

Catering Group Disbands Well Deserved Congratulations

Creswick's *Ten Willing Workers* catering group has disbanded after serving the community for almost fifty years. Formed in 1974 by ten ladies who had previously worked in fund-raising catering activities for the Creswick

Pre-School, the group has supported many Creswick and district organisations by donating all the proceeds from their catering activities to those bodies. The name *Willing Workers,* was bestowed on the group by a Shire President at a Council function for which the group had prepared and provided a highly praised three-course meal.

During its years of operation the group has lost five of its members through retirements, relocations and deaths, but five of the original ten have continued their involvement through to the present time. Starting off as young mothers of children attending the Creswick Pre-School, the five surviving members now range in age from 80 to 91.

In the years of their existence they have catered for the wedding breakfasts of many brides and grooms who had been Creswick Pre-School attendees earlier in their lives. Other functions catered for include Golf Club Dinner Dances, Presentation and Farewell Dinners, Creswick Garden Club Learning Days, Shire Civic Receptions, Museum Dinners, a Loddon Catchment Authority Luncheon and Creswick's Community Bank AGMs.

Organisations which have benefitted from the group's donations include: Creswick District Hospital; John Curtin Aged Care; St. Andrew's Uniting Church; North Creswick Uniting Church; Creswick Fire Brigade; Creswick Red Cross; Clunes Pre-school; Creswick District Band; Brown Hill Uniting Church; Creswick Pre-School; Creswick Town Hall Improvement Committee; Semmens Park Committee Group; Creswick Football Clubrooms; Uniting Church Manse; Catholic Women's League; Ballarat Division Girl Guides and Lingbogol Girl Guides Camp Building Appeal; Creswick RSL; Creswick Light Horse; Doug Lindsay Reserve; Great Dividing Trail and Creswick Park Lake Botanical Reserve.

As its final act before disbanding the group decided to use the last of its funds to purchase an item for use by patients at Creswick and District Hospital.



Were your Ancestors in the Creswick area in the 1850s?

In the period 1854 - 1888 there were 3,427 births registered in Creswick. In 1855, shortly after Creswick was gazetted, there were 293 births. With these figures in mind, a pioneer index is going to involve quite a substantial number of families.

The Creswick Historical Society is endeavouring to create a pioneer index for families who were resident in Creswick in the 1850s. Through advertising in newspapers, seventy responses have been received, mainly from outside the Shire.

The Society is now looking for input from Creswick residents. There is a contact book in the Information Centre or alternatively email your family name to Marj Poole at *barrymarj@hotmail.com*.

If you know of friends no longer living in the shire, who have connections to Creswick, their input would also be welcome. The pioneer index will only be as good as the information provided by the families.



Personality

John Harris Geologist – Right Place, Right Time Part 2

John Harris, surveyor, prospector and raconteur, has become a well-known figure around Creswick. Three years ago, at age seventy-seven, he started studying Geology at Federation University. He likes to tell people that his life has been a series of amazing experiences due to his being in the right place at the right time. Here is the final instalment of his story.

From 1970 to 1972 I spent two years working out of Goroka in Papua and New Guinea. It was the period just before Independence and it was a good time to be there. Since then, the country has become very lawless with the Raskols and I would never be able to return to the paradise that the Territory of Papua and New Guinea used to be.

1975 was a tumultuous year. Gough Whitlam was Prime Minister and at the end of the year there was a recession. There were 150 surveyors in Canberra at the start of the year and at the end seventy-five had left Canberra including me. A surveyor was needed at Waikerie and I obtained a position with the Engineering and Water Supply Department (E&WS), now SA Water. I ended up working throughout South Australia.

In 1996 I moved to Port Augusta to work for Fugro and spent the next four years working throughout the western part of SA. I worked on the Olympic Dam mine and the associated town of Roxby. Some of the other mines I worked on include the Beverley Uranium Mine; the Honeymoon Uranium Mine; the gold mine at Tarcoola and the Dominion gold mine at Commonwealth Hill Station.

Returning to Adelaide in 2000, I worked for Fyfe Surveyors in their Adelaide, Darwin, and Roma Offices. When I retired in 2012, I was working in Queensland at Chinchilla.

Working in such remote places, I had many unusual experiences. Once when driving at night from Tennant Creek to Camooweal, there were literally millions of rats running across the road. It was like a carpet of brown rats and the only way to see the road was by the shape. I was so tired and needing to sleep, I pulled the truck off the road, set up my stretcher which was about 150mm above the ground and put my swag on it. As I was getting into the swag, I shone my torch at all the rats peering at me over the edge of the stretcher. I pulled the cover of the swag over my head thinking that if the rats bit me I would wake up. In the morning when I woke there was not a rat in sight, they had gone down the cracks in the black soil.

While working out near the Canning Stock Route a dingo adopted us. It was so hungry it tried to make a meal out of our leather boots. In the end we fed it bully beef - corned meat in a tin that was almost inedible (in my opinion) - and hoped that it wouldn't die. I believe that you can still buy bully beef, but it is a meal of last resort.

Gliding opened up a whole new perspective of getting close to birds and I flew with many birds during my gliding career. Over Wilmington in SA I climbed from 1,200ft to 12,000ft sharing the thermal with three eagles. The birds were peeved to be flying with a rank amateur and made their feeling known by screeching at me during the whole of the climb. West of Forbes in NSW I shared a final glide with about six pelicans. My glider had the same glide angle as the pelicans and the same speed of about sixty knots, and as I was behind them, they continually turned their heads around to confirm that I wasn't going to run up their backsides!

In 1984 I was fortunate to spend two months carrying out a hydrographic survey on the Great Barrier Reef. We surveyed around Raine Island (the largest turtle rookery in the world), and the Great Detached Reef (north of Cooktown). During this survey we had numerous encounters with all manner of sharks, sea snakes and the odd turtle or two. During my career as a surveyor, I was very lucky to work in the 1960s which I believe were the best years for working in Australia. Wages were good, house and car prices were low, and overall, we as Australians had more disposable income, and more time to enjoy life.

We undertook the move to Creswick from Adelaide in 2013 with some trepidation. The move far exceeded our expectations. Creswick has been such a friendly town, and we have made many friends. Shirley Watson and I started a Folk Group and we still meet very regularly at the Railway Station. The main reason for moving was to be with our young grandchildren in Woodend and we have been very grateful to have been able to be with them as they have grown up.

With its heritage of mining and association with the golden past, I became really interested in prospecting in the Creswick area. With little to show for my efforts I quickly realized that I lacked knowledge about the geology of the area. During an Open Day at Federation University, I was encouraged to commence a geology degree when I was seventy-seven. Starting with one subject to literally test the water, I then completed the course and so on 7 December, 2020, after three and a half years of study, I obtained my Bachelor of Geoscience. The geology course was great, improving my understanding of the geology of the earth in general, but for Australia and the local area in particular, it has been really fascinating.

Getting a Degree at my stage of life was indeed being in the right place at the right time.

Everything has been examined: staffing, rosters, facilities, processes, equipment, IT. It is inevitable that this will bring changes to John Curtin Aged Care and aspects of its operations. Some of these will

have been noted by the wider community and while change can be unsettling, it is through change that improvements are made.

No-one could have predicted the impact that the past eighteen months has had on all aspects of life. COVID-19 has caused much stress to the residents, their families and staff. The Board is very proud of the manner in which staff have risen to the challenges presented although it has not been without cost. The recent Royal Commission has not always painted a positive picture of Aged Care and this also impacts upon staff morale and personal stress. In addition, the industry as a whole, is currently experiencing high turnover and staff shortages and the Board is incredibly grateful for the level of commitment and professionalism demonstrated by the staff at John Curtin.

Once again, I thank staff for their magnificent effort under extraordinary conditions. I assure the community that the Board of John Curtin Aged Care is committed to continuing to provide this valuable service and that residents and their care will always be the number one priority.

While travel may be restricted and outings are sometimes prone to cancellation or postponements, club members continue to enjoy a wide range of



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100 Years Ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

July 2, 1921

The Mayor (Cr. Grose) has had an inquiry as to power for working the machines in a factory. It is not generally known that Ballarat has for some time been sending tons of white work to Sydney and quantities also to Brisbane. Inquiries are being made as to what could be done in Creswick in the way of providing power for industries.

July 6, 1921

Messrs W. Oswin and Co. have a preliminary announcement to the effect that they are starting an up to date motor garage in Albert Street, Creswick. Cars can be hired at any hour of the day or night, on most reasonable terms. Mr. H. Clousen has been secured as a driver, and clients can rely on a prompt, reliable and safe service.

July 9, 1921

Kooroocheang- The rainfall for the month of June, which fell all in the first half of the month, on nine different days, was 292 points. Since the 20th ult. fine, frosty weather has been experienced. The crops and grass are still looking well and stooling out strong.

July 13, 1921

Springmount – In the State schoolroom on Friday evening next, in aid of the funds of the committee, a euchre tournament will be held. There will be good trophies for winners, and an enjoyable series of games should result. The admission will be 1/ each.

July 16, 1921

Mollongghip – Arrangements are well in hand for the unveiling of a captured machine gun on Friday evening, 22^{nd} inst. Tickets have been procured and a large sale is

assured. A good programme of district talent has been secured, and Captain T. Parkin has been asked to perform the unveiling ceremony. Refreshments are to be provided, and a dance is to follow.

July 20, 1921

A very fine honor board has been secured for the School of Forestry, in recognition of former students who gave service in the late Great War. The unveiling ceremony is to take place next Saturday afternoon, at 3 o'clock. The principal participants in the ceremony will be Sir Alexander Peacock, Minister of Forests, and Mr. Owen Jones, chairman of the Forests Commission. All interested are cordially invited to be present.

July 23, 1921

Dean – The Social Club met on Saturday evening last. The president (Mr. A. Martin) was in the chair. In spite of the inclement weather, the majority of the members were present, as well as a large number of visitors. After the business meeting, Mr. G. C. Cutbush took the chair, and Mr. G. McKay was appointed time keeper for the debate, 'Which makes the better wife, home or business girl?".

July 27, 1921

Mount Prospect

The State School Committee, having decided some time ago to place an honor board in the school, have now got it ready, and at the last meeting of the committee, held on Thursday night, it was decided to hold a concert and entertainment in the hall on Wednesday night, August 17th, to raise the funds for the purchase of it and it is intended to unveil it on the Saturday following, when the minister of Education will be asked to perform the unveiling.

USEFUL WEEDS? By Rhonda Cotsell

For ages now I have wanted to know more about the many weeds that call my garden home.

Mine all go in my compost heap. When I pull them out, most come with a lot of dark brown, sweet smelling soil attached to the roots - unlike soil surrounding them that looks paler and compressed. Healthy soil I cannot afford to lose, plus theoretically, the heat of the compost will destroy the seeds, though that doesn't seem always to be happening. What I do see however, is it all rotting down nicely and adding to the quality and quantity of my compost. Also, they have to be put somewhere.

I went looking for a reference and settled on Adam Grubb and Annie Raser-Rowland's *The Weed forager's handbook: a guide to edible and medicinal weeds in Australia*. Hyland House Publishing. 2012, ISBN 9781864471212.

I also wanted something which I could carry around with me, with information well organised so I could easily identify what I was looking at on the ground. What it was, what I could do with it and what it might do for me – with lots of pictures and clear descriptive information so I wouldn't make mistakes. This publication does all that.

I also chose it because the foreword is written by *Gardening Australia*'s Costa Georgiadis, and it is strongly recommended by David Holmgren – a familiar and beloved name in permaculture.

The authors are also well trained with extensive experience, but those two clinched it.

Weeds are introduced as the *ultimate convenience food* with distinct nutritional value, incredibly easy to grow and requiring no assistance, with a capacity to repair disturbed earth and they do no damage to the environment.

It speaks to any gardener interested in how to incorporate weeds in soil regeneration, but also how to use as nurse plants. Because they are hardy and grow easily, they can be used as companion plants for seedlings, protecting against wind and sun and cooling and humidifying the air around them in hot or exposed gardens. This matched what I saw in my garden. I also particularly liked the top twenty list of edible and medicinal weeds – all very common, most in my garden (so grow locally) and with medicinal information sourced both from traditional lore and scientific studies for verification.

The Hands On Learning program was introduced to Creswick Primary School in 2019 and primarily offers students in grades 5 and 6 the opportunity to experience a practical approach within their learning. Originating in Melbourne, it allows students to work in a team, caters for all learning styles and engages them in a way that increases their confidence and allows them to reach their full potential.

Approximately ten students at a time move in and out of the program. Mrs Ingrid Humm has been the co-ordinator of *HoL* since its inception and this year Mark Walker assists each week.

Sessions usually begin with a Tool Box Meeting, a joke or a conundrum, followed by seeing how everyone is feeling as a check-in. Jobs are then allocated with students rotating roles as photographer, work-site set-up, reporter for the Newsletter, group leader and rover.

The *HoL* team have built picnic seats and tables; a mud kitchen; grade 6 graduation frames and relocated the vegetable garden beds to a safer area. The latter an arduous task which deserved the pride they displayed when it was completed. Currently they are in the process of redesigning a complete area from a garden to a special play area for younger students. Within the community, the *HoL* team has designed, created and painted a large mural at Shannon's Bridge as well as working on a garden bed there. This provided students an excellent insight into what is possible beyond their school and some of the roles that they can play in the local community.

The team can sometimes be seen walking down the street in specially designed t-shirts to purchase materials from Davies & Rose. The group takes pride in representing *Hands On Learning* within the community and making connections with local businesses. It is pleasing to watch the team members as they grow in confidence and skills.

Luke, who is a past member of the *HoL* team reflected in saying, 'It was good to learn how to use different types of tools correctly. I got to use a sander, a drill and a hand saw under supervision while we were creating some of the projects. I really liked being part of Hands On Learning'.

Lily, the newest member spoke about what she hopes to gain from the HoL experience, 'My first day was fun because I got to paint the new school values bubbles that will be displayed on the water tanks as well as the new picnic table for the courtyard. I am also looking forward to taking on all the different roles that we can have'.



PROTECT OUR WILDLIFE



An exciting new venture is underway in the Hepburn Shire to protect native flora and fauna. Hepburn Gardens for Wildlife is a collaboration between the Neighbourhood Houses, the Hepburn Shire and Hepburn Gardens for Wildlife.

In the Hepburn Shire, forty-six percent of the land is still bush. Over half of the region mapped as native vegetation is owned or managed by private landholders who have the opportunity to make a meaningful contribution to protecting and enhancing biodiversity. But the current exodus of families from the city to regional towns, the



increasing urbanisation of the area, as well as climate change, put pressure on the region's original inhabitants, the native plants and wildlife.

Bushland is essential to the survival of many local creatures. Birds and animals such as parrots, owls, brush tailed phascogales and sugar gliders, for example, need tree hollows to breed and shelter. Tiny birds need the dense shelter of tall grasses and prickly bushes to nest and rest. Tiny birds such as blue wrens are absent from many suburbs in Melbourne. By creating habitat gardens, local gardeners can make a home for furry and feathered friends. Through planting appropriate indigenous species, a habitat garden can provide the food and shelter that the local creatures require. Habitat gardens can create wildlife corridors, linking the built environment to the surrounding creeks and bushland.

As more gardens in the region provide the food, water and shelter that is essential for wildlife, more creatures that are under threat will survive. And for the human creatures in the equation, there is the satisfaction of having made a contribution towards protecting the biodiversity of the region.
