Ray Laycock

Bowler – Commonwealth Games Representative

Ray Laycock, who recently passed away at the age of ninety, joined the Creswick Bowling Club in 1956, aged in his twenties. At that time he was the youngest player ever to take up membership. Ray achieved many successes over the next forty plus years on the Club, National and International lawn bowls scene.

Ray's skill was recognised at State level in 1969 when he played his first game for Victoria. Then followed 192 State games during the next twenty years. He also spent time as a State Selector and State Coach.

In 1986 Ray represented Australia at the Edinburgh Commonwealth Games, and in 1988 he came equal third in the Australian Pairs Championship competing against the nation's best bowlers. At Club and Regional level Ray achieved many successes including nine times as Club Champion, Champion of Champions; also winning the T.A. Williams and Association Singles and Association Pairs and Association Fours. The Laycock unique ability to accurately drive a bowl saw him achieve stardom on the Channel 7 World of Sport program, *Drive the Jack* - he won the event in 1978 - 79 and 1981.

Ray was awarded Life Membership of the Creswick Bowling Club in 1985 recognising his long contribution, including many years as Selector, President, Works Manager and Greenkeeper. Ray continued to be an active member of the Bowling Club for many years. Sympathy is extended to Ray's family and friends.

The purchase of new timpani drums supports both Creswick Brass and Jubilee Brass to prepare for competitions which include the Australian National Band Championship in June this year. Not only will the purchase of new drums support the Band for preparation for competitions but it also allows for the development of new skills for percussion players. FOREVER, IT SEEMS Vale St Joseph's Catholic Church, Blampied

On first entering the doors of St Joseph's church Blampied in 1990, my immediate reaction was that I had stepped through a portal into a significantly earlier time. Several gentlemen's hats were carefully arrayed at the back, with a few more hanging over the pews in the not-quite-front. A cacophony of chatting and laughing shocked me, along with children's semi-restrained giggles. I had been used to the hushed tones of the spiritually precious. At about seven minutes past nine, a bell sounded and two women with guitars (Mary and Mollie) and a gaggle of children started strumming and singing away. The men, gathered outside and deeply involved in their conversations of weather, potato prices and the news of the district, strode in. The last, Max, only seated by the beginning of the second verse of the opening hymn.

Fr Peter Priestly came down and shook hands with every person at the end of the pews. He chatted freely, asked where we had come from and made us feel instantly welcome. After mass, a friendly parishioner and his daughters rushed up and welcomed us so consummately that it became absolutely impossible to do anything other than commit to a life-time of belonging to this happy, friendly, beautifully old-fashioned throng of believers.

For us, only twenty-eight years passed before 11 March, 2018 when the doors were effectively closed on that bubble of faith and community, as the last Sunday Mass was celebrated. For most others, however, generations of lives had been anticipated, welcomed, celebrated, lived, farewelled and mourned within the walls of this old church. The very stones are surely steeped in 149 years of prayer, love, kindness, fellowship, human frailty, sadness, courage and joy. The little church in Blampied is palpably an expression of the faith and sense of community of the people. The land on which it sits was donated by the Clohesy family, who have maintained, loved and protected

it for generations. The church itself was built by the collected fund-raising of the grandparents and great grandparents of so many of the current parishioners. Stained-glass windows were donated by founders of the district. Uncountable hours were spent by the women of the parish, who, often with a band of children in tow, cleaned, dusted and (for the lucky ones in latter years), vacuumed each and every Saturday. As they had forever, it seems.

The passing of time and the moving away of the younger generation, tied ultimately with the changing of our society and the shrinking of the church in general, resulted in the decision to close the doors for all but weddings and funerals. If the bluestone walls could have bulged, they would have done so on the day of the final Sunday Mass, as so many people gathered from wherever time and their lives had taken them. In fact, the day included an ecumenical flavour, as people from other church traditions and faith backgrounds, gathered in a show of camaradie and in recognition of the sadness of the breaking up of another small community. It was concelebrated by the parish priest, Fr Gary Jones, Fr Clem Cafarella (a former Parish Priest) and the Bishop, Paul Bird, who spoke inspiringly at a difficult time.

Sue Lafranchi had created a beautiful floral display as she has done forever, it seems. John Egan and Vin Richards read as they have read forever, it seems. Three generations of the Rousch family brought up the gifts, as they have forever, it seems. Claire Torpy and John Cleary gave out Communion ... as they have given, forever, it seems. The entire community joined in the singing of all hymns with gusto as they also have sung forever, it seems.

After Kevin Lafranchi had given a speech at the conclusion of the Mass, summing up many of the memories of times past and as the recessional hymn was being sung for the final time, those who were students of the little Catholic school which was originally behind the church and staffed by the Presentation Sisters, led the congregation out of the church to a standing ovation. If your eyes were dry at that point, your heart was hard indeed! After Mass and the taking of a group photo, people lingered to catch up and share many of the stories which have gone into making them who they are, while John Cleary cooked up a storm on the barbecue, as he, too, has cooked forever, it seems.

Most significant events are marked with a cake and this was no different. One of the newest members of the community, Hailey Torpy, made a cake which was cut by the two oldest members - Marie Lewis 104, who served as sacristan, before passing the baton to Carmel Rieniets, and Eunice Cleary who was in her late 90s.

Resilience In The Garden by Rhonda Cotsell



Damage to viminalis

There are many ways we lose our gardens. We move house, they become impossible to maintain – or we suffer a huge environmental event like we did last month. The stories I heard from friends and strangers varied from devastating to not *too* bad. But one of the subjects repeated was the tremendous impact on our gardens.

My top two favourite fruit trees


were decimated and a thriving but unbending *Eucalyptus viminalis*, chosen because koalas ate the leaves, literally broke in half. Many flowering shrubs were shredded to half their height, leaving stalks lined with pathetic little tags of green. Most of my apple crop, my orange with its first promise of fruit and a pot full of budding day lilies now litter the ground. Patches of lambs ears, which had been veritable bee cities, were totally flattened and are now totally bee-less.

As I sat outside absorbing the damage and drowning in self-pity, two things slowly emerged. One was that resurrecting my garden allowed room for a rethink of

previous decisions, to fix things that were not working and particularly how labour intensive it was. The second was realising that my garden lives more in my heart, the skills I have acquired over the years, an addiction to messing about with dirt and plants and not what shape my garden is in right now. Nothing survives for ever but Mother Nature does. Even the storm is hers.

My intentions now are to get realistic over my too-many fruit trees and my ability to prune. The fruit trees broken by the storm were the ones weakened structurally by bad pruning. There were many that survived without damage; willowy things with strong slender limbs that moved wherever the storm went, like some grevilleas, my silver birches and a plum. Also, I will extend my long-held aim to create a bird attracting garden to one that encapsulates all local wildlife. No more choosing plants simply because the tag says it attracts birds and giving more attention to actively checking out expert guidance, for example, from the Hepburn Shire Council Community Gardens for Wildlife Program. I will not replace my koala tree without expert opinion.

I'd like to end on something positive, so repeating what one optimistic soul said to me, 'then again, now I can plant all those things I couldn't before because I had no room'.

CRESWICK WARD UPDATE



CRESWICK STORM

Council is continuing to support recovery efforts following the thunderstorm that damaged homes and property in and around Creswick and Clunes on 5 January.

The clean-up work will likely take months and result in around \$10 million of damage to Council assets alone and around \$25 million damage to crops. Close to 150 homes were damaged in the storm, including 35 partially destroyed or uninhabitable.

If your home or property was damaged from the storm please get in touch with our Storm Recovery Team on (03) 4373 7373 so the damage can be registered. This may assist with ongoing support. The team can advise on available social, emotional and financial assistance and can arrange a Secondary Impact Assessment on private property.



HELP FOR RATEPAYERS

If you are having difficulty paying your rates please contact Council so we can review your situation and come up with a plan. We may be able to assist ratepayers by a deferral of rates (not waiving of rates), arranging payment plans and interest not being charged on the outstanding current amount.

If your property was severely damaged and is inhabitable due to the recent storm, Council can have the property revalued which may reduce the rates for the current year.

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




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MUSIC IN THE COMMUNITY MORE EXCITING NEWS FROM CRESFEST

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


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

100 Years Ago

February 3, 1922

Cricket- Creswick V Tourello — Creswick travel to Tourello tomorrow to open the second round for the season. Players are requested to be at the post office corner at 1.45 o'clock sharp, Creswick's team is as follows — Oswin, Rev. F. H. Ingamells, harridge, Morton, McNicol, Renouf, Bowley (2), Ewert, Pat Cushing, Coulson. Emergencies — Fred Ewert, Peters.

February 7, 1922

As the appeal ends next Friday for Princess Mary's wedding gift, the Mayoress (Mrs. W. P. Northcott) will be glad to receive all contributions not later than that day. They may be left at the town hall or at her residence.

February 10, 1922

Allendale – the flight of an aeroplane from the direction of Ballarat, and the unaccustomed noise of the propeller, awakened the town on Wednesday morning as the machine circled around, and after hovering around for a brief space of time, it flew away northwards. It is rarely that an aeroplane visits here, and the citizens always display curiosity, even if they have to sacrifice sleep.

February 14, 1922

Master Ronald Giles, of Long Point, has succeeded in gaining a scholarship, which will entitle him to a three

years' course at the Dookie Agricultural College. The lad is a scholar at the Creswick State School, No. 122, of which Mr. David Dimsey is the head teacher. Master Giles can be congratulated on his success.

February 17, 1922

Borough of Creswick – Applications are invited and will be received up till 5 p.m. on Tuesday, 14th March, 1922, for leasing the Residence and Grounds at Park Lake, with privileges, at a rental of 10/- per week, for a term of 12 months. Particulars at the town hall. Arthur B. Grose, town clerk.

February 24, 1922

Dean – The local young men have recently formed a cricket club, and there is every indication of the season proving a most successful and enjoyable one. Much interest has been evinced by the skilful batting and able bowling displayed by some the older enthusiasts of the game.

February 28, 1922

Creswick Junior Football Club – All persons desirous of forming a Creswick Junior Football Club are requested to attend a Meeting to be held at W. Lawrie's Tea Rooms at 7 p.m. sharp Next Saturday, March 4th. A. Goates, G. T. Praetz, Convenors.

I started writing this on Boxing Day, December 26, 2021. It is four o'clock in the afternoon – cool and breezy. Sitting on my own handmade bench next to my veggie garden, I am looking at one of my many ornamental garden rocks, one that I picked up roadside not

far from Maryborough. It is an ancient pebble conglomerate, probably formed in the bed of a long-disappeared river eons ago.

As I sit here listening to my veggies grow and rocks telling me stories of the old days, I can't help but think ... how lucky am I. The native garden that I planted is now pretty mature, full of light and shade, colour and movement – much as a painting should be.

I moved to Creswick from St Kilda five and a half years ago and now I own all this — my house, my garden and the birds in it, my view to Springmount. Oh, so very wrong. I own nothing beyond my thoughts. All the material things are not mine. I do have custody and enjoyment of them for this brief time, that is all. My house, my car, my books and record collections, my artworks. One day someone else will have that enjoyment and responsibility. I just happened to be here, without rhyme or reason, to be born in this country and with loving parents. I could have just as easily



been born anywhere – Alaska, Mongolia, Mali or Haiti. I just happened to have parents who supported me to follow my artist path, (against their rational financial arguments I might add).

I could have fallen to Earth absolutely anywhere, like a

meteorite or a leaf blown on the wind.

Fast forward to me writing this now, late January 2022. Our beloved Creswick has been battered and bruised by the storms and floods. My veggie garden from Boxing Day now looks like a rotting coleslaw, everything cut to ribbons by that unbelievable hail storm. That said, I got off pretty lightly with minimal damage to my house. My heart truly goes out to all those so badly affected.

My Melbourne exhibition that was to be early last September, then late September, then February this year, is now postponed yet again till August, thanks to COVID-19. Never mind, it will happen in its own good time. I still count myself lucky to be here. This is Creswick, not Syria or Afghanistan.

Not a single day goes by when I see a fallen leaf and I think – that is me. I landed here. How lucky I am ... sheer luck.
