Two Peas in a Pod Heather Leishman and Laurel James

If you thought that Heather Leishman and the late Laurel James were sisters, you are not the only one. They considered themselves sisters, and treasured their relationship, in spite of the fact that Laurel was Heather's aunt by marriage.

Heather James was born at Springmount the daughter of Leslie Robert (Bob) James and

Clara Merle Sonsee. She grew up between the Murphy's and the Flynn's. When Heather was twelve the family moved 'lock, stock and barrel' to Creswick. The home still sits proudly on the rise at 103 Albert Street in the heritage listed garden planted by Heather's father.

Laurel was born in Creswick in 1927 and died on 5 September 2017. Laurel was the second child of Herbert George and Margaret Anella Mitchell. Much of her childhood was spent in Smeaton before moving to Kingston where her dad and mum ran a small farm. Laurel attended Kingston Primary School.

On 28 January 1950 Laurel married Ray James the younger brother of Heather's father. Heather was Laurel's bridesmaid. Ray was fondly known as Skip to his family and Unc to everyone else. Laurel and Ray took up residence in the old Kingston school house and later built a home at the Smeaton end of town where they raised their family of five.

In 1957 Heather married Arthur Leishman, a Kingston farmer. They moved to the Old Bank House in Kingston, formerly the Australasian Bank and later the shop. Here they raised their family of three. Arthur farmed and Heather ran the business. Heather was fondly known as the Mayoress of Kingston, named by Bernie Charleston. In 1987 they moved to live at the farm house at the corner of Kingston Road and Alcorns Road. When asked what it was like living in the Avenue Heather replied, 'I loved the wonderful views and the different seasons, especially autumn. It is a very peaceful place and I have always loved trees.'

Heather's affinity with trees started at an early age. Her father worked for the Forestry Commission. Her mother's brother Allan Sonsee, a renowned botanist, lived over the road at Springmount and planted an arboretum. Young Heather was his keen assistant and she recalls her mother saying, 'You watch her Allan! Don't let her stand on a snake!'

Heather and Laurel both created beautiful gardens. Many plants were started from cuttings shared by others. Laurel always had a pair of secateurs in her hand bag. Unc was renowned for his vegetable patch, whilst Arthur was a broad acre 'gardener' growing potatoes and crops. They all

encouraged others to become gardeners and to grow ornamental and edible plants. Simone Broad. Laurel's granddaughter of Creswick Flowers at Olicartia, is testimony to her enthusiastic encouragement.

As young mothers Heather and Laurel both became involved in the community and continued this voluntary work throughout

their lives. Amongst other community groups both were members of the school Mother's Club, Youth Group, Kingston Hall Committee, Sunday School, and Red Cross. Heather was the Treasurer of the Kingston Red Cross for seventeen years. Then there was involvement with the Newlyn Football and Netball Club and the Kingston Tennis Club as the children grew up. Laurel judged the flowers at the Kingston Show for many years and the Leishman Cup was proudly presented to the exhibitors of the Champion Clydesdale.

Heather supported Arthur in his role as Lieutenant of the Kingston Fire Brigade for many years. She was the voice at the end of the telephone line in the event of a fire, before electronic alert systems. She also cleaned the CFA for many years. Laurel was ever present at the Kingston Primary School either as a guest at Special Person's Day or assisting with the reading program. Heather was involved in organizing ANZAC Day services engaging the primary school and RSL.

In early 1999 a new opportunity came along to make a difference in their community. Heather and Laurel became founding members of Friends of the Avenue that formed as a subcommittee of the Kingston Community Recreation Centre. The group set about raising funds and awareness to begin urgent restoration work. Laurel's uncles, Francis and William Mitchell and Heather's great uncles Arthur Sonsee and Charles Sonsie are commemorated in the Avenue. When asked about the difference in spelling of the surnames, Heather suggested it was misread hand writing.

Laurel later moved to Creswick where she became a volunteer at the Creswick Visitor Information Centre. Heather moved to Creswick to care for her parents where she continued her Red Cross involvement. In 2014 when Kingston Friends of the Avenue regrouped and became an incorporated body, Heather was and is still there.

The legacy of these two women serves as an example to others. It is possible to make a difference in a community with dedication, commitment and vision. It also helps when you have a friend you can rely on and be honest with.

THE ART OF LIVING

The volcanoes Wow!

I wish I could have been here in the time our volcanoes were active. It must have been a spectacular sight.

I am standing by the side of the road drawing Mt Kooroocheang in front of me and Mt Moorookyle behind me, just 20km north of Creswick. My pencil traces across the delicate, sensual lines of this landscape. I look around and see gentle bumps rising from the plains in every direction. I see the serene patchwork of fencelines separating crops from pasture, and beautiful chocolate coloured freshly ploughed fields. It all looks so gentle and peaceful.

Hard to believe it wasn't always so.

Once this landscape would have been violent, noisy and toxic. These now long dead volcanoes were spewing ash and poisonous gases into the air. Most of these hills – Mt Moorookyle behind me, Kangaroo Hills near the volcanic maar (lake) we now call Hepburn Lagoon – were scoria cones, mainly froth and bubbles. Some, like Kooroocheang, also had lava flows that shaped the country, and gave us the rich volcanic soils we now farm.

Major Mitchell, passing through this district in 1836 also noted the patchwork landscape of the 'Mammaloid Hills' as he called them. For countless generations the Dja Dja Wurrung had been fire farming here, creating a mixture of grasslands and forest to generate the best food resources. I can only wonder at their understanding of these volcanoes and the stories generated by them. Many of our local eruptions were well within recent human history.

Unfortunately, the historical violence of this district was not only geological.

Over Christmas 1839 a massacre of six Dja Dja Wurrung men occurred not far from Clunes at Blood Hole on Middle Creek – part of a larger plan to drive the aboriginals off what was then becoming pastoral land.

When I am drawing those ancient redgums along the spectacular gorge area of Tullaroop Creek my mind wanders to those who walked, camped and fished here long before me.

That is how it should be. When we draw, or paint, or take a photograph, or write a postcard or a poem, we should always allow room in our thoughts for the past, the present, and of course – the future – to make the picture complete.



'Mammaloid Hills' view looking north from Springhill. Mount Kooroocheang on right



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

100 years ago

January 4, 1918

The King's Call to Prayer – Town Hall, Creswick. A special service will be held on Sunday, January 6th, 1918 (Next Sunday) at 3.30 pm. A preliminary meeting to make all arrangements will be held in the Bank Chambers TO-NIGHT, at 8 o'clock. All interested are urged to attend. T. A. Wilson, Mayor

January 8, 1918

Borough of Creswick – Tenders will be received until 5 pm on Monday, 14th instant, for the erection of a Bathroom at the Caretaker's Residence, Botanical Reserve, Creswick. Specifications may be seen at the Town Hall. Arthur B. Grose, Town Clerk. Town Hall, Creswick, 7-1-18.

January 11, 1918

Allendale – Vital Statistics – The local vital statistics for 1917 have been compiled by the local registrar, and the births registered were males 3, females 11, total 14; which is a slight increase on the previous year. The deaths registered were males 3, females 4, total 7; all of whom were adults of mature age; indicating the general good health of the community.

January 15, 1918

A meeting to arrange for the annual Easter Monday sports at Creswick will be held at St. Augustines' hall tomorrow (Wednesday) evening at 8 o'clock, when all interested are invited to attend. It is hoped that there will be a large attendance, for these are the only sports held in the town during the year.

January 18, 1918

Cr. Fred H. Carter, of Dean, a member of the Creswick Shire Council, has been appointed a justice of the peace for the Southern Bailiwick. Once again the shire council is composed of nine honorary magistrates.

January 22, 1918

A social will take place in the Creswick A.N.A. Hall next Thursday night to celebrate the recent "No" victory. Dancing will be indulged in till 2 am. All are welcome.

January 25, 1918

Blampied- Race Club meeting – members of the Blampied Race Club are requested to attend a meeting of the club, to be held at La Franchi's Hotel, Blampied, tomorrow (Saturday) evening at 8 o'clock in order that arrangements can be made for the annual St. Patrick's Day races. Permission has been obtained from the department to run the race meeting.

January 28, 1918

The fire bells of the town were rung early on Saturday afternoon, the cause being a grass fire in the vicinity of Red Streak. Several paddocks were burnt over before the conflagration was stayed, and over 100 acres of grass was destroyed by the flames

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
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PAVILION ARTS Memorable 2018 To Come

Paying Respect - **Gilbert Joseph Brinsden** Extract from speech given by Geoffrey Tisdall Remembrance Day 2017 at Kingston War Memorial Service





The Avenue of Honour, Kingston, Victoria 286 Elm Trees planted 1918 Tree West 16 commemorates GILBERT JOSEPH BRINSDEN Bom Kingston 5 June 1878 – Died 12 October 1917 Paschendale, Flanders, Belgium

Every elm tree with a bronze plaque in this beautiful Avenue of Honour can tell a story. Tree West 16 represents the life of my maternal grandfather's brother, Gilbert Joseph Brinsden, who perished at Paschendale in Belgium exactly 99 years and one month ago. Gilbert had enlisted the previous year leaving the family business in Kingston in the hands of his brother Arnold – who had become the Shire Rate Collector. It was a General Store in which their father Samuel had been involved since the 1860s. It was sold soon after the War, but the shop and the residence next door burnt down in 1920. The residence was called *Devonia* and these fertile hills reminded their father of his birthplace – Devon in England. No doubt he would have approved of these grand elm trees.

Gilbert's sister Jane made copies of his letters home and sent them to various family members. His last letter home five days before he died begins, 'My dear ones at home,' and says at one point, 'The more I see of war, the more I am convinced that some other means of settling international differences will have to be found'. And a bit further on, 'I thank God most sincerely that I have come through so far and trust that He will continue to watch over me throughout this trying time.' He concludes, 'Much love and affection to you all. Your loving brother Bert'.

The final resting place of Gilbert, or Bert as his family knew him, is unknown. As his company advanced, a shell exploded and a fragment severed one of Gilbert's arms. A couple of contemporary accounts survive. Private Charles Sharp stated, 'He was wounded in the arm very badly going over in the morning in the attack at Passchendale. I was acting as runner. At about 4.00pm I was back behind our original line and saw Brinsden's body lying on a stretcher. He had evidently died when being carried down to the D(ressing) S (tation)'. L/Cpl J McIntyre was alongside Brinsden when he was wounded in the morning. I have heard him speak of it, . . I know nothing of Brinsden's burial.' Private Ben Buchanan stated, 'I saw Brinsden after he was dead (he was my friend) . . . He was buried at Passchendale'.

Various family members have visited that battleground and witnessed moving Remembrance ceremonies and have been pleased to see on the Menen Gate Memorial, (Ypres, Belgium), the name of Gilbert Brinsden. Here at home the family had to settle for an inscription at the family plot in the Creswick Cemetery as well as a tree in this Avenue. Not long after the news of the death of Gilbert, his sister Jean wrote to my grandfather in Mildura, 'It is terrible to me that dear bright fellow will never come back to us again'. She went on to reflect, '.... I am sure he went because it was his duty'.

Grace Buchanan

A memorial for former resident, Grace Buchanan was held at St. John's Anglican Church in Creswick during December following her recent death. A long term resident Grace had moved to Melbourne about ten years ago to be close to

family. Grace's story appeared in the November 2000 issue of the CDN.

Grace grew up in Beaufort and lived in Hamilton before returning to her childhood home where she was the Physical Education teacher at the local high school until retirement. Her training in PE at Melbourne University also demonstrated her determination. Grace had flat feet and one of her lecturers told her class that people with flat feet cannot jump. Not only did Grace jump, she ran, swam and played netball (basketball then) and tennis.

Grace Buchanan's petite stature belied her strength, determination and commitment. She was widowed when her four children were young and each of their successes are a reflection of their proud mother. Grace continued

to confound others with her experience at the Sydney Olympics in 2000 where she had an hour's walk to and from work as a volunteer each day.

Since her retirement, Grace has travelled extensively and worked as a Volunteer for Isolated Student's Education in Outback Queensland. She was no greenhorn at the computer, having attended classes at Creswick Adult Learning Centre (now Creswick Neighbourhood Centre). Read on for her recollections of a marvellous experience as a volunteer at the Sydney Olympics.

My Olympic Experience by Grace Buchanan

(Article originally published in CDN in November 2000)

'OH SYD-E-NEY, how you did us proud! From Fanfare to Fireworks, from Harbour to Homebush, from Hockey to Humble Handball from Veteran to Volunteer (in some cases synonymous!) it was MAGNIFICENT.

As one of the latter (volunteer/veteran) I will savour this experience! However, I must admit that it meant sacrificing my usual occupation during Olympic or any other big sports event, of being a couch potato! That was a big sacrifice for me!

Therapy

(twenty cents) and attending the Opening Ceremony in Montreal in 1976 cost U.S. \$20.00, the original information that tickets for Sydney events could be in the hundreds of dollars, the only way I could BE THERE, was to be a Volunteer. And so, the long operation began.

What motivated me to apply to become a volunteer?

Having been in Melbourne for the 1956 Games, where, the

programme for the Opening Ceremony cost two shillings

I first applied in October 1998, then waited and waited. Months later, my application was acknowledged and the process was in train. Next, was to organize accommodation which resulted in my staying with an old friend from primary school days. So, she too, became a volunteer - one of the thousands of unsung heroes of the Games, doing exactly that - housing volunteers from interstate - no uniform, no free travel, none of the excitement of participation - just the

same old household duties of cooking, shopping, washing, ironing. I salute you all.

At last, after much to-ing and fro-ing including two visits to Melbourne, I was appointed an 'Accreditation Officer', for the duration. Then came a trip to Sydney to collect my uniform and at last check out the place where I would be working. That served to quell the nervousness I was feeling about what I had taken on! According to authorities, the average age of Volunteers was 60+. However, I met many young people on the job, some of whom had come from overseas simply to be a volunteer.

My training at the Computer began on my first duty day, 15 September, 2000. My instructors/supervisors had been working in the back-rooms of power since May. They had me working (fairly) confidently by the end of the day. The venue known as the U.D.A.C. (Uniform Distribution and Accreditation Centre) in Redfern, was a marvellous cavernous old brick building which was a dis-used Railway Workshop, transformed by temporary walls, beautifully carpeted floors, cardboard office furniture, dividing it into multiple computer bays.

All history now - I enjoyed it all.'

Locals Warned Against Hopburn Mozzies These Summer Holidays

Residents and visitors to Western Victoria are reminded to take precautions during summer to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes.

While the higher numbers of mosquitoes during summer are mostly a nuisance factor, some mosquitoes can transmit diseases such as Ross River Virus and Barmah Forest Virus diseases.

Local councils and the Department of Health and Human Services have programs in place to monitor and, where needed, reduce mosquito numbers.

Mosquitoes are at their most active at dawn and dusk, although some species can be present and bite throughout the day.

Residents can remain protected by:

- · Fitting insect screens to doors and windows, and ensuring they are in good condition.
- · Wearing long, loose-fitting clothing and using a suitable insect repellent containing picaridin or DEET as an active ingredient on exposed skin areas.
- Using mosquito nets at night, while camping, in your tent or cabin, and using mosquito coils in the outside small enclosed areas of your accommodation.

It is also important to get rid of stagnant water around homes and campsites. Mosquitoes can breed in any receptacle that can hold water including old tyres and rubbish, poorly maintained swimming pools, unsealed water tanks and pot plant holders and animal drinking containers.

Support for Mums and Bubs **Affected by Family Violence**

The State Government is increasing support for new mothers and their babies experiencing family violence through extra Maternal and Child Health (MHC) service consultations and nurse training.

An additional \$11 million has been announced for extra consultations that will benefit women and children in Western Victoria experiencing, or at risk of, family violence.

In an Australian first, a statewide rollout has allowed MCH nurses to provide additional outreach visits to those at risk of family violence, with the new funding estimated to provide up to 12,000 hours of additional service.

Given discussing family violence with women can be difficult due to the presence of a partner, or insufficient time, the additional consultations will allow discussions to take place at a time and place that suits the mother and her kids. MCH nurses will be provided with professional development and support so they can confidently discuss family violence with parents, assess risk, and respond in a timely and meaningful way.




