have descendants living in the district and actively involved with St Augustine's. Some families have children of the fourth and fifth generations currently attending St Augustine's school. There have been forty members of the Ted Prendergast family, through the generations, baptized and eleven

family members married in St Augustine's Church.

While too numerous to mention all, families including Tacey/Flynn, Kennedys, Moore/Hall, McMahon, Lenaghan, Goates, Preston/Rush have been involved in the mining, agriculture, transport and construction industries, as well as in many and varied community and sporting organisations of the town and district.

The arrival of the Dutch in town during the 1950s and 1960s was a significant event for both St Augustine's and the town. Monsignor James McInerney, Parish Priest for over thirty years commented, on his retirement in 1983, that the Dutch migrants contributed greatly to the town's resurgence and said, 'the town's growth was reflected in the congregation at the church. To cope with the extra number of worshippers, an extra gallery was put into St Augustine's Church'.

Tribute – Geoffrey Fiddian 1939-2022

Geoff was born in Richmond, Melbourne, on 30 August, 1939. His home was in Hawthorn where he attended the local primary school before moving to East Kew Central school. His secondary education was at Wesley College where he rowed and played flute in the orchestra.

In 1958 he joined the Concert Department of the ABC and managed concerts for the Victorian (now Melbourne) Symphony Orchestra and many internationally renowned musicians who visited to give recitals. Geoff loved taking many of these celebrities to country centres, showing them regional Victoria. He had an amazing ear for classical music and could recognise any performer on the radio.

Geoff married Frances in 1963 and joyfully welcomed Sam and later Michael. The family home was in Mitcham where he established a vegetable garden which fed the family and neighbours. He took an active part in Mountview Uniting Church, serving on the council, singing in the choir and teaching Sunday School. A change in management and culture at the ABC led to Geoff taking early retirement in 1989. Geoff's great-grandfather was Mr Samuel Fiddian, much loved principal of Creswick Grammar School from 1872 – 1903. Though the original family home in Cambridge Street had been sold, Geoff loved Creswick, visiting in summer to introduce all to the joys of swimming at Calembeen. The purchase of a house in Creswick meant he was 'home' again. He bought trees for his orchard but the gift of a fig tree was special. He happily gave away buckets of figs and other produce he had grown.

Following his retirement Geoff studied for an Arts degree majoring in Journalism. He was adamant that accuracy was essential and that copyright rules be followed. History was his passion and he wrote for the Creswick & District Historical Society, of which he was a member and Honorary Secretary for many years. He also ran a Creswick History group for U3A. He enjoyed travelling, both overseas and within Australia.

Geoff was very proud of his Creswick roots and achieved a great deal in his eighty-two years.

Earl Ingleby 1939 – 2022


Rest in Peace

Earl was known to many people in Creswick as a man who was passionate about Art and who was active in many community Arts programs over a long period of his life.

Earl was born on 2 February, 1939. From 1961 – 1975 Earl studied Sculpture at RMIT Melbourne and at the Academy la bella Arta Milano, Italy. At first Earl concentrated on sculpture although he was very productive in painting and drawing as evidenced by his many exhibitions in the area. Earl was politically active in the 1960 – 1970 era during the Vietnam War and Conscription.

On his death the Creswick Railway

Workshops Association (CRWA) paid their respects and acknowledged Earl's contribution starting from his involvement with the formation of the CRWA in 2010. He was also acknowledged by the Creswick U3A for his involvement. Earl served on the U3A Committee as their Web Master and among other things organised the World Cinema Program and Film Appreciation sessions.



Earl facilitated the Hepburn Shire 2019 Words in Winter Exhibition *Words & Vision* at Café 84 and also held several exhibitions of line drawings/paintings in Red Fox Coffee Lounge. He created many fine art works from abstract, landscape, still life and the female form to name just a few and he used a diverse range of media to do so. The sculpture outside the Creswick Hub was carved by Earl from red gum taken from the Jubilee Bandstand and is titled *Community*.

In Earl's words, 'As I grow older I have found that my art becomes more deeply in my past. I started art school wanting to paint in the style of Dali. That didn't last long and I soon changed my major to sculpture. Fifty

years later the vast majority of my output are paintings and drawings'.

Rest in Peace Earl and thanks for all your contributions to our town and community.

100 Years Ago

August 1, 1922

During the gale last Thursday, Mr. Richard Torney, of Smeaton, met with a severe and painful accident at his chaff works in the Kingston Railway station yards. The wind was blowing with great velocity, and portion of the buildings comprising the mill was blown down. Mr. Torney was making an inspection of the remainder, but turned to speak to a man, and just at that time another part of the building came away, Mr. Torney being caught in the downfall, and he was rendered unconscious.

August 4, 1922

Newlyn Public Hall – A meeting of all interested will be held in the Hall on Friday Evening Next, 4th August, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of launching some scheme to raise funds to obtain a new hall. Sir A. J. Peacock, M.L.A., will preside. Large attendance requested.

August 9, 1922

Fully 150 were present in the Central hall, Geelong, on the 29th ult., when former Creswickians' met for a social evening. The association of former residents of this district is now very strong in that city and much enjoyment is being derived out of the meetings and socials, etc.

August 11, 1922

Many of the residents are unaware that there is a nucleus of a fund in the Bank of New South Wales for placing a clock in the Creswick town hall tower. Cr. Jebb guestioned the town clerk about the matter at the council meeting last Tuesday evening, when it was stated that the amount was now £46/19/. He was informed by the bank manager that

the money must be used for the purpose specified, and in no other way.

August 15, 1922

At the annual meeting of the North Creswick Past Pupil's Association, held last Tuesday evening, it was decided to make a donation of £1/1/ to the local Fallen Soldiers' memorial fund.

August 25, 1922

Residents of the town will be delighted to know that the re -organised Creswick Victory Brass Band will make its first appearance next Tuesday evening, when a grand vocal and instrumental entertainment will be given in the town hall, the programme being contributed by Ballarat and local talent. It will be remembered that the band passed through a period of depression, and its existence was seriously threatened, but owing to the activity of several of the residents, a firmer footing was gained. Mr. Frank Wright, the talented conductor of the Ballarat City Band, was secured as bandmaster, and he has devoted his energies in the direction of making the band the institution in the town it should be.

August 29, 1922

Official notification has been received to the effect that the Creswick Brick, Tile and Potteries Ltd., have purchased the land and buildings at North Creswick from the Broomfield Alluviums Proprietary Co. Ltd., and that they will immediately press on with the work of erecting kilns and balance of plant, some of which has already been purchased. (Site today of Creswick Woollen Mills)





Katelyn works with the Regional Koorie Curriculum Club (KCC) in providing links and opportunities for Creswick Primary School to integrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives into the curriculum.

A range of activities were provided at lunchtimes throughout NAIDOC Week, along with daily classroom activities. Students made Aboriginal flags, learnt what each colour represented; made rainbow serpents as woollen sculptures based on the Dreamtime story of the same name; wove their own baskets and produced dot paintings of native animals. Aboriginal stories were read daily enhancing the students' understanding of Aboriginal culture and history. The weekly quiz question was also centred around the theme with prizes awarded at assembly, along with a special colouring competition also conducted throughout the week.

All Indigenous students also participated in a special

activity of their own where they made rain-sticks and learned about the symbols that can be used in art that deliver a story. They were fascinated in the range of signs and symbols that were easily recognisable as they created their own pieces of work.

It was a fantastic week of learning and understanding for all students and a very pleasing week for Indigenous students proudly sharing the knowledge of their culture with their peers.
