

Creswick Scout Leaders Fully Trained

Creswick Scout Group is pleased to announce that two of their Leaders have completed their Advanced Leader Training in Scouting, known as the Wood Badge. Amanda Hines and Rowena Miller decided to train as leaders in late 2019 after joining the Scout parent support committee and then helping on Cub nights. Amanda moved on to the Scout section, Rowena stayed in the Cub section. They both have Personal Leader Advisers and Leader Trainers to work with as well as each other for support. This is the first basic part of their Wood Badge training and is recognized with the Gilwell Woggle (also known as a two strand Turk's Head).

The Wood Badge is made up of the Gilwell Scarf, dove grey in colour, the colour of humility and in the peak of the scarf is a small piece of Maclaren tartan to remind scouting of Mr de Bois Maclaren who provided the land on which The Gilwell Scout Park is in London. Also, part of the Wood Badge is the Wood Beads and Lace which is a reminder of the Scout Law and Promise.

Amanda and Rowena were presented with their Gilwell Scarf and Wood Beads during the Scout meeting on 28 November. This just happened to be held in the Creswick Cemetery beside the resting place of the Rev Robinson, who started Scouting in Creswick in 1909. Both are now able to work on training courses. Not all Scout Leaders complete the advanced section of training, Creswick Scout Group now has five Wood Badge Leaders.

Barbara Archer Happy 99th Birthday to an ex-Creswick Resident





VALE, KEVIN ANTHONY PRESTON

Kevin, the third son of Ken and Mollie Preston, was born in Creswick on 27 May 1950, the same year his father purchased his own truck and started *K T Preston Cartage Contractors*.

Kevin attended St Augustine's Primary School and later St Patrick's College in Ballarat. He loved sport and was a member of both the Creswick Football and Cricket Clubs, playing in football premiership teams, under 16 in 1962, under 17 in 1965 and under 18 in 1967 and 1968.

As a teenager he lived a fairly free and easy life riding bikes around Creswick, swimming at Calembeen Park, St Georges Lake and going to the pictures at the local Town Hall.

His real love though was trucks. Kevin left school at sixteen to work with his father and eldest brother David in the family business carting sheaf hay, bales of hay, bags of chaff - all hand loaded and unloaded - to and from the local chaff mills of *J & R Tyner* at Newlyn, Kingston and Learmonth. Unfortunately, 1966 was a drought year, so he got a job with the Creswick Shire. Kevin's first truck, after getting his licence, was a 1960 Bedford.

From Kevin's early days at St Augustine's Primary School he knew Deta Pepper, the eldest of Charlie and Edith Pepper's six daughters - obviously trucks weren't his only love. On 30 October 1971, at the age of twenty-one, Kevin and Deta were married at St Augustine's Church. This led to a successful married partnership of fifty-one years.

The business Kevin's dad started began to expand slowly and in 1971 when he was twenty-one, *K T Preston & Sons Pty Ltd* was formed. Kevin had formally become part of a company with his dad and brother David which formed a strong working relationship.

The business continued to grow, bulk grain was added and general freight from Ballarat and surrounds to and from Melbourne, then to interstate work. Kevin's interstate trips began in an era at least two decades before mobile phones. The only time he managed to call home to advise of his whereabouts was from the loading agent's office or a public phone box. After his father's retirement, Kevin and David continued the business which expanded again ... when, in 1991, they won a contract with Carlton United Brewery to distribute its products. This necessitated a large warehouse so operations moved from Creswick into Ballarat.

The year 2000 was a milestone year when *The Courier* featured an article, *50 Years in Transport*, about the Prestons. It was by then employing the third generation.

The business partnership of Kevin and David ended in 2003. Kevin and Deta continued trading in Ballarat.

Kevin developed serious health issues in 2016 but this didn't stop him continuing to think forward on how to improve the successful business which was the prime source of income for extended family. Consequently, at the end of 2018, they purchased a building which adjoined the Ballarat property. This provided newly renovated office space.

The end of 2020 marked seventy years of trading by the Preston family. To celebrate this milestone, Kevin, with the assistance of Phil Roberts, a renowned Ballarat author, published a book titled *K T Preston – 70 years in the Transport Industry – 1950 – 2020*. He was super proud of the result. A lot of the content came from memory but he had the backup support of all the old paperwork his dad had kept.

Kevin was inducted into the *National Road Transport Hall of Fame*, Alice Springs in 2020 but was unable to attend due to COVID-19 lockdown restrictions. He watched the proceedings via video.

During his illness, Kevin continued his love of sport through reading and watching all sports on TV especially his beloved Tigers. Not only would he read sport and biographies, when talking about them he could accurately recall the facts within the books.

Kevin came from humble beginnings; he was a man of his word, what he said he would do he did; he enjoyed the simple things in life, spending time at home with his family, driving through the countryside checking out the crops on the local farms. He always had plenty of stories to tell anyone who had the time to listen. He was proud of what he had achieved during his life, proud of his wife, his children and eleven grandchildren.

Kevin passed away peacefully on 8 September, 2022. He leaves behind a work ethic like no other, a successful business that's in safe hands, memories to treasure and a family who loved him dearly and who miss him beyond words.

Calembeen Park change facilities upgrade is complete, and the amenities are now open. The upgrades included refurbishment of the public amenities to include three accessible unisex changerooms with toilet, shower and baby change facilities, an accessible footpath, accessible car parking space, drinking fountain, park furniture renewal and landscaping. A formal Ministerial opening will take place at a date to be confirmed. This project was funded in partnership by Council and the Victorian Government.

PROJECT UPDATES

Creswick Town Hall - Restoration works are continuing, with builders preparing the outside of the building for painting, and roof repairs also underway. The project includes repairs and painting to windows and doors, repairs to masonry cracking and remediation of the chimney and parapet. Existing paint colours will be used. Accessibility improvements will be made to the main hall, general repairs will be carried out on the roof and gutters, and a new flagpole installed. The works are funded by the Victorian Government, Australian Government and Council. It is due for completion in the first half of 2023.

Hammon Park Trailhead - works are focused on the finishing touches of the bike jumps course. The site will also include learn to ride areas, play areas, a changing places toilet facilities and more. This will be the trailhead for the 60km Creswick Trails. It is being delivered by Council in partnership with the Victorian Government.

The Art of Living

Given how often I bang on about the meditative qualities of the time I spend on my own in nature, I also harbour a very curious interest in the aesthetic qualities of industrial architecture and machinery. Surprisingly, or maybe not, most of the paintings and drawings of mine in the Collection of the State Library of Victoria are in fact industrial themes. That may be because the Library has a role in documenting history – both past and unfolding.

My works in the collection range from images of the Loy Yang open cut coal mines (soon to become history), to the excavators demolishing the old Prince Henry's Hospital on St Kilda Road in 1994. I well remember standing on the sidelines drawing as those massive brick-eaters trampled up and down across the rubble. I was fond of those drawings. Drawings are my babies that grow into paintings or sculptures.

Also in the Library Collection, drawings of the lively wharves in Melbourne at five o'clock in the morning and old abandoned eucalyptus distilleries in the Mallee. Actually, there is a very beautiful old eucy just to the north of Clunes. Eucalyptus oil was Australia's first export, so I have read. Sadly, we now import it from China - we no longer produce enough for our own use. THAT is really sad. As fortune would have it, we here in Creswick are blessed with both the natural and the industrial aesthetic. We have our bushland for our meditative walks and some really cracking good industrial architecture. Where do I start? Andersons Mill maybe. As an artist, the thing I find most engaging about 19th and early 20th century industrial architecture is the amount of aesthetic detail put in. These were not just work stations, they had to look good. Andersons Mill at Smeaton is majestic by any standard. All utility buildings had a primary focus on their job, but for some reason unknown to me, they seem to fit into their primary role and the landscape at the same time, a winwin! This year I produced a number of drawings and etchings of Andersons Mill for this very reason – it just looks right, exactly where it is.

Then there are the ruined remains of the pump house buildings near Smeaton at the old Berry Mine and the Hepburn Estate Mine. Fantastic designs that go way beyond their actual need, then we come right back here in town. The old Creswick railway station. What a beautiful work. It was a railway station for heaven's sake, but built with such grace. The tuck-pointing brickwork, the polychrome, the corbelled bricks to the roofline - all for a railway station. And this kind of work was done on buildings, and bridges across the land. Sadly no more.

If that was so a century ago, there would be no Paris Metro now or the London Underground. Sometimes imagining the world one hundred years hence is worth doing.

100 Years Ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

December 1, 1922

The rainfall registered at the town hall for the month just ended was 90 points, making a total of 18 inches 82 points since 1st January. Last year the fall for November was 2 inches 32 points, and for the first 11 months of 1921 the registration was 29 inches 2 points.

December 5, 1922

The Earl of Carnarvon, with Mr. Howard Carter's assistance, carried out excavations on portion of the site of ancient Thebes, on the west bank of the Nile, near Luxor. Interesting historical data were unearthed from time to time, but nothing really striking, despite diligent exploration, until now.

Where the Royal Necropolis of the Theban Empire was situated, and directly below the tomb of Rameses the Sixth, Mr. Carter found what looked like a cache. He covered up the site and cabled Lord Carnarvon, who went from England forthwith. The seals of the tomb were carefully examined. It was found that the Royal Necropolis seals were intact, though there were signs that the chamber had been closed more than once.

Little did Lord Carnarvon or Mr. Carter suspect the wonderful contents of the chamber when they stood outside.

It seems undoubted that the collection was part of Tutenkhamun's funeral paraphernalia, which had been removed from the original tombs to escape the depredations of thieves.

December 8, 1922

A meeting of the trustees of the Victorian Mining Accident Relief Fund will be held on the 19th December. Those desirous of applying for assistance must leave their claims with the town clerk (Mr. A. B. Grose) from whom forms can be obtained, before 14th December.

December 12, 1922

Today is the fortieth anniversary of the great disaster that overcame the miners working in the New Australasian Mine, Creswick, through the flooding on 12th December, 1882, as a result of which 22 men of those employed underground lost their lives, and there were only five survivors. Of the latter one is still alive and living in our midst in the person of Mr. John Manley. The other four survivors of the great ordeal were Patrick Bowen, Thomas Corbett, Peter Moloney and Cornelius Quirk.

Those who gave their lives were Christian Frederick Fisher, James Carmody, George Baulcomb, Nathaniel Trescowthick, Michael Hayes, John Gower, William Curtis, James Minahan, William Tregloan, Edward Campon Dargon, Anton Andersson, John Henry Crougey, James Mitchell Temby, James O'Shea, Carle Waldemar Theordor Serrurier, Thomas Penbertha Chegwin, Abraham Wyatt, Jabez Bellingham, John Tom Clifton, Edward Wood, Benjamin Bellingham, John Thomas Hodge. Their ages ranged from 55 years down to 18 in the order above given.

December 15, 1922

Creswick District Hospital – Christmas Cheer

Donations in money or in suitable goods, to provide Christmas Cheer for the patients at the above hospital will be thankfully received by the undersigned or the Matron at the Institution.

December 19, 1922

December 22, 1922

The Creswick Victory Brass Band will play selections and carols tonight, (Friday), commencing at the Hospital, and proceeding to Cambridge, Victoria and Albert Streets and Church hill.

December 29, 1922

Hearty congratulations were showered on A. C. Pasco, the local runner, by his many friends when it became known that he had been successful in netting the first prize (70) in the Ballarat Christmas Gift. The young man ran brilliantly in his heat and semi final on Christmas Day and left no doubt in the minds of the Creswick folk and many who witnessed his running, that the great race would come to Creswick.

Sophie Richardson read the Ode of Remembrance and the students led the singing of the National Anthem. Community Workshop Α for preparing the Environmental Effects Statement (EES) submissions to the Western Renewable Link (WRL) Project was held on 19 November. It is clear the community cares about local heritage and is prepared to protect the integrity of heritage sites in and around Kingston. The strong between link tourism and heritage was discussed. Whilst Miss Northcott's Garden was flourishing, Simone's next dream was to open a tea room in the cottage - a peaceful place for people to relax, with elegant tables, delicious cakes and fluffy scones served on pretty floral china and an enticing array of teas. The Cottage finally opened earlier this year after the COVID lockdowns put the dream on hold for a couple of years.

Since opening, Simone has been delighted to hear many stories from long-time residents and Elizabeth's family members telling her stories about Miss Northcott giving tea and etiquette classes for the Girl Guides from her own home. They also bring special teacups, to go with Simone's own collection, and one of Miss Northcott's nieces has even given Simone a whole dinner set that belonged to Elizabeth's sister. Simone plans to create a display area for these treasures with plaques to attribute these precious gifts.

Simone expresses her gratitude to her parents, her children, her staff (past and present) and to her loyal customers for the success of the past ten years. But Olicartia's success is also a tribute to the deep roots of Creswick's community and the far-sightedness and resilience of its talented owner.

Kingston Friends of the Avenue Honorary Life Membership for Julie Baulch

At the opening of the *Kingston Remembers* Resource Centre on 5 November, Julie Baulch was presented with an Honorary Life Membership certificate of the Kingston Friends of the Avenue (KFOA) by Dr Robert Webster OAM, Victorian RSL State President. The certificate expresses, *'thanks and appreciation for her unwavering dedication and commitment to the Avenue'*.

In 1999, Julie was a founding member when Friends of the Avenue formed as a sub-committee of the then Kingston Community Recreation Centre (the Hall). Friends and the community set out to restore and protect the Avenue trees and to gather and preserve its history, in particular the stories of those who are commemorated. After much hard work, the Avenue was re-dedicated on Remembrance Day 2000. On the same day in 2018, over 2,000 people came to commemorate the Avenue's Centenary and the Centenary of the Armistice, the culmination of a lot of hard work by a wide range of organisations, including the Creswick -Smeaton RSL Sub Branch.

In 2014, when the group re-formed after a break of ten years to become an incorporated body, Julie was elected President and has remained in this role. At this point there was a name change, with the word Kingston added, upon the suggestion of Consumer Affairs. The Avenue is in fact the former Shire of Creswick Avenue of Honour, at Kingston.

The incredible achievements of KFOA and the community can be seen on the Kingston Avenue website. There is also a Facebook page. The second edition of Peter Rickard's book, *Sentinels of Service – Volunteers of the Kingston Avenue of Honour,* is available for purchase at the Resource Centre at the Commercial @ Kingston or may be borrowed from the Creswick library. On the website, you can access a web app which uses GPS coordinates to help you find a particular person's tree.

Kingston, Friends of the Avenue works closely with the Hepburn Shire Council. In 2022 KFOA commissioned Homewood Consultancy to produce a detailed Tree Management Plan, which can be viewed on the website. This Management Plan will form part of a Conservation Management Plan which will be presented to Council in 2023.

Julie has decided to nominate as Vice President at the next AGM to be held in late 2023.


