Australian Chamber Choir





Volunteering at Visitor Information Centres is a rewarding activity, and visitors appreciate having a friendly face when they need to find their way. For volunteers it is a chance to meet people and share the delights of their district. From time to time Visitor Information Centre volunteers get the opportunity to sample the offerings of local tourist attractions. Familiarisation tours known as 'Famils', these outings provide volunteers with insights to pass on to visitors. At the end of January, the Hepburn Shire Visitor Services Team organised a fabulous 'Famil', involving the Daylesford Spa Country Railway (DSCR) and *Musk Farm*.

About forty-two volunteers from Clunes, Creswick, Daylesford and Woodend/Macedon Visitor Information Centres, gathered at the historic Daylesford railway station in time for morning tea then boarded the Silver Streak, an air-conditioned diesel rail car, for the trip to Bullarto and *Musk Farm*.

Stuart, from the DSCR, briefed the volunteers on the history and operation of the DSCR. The experience offered by the DSCR is based around an operational museum with a theme of railmotors in Victorian railways and their benefits to the community. The Sunday markets and train trips to Bullarto are popular activities drawing crowds from all over. The historic railmotor trips and markets operate every Sunday except Christmas Day.

As the Sliver Streak leaves Daylesford it seems to rock and roll more than streak; adding to the charm and nostalgia of the experience. The seating is comfortable, and the airconditioning a relief on such a hot day. On board there is

plenty of lively chatter and stories from those who have experienced a trip on the DSCR previously. Jenny, the guard, talks to us about the monthly all-inclusive Silver Streak Food and Wine train. With some lively music and plenty of food and drink this sounds like a great start to a Saturday night. (Make sure you have a designated driver on return.)

After twenty minutes rolling through the picturesque country side Bullarto was reached. While the crew made the train ready for the return journey to Musk, volunteers enjoyed the shady trees in the station grounds and inspected the various faithfully restored station buildings.

Musk Farm, once a small country school, was transformed into the stately manor it is today by well-known interior designer Stuart Rattle between 1998 and 2013. The three-and-a-half-acre property has been extensively landscaped into fourteen garden rooms. Splitting into two groups



volunteers were guided around the property including Musk Studio, by current owners Cathy and Mike, who clearly love this property and all it has to offer.

A delightful lunch was provided finished off with freshly made scones and the obligatory jam and cream.

During lunch, *Chill Out Festival* organisers gave a talk on this year's festival arrangements.

The visit concluded with a tour of the cottage. In both the cottage and the Studio building Stuart's abilities as a leading interior designer are on display with some exquisite examples of his work.

Unfortunately, the visit to this beautiful property with its shady gardens and friendly hosts was over all too soon and it was time to return to the Musk Station where the Silver Streak was waiting for the return trip to Daylesford.

This was a great day out with an opportunity to meet volunteers from neighbouring centres and to become familiar with some of the fabulous local attractions.

Shannon's Bridge and the End of Life Care Hub



For most people, talking about death and dying is just too hard. Most of us can't even say the words – the 'D' word, passed away, passed on, met his maker, and so on. This is what Shannon's Bridge means by 'death literacy'. Shannon's Bridge is a volunteer run charity whose aim is to change attitudes about death and dying, and to help families and patients to connect with existing palliative care services or help build new services where gaps exist.

Jeremy McKnight is one of four Directors of Shannon's Bridge. He is passionate about the aims of Shannon's Bridge, and his empathy for all those who are dealing with illness, dying and loss shines through his every eloquent word.

After Jeremy brought his terminally ill daughter Shannon home in 2016, he made contact with local doctor, Claire Hepper, who took care of her in her last days. During this time, the McKnights came to understand that despite the existence of amazing palliative care services in the wider community, there was often gaps between agencies and sometimes boundary issues. For instance, some services are only available Monday to Friday with no after hours cover. This is just a reflection of how thinly stretched our palliative care service workforce is across Victoria.

For patients and families, there is clearly a need for 24-hour advice during a sad and sometimes scary time when their loved one is dying. Before she died, Shannon made her dad promise that he would help Doctors Claire Hepper and Allison O'Neill to continue with their work in trying to provide easy and co-ordinated assistance for patients and

families with home-based care at the end of life.

During the subsequent two-year period, as well as linking with the brilliant established organisations and services, many individuals were also identified by Shannon's Bridge who could help with those little things that make big differences to the families affected. This is how the End of Life Hub came to be at 94 Albert Street, Creswick (Dr Brian Hepper's old surgery) — a place where social and practical assistance can be found in a one-stop shop.

Shannon's Packs were one of their first initiatives — a package of emergency symptom relief items first designed by Claire and Allison for Shannon, to help family members cope until the next visit from a doctor or nurse or the next visit to a pharmacy. A doctor or nurse will go through the contents of the pack with family and patients, showing them how to administer medication and assist with other needs to make their patient comfortable. The pack comes with 24-hour phone assistance.

During 2018 Shannon's Bridge obtained State funding to provide Shannon's Packs state wide and is now working with Queensland Health as well.

The need for respite care for families and loved ones has also been identified as an issue. So Shannon's Bridge recruits and trains volunteers on the Compassionate Communities model. Compassionate Communities is an international movement that aims to build community capacity to support people approaching the end of their

lives. Compassionate communities recognise that caring for one another at times of health crisis and personal loss is not solely a task for health and social services, but is everyone's responsibility.

This is not a new idea – in days gone by, when people were connected to smaller communities, when a neighbour was dying, the whole village would help. As society has changed and people have become more reliant on centralized services, people still need help, but don't know who to ask or where to go.

Shannon's Bridge volunteers, through the End of Life Care Hub, can be that connection. Depending on their individual skills and preferences, volunteers can provide respite for families, help with shopping, help with household chores, taking patients to appointments and so on.

Many of the volunteers have been through these experiences themselves but not all. The common denominators are compassion and a desire to make a difference. As Jeremy points out: '95 per cent of the little jobs they do make all the difference.' Nalina Phillips, Administrative Officer of Shannon's Bridge, is always looking for more volunteers. Interested individuals can contact her on 0419 844 823.

Can people from the community contribute in any other way? 'Absolutely' states Nalina.

'We are so open to just about everything and anything...if people want to donate money they can, which can easily be done via our website. They can create a fundraiser for us with whatever creative idea they have!'

'Businesses can offer their services. In fact when it comes time for us to do our garden we will be looking for landscapers! We recently had a business offer to do some professional videoing for us as an example. And if people have medical aides at home that are in good working condition and no longer needed, such as wheelchairs, shower seats, and so on, they can donate them to us for our 'equipment loan' program.'

The Hub has a very fluid business model – whatever people need at one of the most important and stressful times of their lives, they can provide it. Through their equipment pool items can be sourced and delivered to families and patients at very short notice.

The Hub provides other services currently with more on the way:

- Pet Therapy is offered through Delta Dogs, using dogs to offer calming, friendly companionship.
- Assist with the development of an Advanced Care Directive. Death is a taboo subject but it is clear that eventually everyone must think about it and discuss their wishes with family members, otherwise it can become a cause of conflict and extra stress. Since new legislation came into being last March, all medical organisations

must take notice of patients' wishes where there is an Instructional Directive.

Jeremy and Nalina explain that whilst there is good medical support for people before they die, there is no co-ordinated ongoing support for carers after their loved one is gone. Shannon's Bridge recognises that grief cannot be defined by the book – there is no one-year cycle, and everyone deals with loss in their own way. So the Hub provides a bright, welcoming and safe space for anyone to drop in.

No appointment is necessary. All are welcomed by Nalina or Simon (Admin Assistant) for a chat and a cuppa. They can discuss treatments or road blocks. People come in to leave items and photos of their loved ones. The whole backyard behind the office will eventually be given over to horticultural therapy.

There is no single source of referrals to their services. Local GPs spread the word as well as social media. Nalina is very busy reaching out to the local community, and they have had great local support. Businesses have been dropping into the Hub and asking what they could do for them.

Volunteers from the Creswick Football Netball Club, for instance, have provided a younger demographic of volunteers who are able to assist with some of the more physically demanding jobs such as gardening and mowing.

Shannon's Bridge has recently organised events such as the Day of the Dead – a traditional holiday and celebration in Mexico on 1 and 2 November – providing a lively and colourful outlet to get people to come in and ask what the Hub is all about. On Sunday, 2 December a *Shannon's Pack Ride* was organised by the Red Knights 15 motorcycle group.

There is nothing else like Shannon's Bridge in Victoria – their point of difference is that they can link all local medical and community services together. Jeremy is passionate about this: 'Our aim is to support other towns and communities to do this all around Victoria.' The Lions organisation is assisting with the provision of skills and equipment in other regional areas of the State.

Shannon's Bridge will be conducting education and information sessions this year (dates still to be advised) with titles such as Advance Care Directives Explained, Funeral Care Choices, and Talking the D Word in Your Community. These will be promoted closer to the date through their social media accounts - Facebook, Instagram - shannonsbridge, and Twitter - ShannonsBridge1, as well as through their website: *shannonsbridge.com* and flyers posted on local noticeboards.

It is truly a testament to Shannon, to her family, to doctors like Claire Hepper, and to the local community, that a unique and vital organisation such as Shannon's Bridge has taken root and is flourishing here in Creswick.

The Creswick Cemetery Trust is seeking expressions of interest from suitably qualified members of the community who would be interested in becoming honorary trust members. Women and those from a diverse background are actively encouraged to seek appointment to ensure that the trust's membership accurately reflects the composition of the community it serves.

Cemetery trust members are appointed by the Governor in Council for a term of up to five years and are responsible to the Minister for Health for the proper and efficient management of the public cemeteries under the control of the trust, including the provision of future cemeteries services and the preservation of local history.

Being appointed to a cemetery trust provides successful applicants with a unique opportunity to develop their competencies as a board member. In addition, the Department of Health and Human Services provides free governance training to all trust members.


Current and previous cemetery trust members may apply for reappointment as part of a competitive selection process.

Creswick and Smeaton cemeteries receive maintenance funding

Creswick and Smeaton cemeteries have been awarded over \$24,000 as part of a State Government investment to ensure the final resting places of our loved ones are maintained in a respectful manner.

Announcing the grants, the Member for Western Victoria, Jaala Pulford, said the funds would be used to improve facilities at the two cemeteries.

The funding includes:

- \$12,000 for Creswick Cemetery Trust to repair heritage gates.
- \$12,200 for Smeaton Cemetery Trust for a geophysical survey.

The two grants are amongst seventy across Victoria to small rural cemeteries to help provide much-needed equipment or assist with carrying out maintenance projects. The grants recognise the significance a cemetery holds within local communities, and the need to keep the facilities well maintained and make them as welcoming as possible.



Creswick – Smeaton RSL is Turning 100

At a meeting held in the Bank Chambers in Creswick on 13 March, 1919 it was decided to form a branch of the Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial League of Australia. The meeting was attended by a large number of World War I veterans. The Reverend Frank H. Ingamells, who was a Chaplain Major in the AIF and had also served at Gallipoli, was elected as the first president of the Creswick RSSILA. Committee members were H Symonds, H Praetz, G Cawthan, H V Malone, F and V James, A Talk, A Wright, W Sherriff and J Keating. The Charter for Creswick Returned Sailors and Soldiers Imperial League of Australia was signed on 19 March, 1919.

To commemorate this event there will be a gathering at the RSL Hall at 2.00pm on Sunday, 17 March 2019. Any interested residents and any known descendants of the WWI veterans are invited to attend. Refreshments will be served to celebrate the birthday.

THE ART OF LIVING

Memory is a funny thing. It is strange which memories present themselves, and why.

Sometimes for me it may be a piece of music, a smell, a taste, even a particular colour or shape that reminds me of someone or something from my past.

I have been spending a lot of time recently in my studio preparing works for another exhibition in Melbourne this coming May. Yesterday I turned away from the painting on the easel for a moment to clean my brushes. As I did so my gaze wandered through my large studio window to the two snowgums I planted when I arrived in Creswick in June 2016. I thought about how well they had grown – taller than my windows now. They have been so fascinating to explore; they are a great attraction for all manner of jewel-like bugs and birds. The lines of their branches are beautiful, their rounded leaves exquisite. There is something 'clean' and elegant about them, not overly complicated.

What I did not expect were the associated memories that came flooding in – and why. All of a sudden I was transported to a time and place nearly twenty years ago when my wife and I were living in France. I had always held deep interest in the art and architecture from the Romanesque period – the tenth to twelfth centuries. I used to visit as many of these historic sites as I could find in our area of Provence. As my interest, and my knowledge grew, so did my focus. I became especially interested in the three Cistercian abbeys in Provence. The simple, elegant forms and colours of my snowgums for me had a direct connection to my medieval abbeys.

The Cistercian monks were an off-shoot from the Benedictine Order in the 11th century in France. Their buildings reflect their belief in a simple, quiet and ordered life. Their abbeys are sublime. They lack ornamentation — no stained glass windows representing biblical scenes. No sculptures. Each room manifests a simple purity of stone and light in perfect harmony.

From a distance, the Cistercian abbeys are almost hidden in the landscape. They were often built in valleys - to encourage the monks to look up, not around. As you approach, the buildings look like they are part of the surrounding countryside, like they have always been there. It is an architecture that invites silence and contemplation. In the Benedictine Rule, written in the 6th century, it states: 'The disciple's part is to be silent and to listen'. Shouldn't we all do a bit more of that?

Now my snowgums help to take me to that space daily ... and I look up!

February 4, 1919

Those desirous of learning the rudiments of nursing in this serious time of epidemic are invited to interview Matron McDonald at the Creswick District Hospital, and she will be willing to arrange for instruction in practical nursing, at suitable times, so that the district will be better equipped in that respect.

February 7, 1919

A meeting will be held in the bank chambers tomorrow (Saturday) evening at 8 o'clock, to appoint officials and make final arrangements for the aquatic carnival, to be held in aid of the Creswick District Hospital, on Saturday, 15th inst., at Calembeen Park.

February 11, 1919

Smeaton - Innoculation- about sixty persons, ranging in ages from 2 years to 80, were inoculated with an influenza vaccine by Dr. Wilson, the health officer of the shire, last Thursday afternoon.

February 14, 1919

Ti Tree nursery Smeaton- Charles Whatmore begs to announce that he has taken over the above well known Nursery on lease, and is prepared to supply Fruit, Shrubs, Tree plants, &c., direct to the public. Customers are asked to deal personally with the lessee, Charles Whatmore, Ti Tree Nursery, Smeaton.

February 18, 1919

Sir Alexander Peacock, M.L.A., has been informed by the Mines department that a sum of £92/10/ has been allocated to the party working the reef in Sonsee's paddock at Springmount. This grant is on the pound for pound basis, and is to enable the party to continue operations that have been very favourably reported on. Residents of the district hope that success will attend the efforts of the party.

February 21, 1919

Diamond Wedding- Whitely- Fitzpatrick- on the 21st February, 1859, at Scot's Church Sydney, by the Rev. John Reid, Joseph Lester Whiteley to Rosa, second daughter of Daniel Fitzpatrick.

Present address- Hollinwood.

February 25, 1919

After a lapse of four years, the rural competitions previously conducted by the Smeaton Agricultural Society have been renewed. The judging of the potato field competition took place on Saturday last under ideal conditions, as the weather was delightful and the crops under review were looking vastly improved by the recent copious rainfall.


