A ROSE BY ANY OTHER NAME – KRISTY TIPPETT





On first meeting, you just know that Kristy Tippett must be a strong and caring mother and businesswoman, and further acquaintance can only confirm those first impressions. Kristy is the owner and operator of Soho Rose Farm – set amongst the rich volcanic soil and heritage sheds of a fifth generation potato, cattle and cropping farm in Dean.

When the owners of a rose farm in Drysdale (near Geelong) decided to retire in 2018, rather than allowing them to be bulldozed, Kristy arranged for 9,000 roses to be dug up and replanted at her and her husband's Dean property in the space of one and a half weeks. The roses were heavily pruned before being transplanted with the help of a rose-digging machine borrowed from the old Tangled Maze property, and a crew of people waiting at their property to replant them. After allowing the plants to settle in from May to October 2018, Kristy was able to gather her first harvest in the spring and summer of 2018/2019.

After working as a florist in Melbourne for many years, and with her many contacts in the industry, Kristy was happy that Soho's long-standing reputation in the cut flower industry was such that, after she took it over, she was able to continue supplying to the same wholesalers in Melbourne. Kristy commented, '*It was a seamless transition*'.

Since then, Kristy has planted over 5,000 more roses. The business now employs six regular staff who tackle the pruning, maintenance and harvesting, depending on the time of year. Picking is all done before 9.00am during the season.

Unfortunately, at the start of the pandemic, Kristy was in the middle of her second harvest and was left with no-one to buy her stock. So she joined with Gorgi Coghlan of the Provincial Hotel, the Committee for Ballarat and Leadership

Ballarat, to organise free bunches of flowers for health workers, nursing homes and other worthy recipients in the Ballarat region.

In the meantime, Kristy admits that the effects of the pandemic shutdown have not been all bad. It has allowed her time to expand into planting other flowers such as dahlias, zinnias and cosmos, and to trial other varieties of roses. Her main varieties at the moment are David Austin roses and Hybrid Teas – ideal for cut flowers. Kristy is looking forward to the season this year, 'but it depends on how soon the events and weddings industry gets back to normal'.

Last year, Soho also took up the opportunity of a donation of 300 heritage roses from the Tangled Maze after its sale to Child and Family Services. They were very old varieties but Kristy is looking forward to seeing how they go. She said, 'The perfume from the older varieties is something else!'

Kristy moved to her husband Brock's family property in 2016. She is very happy to be living in the district now, with her children attending school in Creswick.

'I could never go back to living in Melbourne. I don't know how I did it for so long!'

Long may Kristy and her roses bloom in the district!

Home Learning - Learning Online - Home Schooling - Remote Learning WHICH IS IT?

(While schools handled the situation differently this is one teacher's experience of home learning in another Victorian country town)

Remote Learning or learning from home was a real team effort!

Classroom Teachers, Specialists Teachers, Learning Support Officers, Principals, Leadership Teams and Parents all doing their fair share to make sure that children were being offered a comprehensive curriculum. Ensuring that both children and parents were supported by the school staff.

The I.C.T. Specialists ensured that remote learning tools were ready to go so that children could log on daily including regular individual and small group meetings online. Cleaners did their bit too with extra cleaning to ensure children of essential workers and staff supporting them, were working in an 'ultra clean' environment.

So it was with this 'team effort' that remote or home learning began. Roll Call during lockdown often was a riddle or question. The students would send the answer via the school social media app or Google. From tentative beginnings, schools and caregivers were able to ensure that learning continued as uninterrupted as possible.

Then there was the scheduled MEET or Zoom session, either the whole class or small group ones daily, twice or once a week. These could be accompanied by a video for further clarification. AND... there was ALWAYS the MEET or Zoom session for students who required more individual support.

Resilience vs Anxiety vs Technology support vs Home environment set up.

Correspondence to caregivers pre and during lockdown was constant. Guidelines were offered for the ideal location in the home for students to work; ideally under supervision. Kitchen table, desk in the communal area, study in an open plan setting or bedroom with the door open.

The message clearly and regularly delivered to caregivers was that you are just required to do what you can to support your child with completing tasks and not teaching the learning required.

Technology simply couldn't cut it when it came to the student needing questions answered – only the teacher could respond to them. Therefore it was pertinent that online forums between caregivers and children were regular - including the one to one sessions.

Communication between caregivers and school was vital for the child to experience success and understand what they were learning to do on any given day. W.A.L.T. (What Are Learning To ...)

G.E.M. Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness. (RESILIENCE PROJECT)

Grateful with what you have in this situation. **Empathy** being able to put yourself in other peoples' shoes. Feeling the emotions that they may be feeling, knowing that you can do things for other people. **Mindfulness** is about being calm. Being in the moment. Little things you can do every day to put yourself in a better frame of mind.

Personal Highlight

There were many highlights with my students learning from home. One special highlight for me personally, as a teacher, was when names and addresses of local older people were given to me for my students to write a letter to.

The students shared what it was like for them to be learning from home. The positives and the challenges. The most common ones shared was loving being with family and pets more often and missing being with their friends. They also asked the older person what it was like for them and how they may have felt about being isolated from their normal daily activities. A very rich experience of speedy replies to the students took place by the time they returned to school. I will never forget the delight in their faces as they shared what had been written to them. As a result, communication has continued and the school plans to invite these people to the school's Grandparents' day.

Our school celebrates learning diversity. One of the ways we believe this happens is by encouraging students to participate in activities that is fostered by G.E.M. where possible. These strategies built on children's and caregivers' abilities to cope with the changing learning environment that they found themselves in.

Even though most were home learning, some children were catered for at school. This was done by online learning supervised by teachers and support staff. Services such as speech pathology, occupational therapy, psychological services for children and learning support continued throughout the lockdown.

During and post lockdown presented further requirements. Report writing, teachers recording ongoing anecdotal records, signing off on working from home conditions and looking after their own health and wellbeing. Even though we are all back at school some students remain at home being supported by the school.

Celebrating student learning is a constant in a school setting. With restrictions, **assemblies** still happen but **online**. **Birthdays** are still acknowledged **online with assemblies**. **Learning celebrations** are still shared **online** with home.

School principals and staff had very limited time - as did caregivers, to prepare for remote learning/home learning. School communities are now being praised for their efforts to foster success in learning in these various ways. We, collectively, have now demonstrated that we CAN meet the challenges that epidemics present to us.

CELEBRATING St PIRANS DAY IN CRESWICK Cornish Association of Victoria

The Ballarat branch of the Cornish Association of Victoria chose to visit Creswick during March this year as part of their celebrations for this ancient Celtic saint. Why the choice? History records that this town was founded by some 'warm hearted Cornish Methodists' in the early days of the Gold Rush. In August 1851 the finding of gold was credited to have been at Clunes, nineteen kms to the north of Creswick. Suddenly, what had been a pastoral area became the mecca of a gold-seeking frenzy.

By 1852 it was necessary to appoint a Gold Commissioner on Creswick's Creek, (its original title) and Lieutenant Brackenbury arrived to maintain law and order. To the north of the centre of today's town, is an area known as Red Streak. Here, the early settlers built their first chapel in what is now Johns Road. Those first fossickers had a very successful mining venture –the Red Streak mine. Among them a family of Williams men from Tavistock, Devon. Their father John was Cornish born, his sons Henry, Joseph and Colin were deeply involved in this successful enterprise.

Henry Nankervis, who had built a crude dwelling in Victoria Street, and was ordered by the Government Surveyor, to remove it, to make way for a road, was one of those Methodist founding fathers, as was Benjamin White from Camborne, who had arrived in South Australia in 1847, with his wife Sarah (nee Bailey) and two infant daughters, to work in the copper mines, but came east, in 1854, when gold was the lure.

These men were all familiar with the dangers of underground mining; it is no surprise to find some of them lost their lives in the pursuit of the precious metal. In 1868, Richard Pengelley, aged 37, and his partner James Mann 42, both of Union Hill, were working in a mine, but failed to turn up for their crib break. Their fellow miners went in search of them and found that they had struck a cap-piece, bringing the earth down on them. They had been dead for two hours. They were first cousins and married to two sisters, with four children each. The community rallied around the families and raised money to support the widows. That is what mining communities did to support their fellow workers.

However, the worst gold disaster in Australia was yet to come, and happened not far from that fatal event, on Monday, 12 December, 1882. There is a considerable underground water table in the area which had caused the closure of the Australasian No. 1. Mine. About half a mile further north, a second venture – the Australasian No. 2 mine was working well, but someone made a mistake in the calculation and it was on the early morning shift, on Monday, 12 December, 1882, that two miners broke through into the old workings of the Australasian No.1 and water gushed into the tunnel of No. 2 Mine. The men ran to warn their colleagues, but the force and volume of the water was too great. Some thirty men were working underground that night. Most of them sought refuge in the jump-ups. They clung to air pipes as the water rose.

Desperate measures were put in place. The pumps never stopped working, as loyal workmates did their best to rescue their pals. News of the disaster brought the community to the site, to wait anxiously for news of their loved ones. Bungling at the official level did not help, as extra pumps and hoses arrived, but did not fit the equipment already in place. The foul air in the mine did not give much cause for hope. The men trapped underground, sang hymns to cheer themselves up. One scratched a message on his billy-can for his family and sweetheart. Gradually hope died as men slid guietly into the water and drowned. It was Thursday, before a rescue was made successfully, but too late for twenty two of the miners, seven of whom were Cornishmen: Nathaniel Trescowthick, 45 from Camborne; William Curtis, 42 from Gwennap; William Tregloan, 37 from Marazion; John Henry Crougey, 35 from Stithians; James Mitchell Temby, 35 from Redruth; Thomas Penbertha Chegwin, 31 from Redruth. Abraham Wyatt, 31 born in South Australia to Cornish parents and John Thomas Hodge, 18 born Creswick to Cornish parents.

The whole township mourned the loss of these men. A huge collection was taken up to support the widows. However, they did not receive the money. Instead, they were each given a sewing machine, to help them earn a living. Seventy years later, the money was used to build a Maternity Wing on the Creswick Hospital.

The group visited the site of the disaster, now closed down, with only the mullock heap to mark its presence. They passed the shop of Anthony Pasco, from St. Just in Roselands, which was the longest surviving hardware store in Victoria under the same family; the site of the Williams & Symons hay and corn store. They drove past the site of the main Wesleyan Chapel where the famous artist family, the Lindsays, had been part of the congregation. They visited the Anglican Church of St. John containing memorials to Dr. Tremearne who practised in town; the Masonic Lodge, which had helped many destitute men on the gold fields, drove past the original hospital, past aged cottages where such people as Keen, Pollard and Ellis, all from St. Just in Penwith had lived and finally, the graves of those lost miners and their many relatives in the cemetery. Here lay Henry Nankervis, who died aged 42, in 1869, and six Nankervis babies from Red Streak. Here Benjamin White had become the first Sexton, digging the graves of his fellow Cornishmen until his death at the age of 54, in 1873.

There were many Cornish names – Penrose, Polglase, Trevan, Treeby, Trembath, Treloar, Tregonning, Tregloan, Treverton and Tregloan, among them.

Truly does Creswick have a touch of ancient Cornwall? It was a day for all things Cornish and they did it full justice.

Bulb Meadow The Beauty of Spring

When I saw that Daylesford had a project to plant bulbs around the town, I thought what a great idea. Then when I saw the Hepburn Shire Council outdoor staff assisting, I thought surely Creswick can get that too!

It was already the end of bulb buying/planting season, but the idea was still worth a try. Had to find some bulbs, had to find community support, and had to get Council on side. All had to be organised within seventy two hours. Windows were closing.

There was a ring round for Daffodil bulbs, Hancock's still had some. Rang Phyllis Wright from Creswick Garden Club and Marg Giles from Business & Tourism Creswick and got positive responses. Contacted Councillor Henderson and got an assurance to 'discuss' with Council.

Ordered 500 Daffodil bulbs and remembered that local resident Jan Sparks had some 'other' bulbs to be moved: Muscari, Leucojum, Tritelia and Jonquils. They had to be dug up. So Phyllis, Adam Crutchfield, Neville Blythman and I dug up a mix of around 2,500 of them. Cr Henderson donated *Scilla Peruviana* bulbs.

After several chats with Council, some ideas of where to plant them were put to the outdoor Team Leader, Simon Fishlock; he nodded wisely, and said what about the area between the footpath and the road opposite the roundabout? He later added the area opposite under the Calembeen Park sign.

It is being called the *Bulb Meadow*. Prior to and after it blooms, it will be mowed and although late in going in we are hopeful of a reasonable show. My personal thanks go to everyone named; it was an amazing feat to organise in such a short time, and was a great team effort. There will be other opportunities in the future for those who missed out taking part in the project this time.

We see this project linking into the Creswick Garden Lover's Weekend and hope to build on it.

My aim here was to write about how COVID-19 has affected gardening. The answer is ... not a lot. Much of what we do in the garden now is what we would be doing this time of the year anyway. There are other changes however and one is the huge uptake of gardening by many now unable to fulfil the usual demands of work or school, or to socialise as much and simply needing something to do.

Facebook gardening sites are filled with new voices asking for advice. Costa, from *Gardening Australia*, is posting basic advice for newcomers, and strongly encouraging people to have a go. The June edition of *The Big Issue* magazine features a garden and gardener on its front cover with the sub-title *Home Grown: the rise and rise of urban gardening*. I love the fact that people who have never gardened, or limited it to aesthetics or maintaining a general air of tidiness, are suddenly eyeing off their yards with calculating eyes.

Enforced isolation has meant new ways of filling our days. Gardening does that extremely well. It provides an easy solution to the need for exercise and fresh air as well as the satisfaction of learning a new skill, searching out garden related information online, connecting with gardeners in family and among acquaintances on a new level and getting excited by bags of manure for sale on the side of the road.

My new explorations included finally using the root section of vegetables bought from the supermarket to propagate new plants. Using YouTube for guidance, I sat roughly an inch of the bottom part of three spring onions that would normally have gone into the compost, upright in a small amount of water in a glass on my kitchen window sill. Seeing the little green shoots coming out and roots developing below was immensely satisfying. I also experimented with making my own home made potting mix and so far it's looking very good. Best of all however is that when tired of the news or being inside I escape outside for a brief while into my garden to breathe in our sparkling winter air, hands deep in the earth, getting my heart pumping and limbs stretching on some garden task or simply absorbing the beauty flowering of my winter grevillea. And, those amazing spring onions...

Messages of Sympathy

Over the past few months a number of local residents have died. The CDN Team and residents express sincere sympathy to their families and friends.

Long-time Creswick resident, **Ron McMillan** died earlier in the year. Ron had in recent years been a resident at the John Curtin Aged Care facility.

A well-known district potato farmer **Reg Haintz** died earlier in the year. A member of a long time farming family, Reg was involved in the community, especially the sporting community through the Central Highlands Football League of which he was a Life Member and also President for a number of years.

Smeaton district farmer **Colin Toose** has also died. Well known in the district Colin was involved in the local sporting community including the Smeaton Bowls Club. Retirement from the farm came after ill health and Colin moved to Creswick.

Jean Baker's funeral was held at St. John's Anglican Church in early May adhering to Government guidelines, where fitting tributes acknowledged her many passions. With two younger brothers Jean grew up in Sydney close to an extensive bush reserve which gave her a lifelong passion for the environment.

Jean studied in Sydney, becoming a qualified Librarian, a fitting career for one who loved literature. She moved to Melbourne for work where she met her future husband Norman. In 1976 Jean and Norman moved to Creswick. A town in which she had an interest through her father's association with Norman Lindsay. In Creswick Jean worked as a Librarian at the Victorian School of Forestry, now the University of Melbourne Creswick campus where she was the first qualified Librarian employed in this role.

Jean, was described as being helpful and totally reliable in her work. Every request for assistance from the students in seeking out reference materials was followed through until the request was as fully satisfied as possible. No request for assistance was rejected. Jean found it a fascinating and rewarding position until she took early retirement at the end of 1990.

On retirement Jean became more involved in the local community. This included local Creswick and district history research at the Public Records Office and indexing of early Rate Books. While a member of the Creswick and District Historical Society Jean, among other research, compiled their *Creswick of the Lindsays* notes for the Ballarat Art Gallery guides. Jean was secretary of the Creswick Museum for over seven years and the Museum's Research Centre is the fortunate recipient of much of her local research.

Jean was an active member of St. John's Anglican Church, Creswick, and was secretary of Parish Council for three years. In 1996 she was appointed to the new position of Parish Archivist, and began listing and indexing many of the records. Heritage Grants from the Commonwealth Government in 2003 and 2005 provided funds for rebinding many fragile early registers and minute books. Jean held the role of Archivist until 2017. Another of Jean's researches was to update the history of St. Matthew's Anglican Church, Newlyn in time for their 125th Celebrations. From 2001 - 2006 Jean was Creswick Coordinator of the ecumenical World Day of Prayer.

A lifelong advocate of public transport, Jean had been a member of the Public Transport Users' Association since its formation in 1976. She never learned to drive and in her Forestry School days was famous for riding around town on her ancient bicycle. When the State Government investigated re-opening the Mildura train line, Jean became involved in a campaign to bring back the local service between Ballarat and Maryborough. Reporting this in early issues of the *Creswick District News* in 2000 led to her regular *Public Transport Update* column. Another of her achievements has been the extension of the Creswick bus route up Victoria Street and the establishment of a bus stop and shelter at the Victoria Street railway crossing.

Always a courteous and gracious hostess, Jean lived her life surrounded by mountains of papers and records. She continued her research in recent years supported by Norman in her literary passion. Now the pen is silent. A well-deserved peace has come. The CDN Team and readers convey their sincere sympathy to Norman, family and friends. **Vale Jean.**

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Victorian Local Government Elections to proceed

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) has noted the recent announcement from the Victorian Government that the local government elections for 2020 will proceed as planned in October this year. The Minister for Local Government has confirmed that all local government elections in 2020 will be conducted by post.

Electoral Commissioner, Warwick Gately AM acknowledged the announcement. 'The upcoming local government elections in Victoria will support continuity of democratic representation for Victorian communities,' Mr Gately said.

'The VEC will continue to monitor and implement advice issued by the Chief Health Officer of Victoria to ensure the elections are conducted with minimal risk to the health and safety of Victorians.'

Ballot packs will be mailed to voters and will include voting instructions, candidate information, a ballot paper, and a reply-paid envelope. Postal voting is completely secret. 'We will continue to liaise with Australia Post, given their critical role in the elections'.

Voters must confirm they are enrolled on either the State electoral roll or their council roll before 4.00pm on Friday 28 August 2020.

The VEC will take additional measures to protect the health and wellbeing of staff, candidates and the public. This includes provisions to maintain physical distancing requirements and hygiene standards at all election office and count locations. It's anticipated the adjustments will extend the time period for finalising results by one week.

It is important to remember that voting is compulsory for voters who are on the State roll. State-enrolled voters who don't vote may be fined.

May 11 1920

Springmount- social evening- Next Friday evening, the Springmount Football Club will hold a euchre tournament and social in the schoolroom. There will be good prizes and music. The admission to the euchre will be 1/- and for the social the gentlemen will pay 1/- and the ladies 6d, including tax.

May 14 1920

It is intended, if possible to make arrangements to present the balance of the medals to the Creswick returned soldiers on Saturday, 22nd inst. Further particulars will be given in next Tuesday's issue of the "Advertiser'.

May 18 1920

Shire of Creswick – Applications are invited and will be received up till 12 o'clock noon on Thursday, the 3rd of June from persons competent to fill the combined positions of Rate Collector, Dog Registrar, Inspector of nuisances, dairies, slaughteryards, tires, thistles, and Weights and Measures, inspector under the "Pure Foods Act", and Assistant secretary, at a salary of £165 per annum, 30% of the Dog fees and 5% of the Sanitary rates.

May 23 1920

Smeaton State School, no 552. Owing to the epidemic of Measles, the entertainment to have taken place this (Friday) evening, has been postponed to a date to be fixed. F. C. Redman, Chairman. W. Whatmore, Correspondent.

May 25 1920

To the editor- Sir- now that our civic "fathers" have once again given cattle a free leg in the streets, perhaps it would not be amiss to draw their attention to how a bovine celebrated its liberty. The morning after the resolution was rescinded by the council, this beast politely walked into the yard of a well known townsman, and digested a pair of bloomers and destroyed a nightgown which were hanging on a clothes line – good business for the drapers. Perhaps if it was to pay a visit to its council friends' yards and repeat this annoying act, they would regret their action. Yours etc. Square Dinkum.

May 28 1920

Special trains are to be run to Ballarat next Wednesday in connection with the visit of H.R.H. The Prince of Wales. One will leave Allendale at 9.25 am. and Creswick at 9.45 am, arriving at Ballarat at 10.24 a.m. Tickets at holiday excursion fares will be issued to Ballarat on these lines on Tuesday, 1st June.

June 1 1920

A meeting of members of the Creswick Turf Club will be held at the American Hotel next Thursday evening at 7 o'clock.

June 4 1920

Dean- School Concert- On Monday May 24th, the Dean school children held an Empire Day concert in the hall. Mr. Alex McKenzie, chairman of the school committee, occupied the chair. The evening commenced with an action song, in which the girls showed that they could dance equally well on their heads or feet.

June 8 1920

Residents of Creswick and district are in for a treat in the dramatic line, Miss Eugenie Duggan, the popular and talented Australian actress, supported by a brilliant combination of metropolitan artists, being billed to appear in the town hall, Creswick, on Wednesday June 9th, in "The Little Girl God Forgot."

June 11 1920

On Saturday evening last the Dean Social Club met in the hall. A fair number of members and a few visitors were present. The chief business of the evening was the preparation of the new syllabus, which is very different from the old one. Debates with kindred societies are being arranged, and it is hoped that this will give the club a new stimulus.

June 15 1920

A branch of the Victorian Farmers' Union has been formed at Mount Prospect, Mr. H. C. Graves of Langdon's Hill, acting as secretary. District farmers are enthusiastic in the movement, and a strong branch is assured.

June 18 1920

Creswick branch Presbyterian Women's Mission Union – A social evening, in aid of the Mission's fund, will be held in Presbyterian Sunday School Hall on Wednesday, June 30th at 7.30 pm. Music, games, Refreshments. Admission 6d. All Welcome.

June 22 1920

The contractor (Mr. Brown) for the erection of the building at North Creswick for the paint works of the Broomfield Alluviums Company, commenced work yesterday. It is anticipated that the building will be completed in about six weeks' time.

June 25 1920

Rechabite Hall – Saturday (Tomorrow) 26th inst., at 8 p.m. A dance will be held under the auspices of the Creswick Girls' Basket Ball Club. Efficient M.C. Admission 1/- and tax. June 9 1920

Loyal Spring Hill Lodge I.O.O.F. The Fortnightly meeting of the above will be held in the Rechabite Hall this (Tuesday) evening at 7.30 o'clock. A full attendance requested. H. Bowley, Secretary.

Well, what a Term 2 it has been at Creswick Primary School and across the entire nation in education!

Firstly, huge congratulations must go out to all families at the school who have worked extremely hard to ensure that Remote Learning has been embraced and valued, and that students have been supported in their work. We know that it has not been an easy adjustment, but we applaud everyone for their resilience and understanding. The consistent communication between school and home has ensured that everyone has been kept up to date, supported with resources and knowledge around tasks and the establishment of a very open two-way channel in these trying times.

A variety of programs were used across the Seesaw platform, where tasks were set daily under the State guidelines; including all Specialist subjects, an ongoing Wellbeing program, along with the basic curriculum areas. Each morning the class teacher sent out a verbal and written 'greeting' explaining the requirements for the day, along with any important messages. Classes also met weekly in a Webex forum where all class members could see and interact with each other. This was found to be a very important element in keeping the students connected.

As a teacher it was exciting seeing families working together on tasks and as many of the activities were uploaded as videos and photographs, we saw snapshots of creativity coming through, including Tic Tok dances and fitness sessions, outstanding Artwork, walks around the Creswick area and STEM experimentation and research happenings. In Literacy and Numeracy our students were encouraged to maintain their regular levels of independent reading, Mathletics and Reading Eggs tasks (in some cases) and general vocabulary and maths skills' practise. There was so much fantastic work created that some classes are going to collate it into books to keep as memoirs of their Work In Remote Learning Times.

We welcomed the Foundation, grades 1 and 2 students back on Tuesday, 26 May and it was wonderful to see their smiling and excited faces as they entered the classrooms. Then two weeks later on Tuesday, 9 June the grades 3 - 6returned and these students were clearly happy to be reconnected with their friends and classmates.

Whilst there are some new rules that everyone has to adhere to in returning to the classrooms, it has been pleasing to watch how quickly students have adapted to these changes and their readiness to continue their learning.

Once again, congratulations and thank you to all Creswick Primary School families, staff and students. A job well done!
