## Scouts and U3A Enter Unique Partnership

Time and floods have taken their toll on the seventy-yearold Scout Hall. Scouts and U3A have formed a unique partnership to work together to repair and redevelop the hall to meet changing needs. A joint Scouts/U3A committee has been formed to drive the project and access funding. This partnership is believed to be a first for Victoria, possibly Australia.

The Scout Hall in North Parade is home to the very active 1<sup>st</sup> Creswick Scout Group and also hosts quite a number of U3A (University of the Third Age) activities and classes. Scouts meet at night and at weekends, whilst the members of U3A use it on weekdays.

Contributions towards the project have already been received from the Daylesford Rotary Club and the Creswick Lions Club. Their generous support is helping towards urgent works, planning, and sourcing the funding for what will be a project costing in excess of \$800,000.

The hall was originally built by the community after World War II to meet the needs of growing families. Dances, fairs and raffles were all part of the fund-raising, and parents and their children laboured at weekends to build a hall that was debt-free by the mid 1950s.

Today the Scout Group has some seventy youth members from all over the Shire and is the only Scout Group in the Shire. The Group provides programs for Joeys, Cubs, Scouts and Venturers with a Rover Crew in the future, thus providing programs for youth from age five through to twenty-six years.

The Creswick and District U3A is also a very active group for retirees (and semi-retirees), with over 210 members participating in some twenty-four courses and activities both as tutors and as participants.

This joint venture will be another example of Creswick showing the rest of the State what a united, local country community can achieve.

## RACV Goldfields Resort and Golf Course Re-Opens

The RACV Goldfields Resort and Golf Course re-opened on 23 June following the January storm damage.

Extensive repairs have been completed at the venue. In addition to the renovated and upgraded facilities, RACV is also celebrating the launch of *ArtHouse* – a new multipurpose building within the Goldfields Resort that will be a centre for arts experience.

The RACV Goldfields Resort sustained damage as a result of the major storm on the afternoon of 5 January this year and had been temporarily closed since that date. *'The return to active operation is a boost to RACV members and the local economy,'* says RACV Goldfields Resort Manager, Martin Zumstein.

The work completed to support the re-opening of Goldfields includes an upgraded lobby and new front desk, upgraded gym equipment, new children's entertainment facilities, new carpet, curtains and furniture in the rooms, new conference and events furniture, and refreshed carpet in the Springs Bar & Terrace.

Dining at the Resort will be available to resort guests only in the months immediately following the re-opening.

Part of that exciting future is the RACV Goldfields Resort ArtHouse. RACV Head of Visual Arts, Mardi Nowak, said that 'ArtHouse would provide an incredible and unique experience for RACV members and guests'. ArtHouse opened for guests staying at the Resort from 24 June with My Creswick Sketchbook where visitors are encouraged to explore Creswick through creative drawing and take home a sketchbook souvenir. It will be open to the public later in 2022.

## **Grow Wild!**

### A Garden Book Review by Rhonda Cotsell

There are many things I love about living in Creswick but I still remember one quiet and peaceful evening out the back when there was a sudden explosion of sound as a group of kookaburras started to sing, each peal overlapping the others so there was no break in the sound washing down the street from somewhere a few blocks away.

There have been so many bird moments - birdsong early in the morning, in the evening watching them gather on the wires, poles and antennas in rows and pairs or alone as if checking the street out. So, it was great recently to find a guide called *Grow Wild: Gardening to Sustain Wildlife in the Hepburn Shire* written by Glenlyon local, Jill Teschendorff.

My own garden is a mix of mainly local natives plus nonnatives including herbs, fruit trees and flowers. I chose plants aimed at attracting wildlife, birds especially. But it wasn't very systematic, gathering information from wherever I could find it. I wish I had known about this guide when my garden was still a relatively blank canvas as it contains absolutely everything I needed to know in one place.

The book is separated into four sections. The first discusses why we should preserve the bush, covers resident and visiting wildlife and how to preserve habitat in a rural setting. The second looks at how to create a wildlife garden looking at design, non-natives, weed control, soil preparation, maintenance and providing background information on Hepburn soils plus bioregions of the Shire.

The third section is a beautifully illustrated list of recommended indigenous plants with a concise description providing the botanical and popular names, a brief physical description, required growing conditions and size. The final section contains information on indigenous plant suppliers, useful organisations and a list of further readings.

There was much I enjoyed about this book, but what was unexpected and particularly pleasing was the inclusion of non-natives (I have favourites) and how they also can protect and sustain wildlife. Physically, it is well designed and put together. Particular information is easy to find and it is a good size. The cover is strong but flexible, and the glossy cardboard will cope with damp or muddy conditions when taken out in the garden. The inside pages are a strong paper, not liable to tear easily. For those interested, it is worth visiting the library and checking it out.

## **Vale Shirley Joy Tennant**

Shirley recently passed away peacefully at the age of ninetyseven, at her home in the John Curtin Aged Care Facility.

Born in Creswick on 18 May 1925 to Peter and Caroline Kennedy, she was one of five children. Her parents were extremely hardworking people during the great depression, running a small farm in North Creswick which allowed them to be self-sufficient.

Shirley started school at the North Creswick Primary School then went to St Augustine's, which was a walk of two miles each way. Her

favourite subject was Nature Studies. Her formal education finished with the completion of the Merit Certificate (Year 8).

Shirley commenced paid employment at the Morley's Mill in Ballarat. Although she didn't like this work, she stayed until she was offered a position at the Creswick Pharmacy, working for Bill Maine. Shirley recalled how she enjoyed the work, dispensing medicines and tablets, grinding powders, working five days a week and Saturday mornings.

Shirley attended local hall dances across the district of Smeaton, Kingston, Newlyn and Creswick. At one of these dances she met her future husband, Steve. They married on 1 February 1947, after which they moved to the family farm in Smeaton, affectionately known as *Pyle Farm*. It was not long before Shirley had three children, Barry, Cheryl and Phillip.

Farm life was always busy, but there was time for being involved in community activities. These included the CWA, the Presbyterian Church, school committees, tennis and playing golf at the Creswick Golf Club. However, it was lawn bowls that dominated her sporting life. Shirley was a founding member of the Smeaton Bowling Club and eventually a life member, club president, club champion numerous times and a member of pennant premiership teams over the years.

Bowls took Shirl and Steve to numerous destinations around Australia and many friendships flourished. Long treks towing the caravan gave birth to one of her memorable sayings – *have wheels will travel*. They also travelled abroad to the UK, Europe and New Zealand.

Shirley and Steve eventually built a home in Smeaton, where they lived for twenty-five years until Steve passed away. She then moved back to her hometown of Creswick and then added Creswick Probus and the Red Cross to her already busy life.

Shirley was eighty-nine when she made the decision to



move into the John Curtin Aged Care facility, where she continued her busy social life and she renewed her love of the Richmond Football Club. She bought a mobility scooter and could be seen all around Creswick, zipping between her favourite coffee cafes, the florist shop and the bakery for a pastie and apple cake to be eaten later.

She loved playing cards at the Senior Citizens, meeting the girls and then off to bingo. She enjoyed a wonderful camaraderie with the craft group organised by Rita Flapper and was a great patron of the regular stalls. Her great-grandchildren were frequent

beneficiaries of knitted garments from these stalls.

Her family's successes were her successes. She was proud of her ancestry and leaves behind her daughter Cheryl, son Phillip, eight grandchildren, fourteen great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

Shirley was an exceptional person to us all who will be sorely missed, but her enduring legacy on how to live life to the fullest, is a shining beacon to us all.

### Creswick Primary School A focus on well-being

Ingrid Humm has been at Creswick Primary School since 2002 and over that time has taught across all grade levels in the school as well as being responsible in specialist areas. With this vast experience, in 2018 Ingrid was appointed as a Leading Teacher in charge of well-being.

In this time, Ingrid has introduced a number of initiatives into the school. These have included Hands On Learning (HOL), where a small group of students are part of a weekly session which provides an additional avenue into learning through the middle years of schooling. Here, students are provided with a team-focused atmosphere where they have the opportunity to develop areas around the school and throughout the community as well as pursuing individual projects.

Another area that Ingrid is responsible for is working with the Allied Health placements, where University of Melbourne students have been offered a learning placement at the school. They are responsible for working with students and completing projects as part of their studies.

Over the past few years, they have included students of Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy and Social Work. Each of these areas can play a vital role and give an insight into a student's development. The role of the physiotherapy students is to support students in movement and identify any underlying conditions that may hinder a child's ability to participate in physical activities. They would then provide individualised programs to assist these students. The occupational therapy students help students and families to access everyday activities and promote independence and wellbeing. The social work students provide care management, counselling and advocacy to address issues at social and emotional levels across a variety of fields.

The roles that these university students play in the Creswick Primary School community are extremely valuable in assisting students and families in their development and well-being. Through the co-ordination given to them by Mrs Humm, the school looks forward to this partnership continuing to thrive over the coming years.

## LADY MILLIE GERTRUDE PEACOCK 3.8.1870 – 7.2.1948 HONOUR ROLL INDUCTEE 2022

Millie Gertrude Holden was born in Framlingham on 3 August 1870. She was the second daughter of John Bryson Holden, an auctioneer, stock and station owner, and Marianne Holden, nee Arnold, who were Irish immigrants. Her mother died when she was five months old. Her father then married Marianne's sister, Jane Ellen Arnold. Their family home called Loongarna, no longer exists. Millie was educated at Port Fairy and the Methodist Ladies College, Melbourne.

Alexander Peacock and Millie first met in 1899 when the

Australian Natives Association conference was held at Port Fairy and her family hosted members from other towns. They married at St Andrews Presbyterian Church, Port Fairy, in January 1901. After their honeymoon at Bright, they returned to Creswick by train. At the station they were met by a crowd of well-wishers and the Creswick Jubilee Band. The station was decorated in green and red paper lanterns. The band escorted them to their home in Cambridge Street, *Glemsford*, where they lived for the rest of their lives.

Weeks after their marriage Alexander became Premier of Victoria, an office he held three times during his long political career. He was knighted in 1902.

The year of their marriage, 1901, was the year of Federation and the newly married couple were very much involved as Melbourne was the host city for the opening of the new Federal Parliament in the Exhibition Building in Melbourne. The Duke and Duchess of York, later to become King George V and Queen Mary, arrived for a Royal Visit on 6 May, 1901. Millie accompanied her husband to many of the functions.

In Creswick she undertook duties on her husband's behalf in the electorate of Allendale when he was in Melbourne. The Sydney newspaper, *The Mercury*, commented: 'Indeed, so familiar did she make herself with the people of her part of the country, their needs and problems, that Sir Alexander was often heard to say that she knew more of the electorate than he did and she was popularly known as the deputy member'. Her charity work involved her with many good causes, not only in the Creswick district but Ballarat and the State.

A Branch of the British Red Cross was founded in Australia in August 1914, nine days after the outbreak of World War I. Lady Millie was a member of the Provisional Committee of the Victorian Division of the Australian Branch of the British Red Cross Society (1914 -1915). The Creswick Branch of the Red Cross Society was founded in April 1915 to which Lady Millie was elected inaugural President. She served as President until her death in 1948. The Society worked hard to provide comforts to all those serving overseas. Along with all the members, she knitted socks and made up parcels of goods to ease the hardships of soldiers and nurses. She would answer letters sent from those serving. In peacetime, as now, the Red Cross provided support in bush fire and

other emergencies. As well as being involved with the Creswick Red Cross, she attended other groups in the Creswick Shire along with areas like Talbot, Clunes and Ballarat.

According to the minute books of the Creswick Ladies Benevolent Society, Lady Millie was President from at least 1932 to 1942. The Association met monthly and assessed the needs of people who applied for assistance.Throughout the district, goods including baby clothes, sheets, blankets, groceries, firewood, books and other essentials, were distributed. Lady Millie remained President and attended most of the meetings even when she was a Member of Parliament. Lady Millie also was involved in the Children's Welfare Association and the Creswick Auxiliary of the Royal Victorian Institute for the Blind.

Sir Alexander died suddenly on 7 October 1933, and at the State Funeral held in Creswick, Robert Menzies, who at the time was a member of the Victorian Parliament, with others, encouraged Lady Millie to stand for her husband's seat. She stood reluctantly. As she was in mourning during the campaign, she made no speeches or public appearances. She was elected to the seat of Allendale at a by-election on 11 November 1933, defeating the Labour candidate by a record margin of over 1500 votes.

As Dianne Haddon, MLC for Ballarat Province, in her speech to the Creswick Red Cross Unit celebrating its 90<sup>th</sup> birthday on 31 May 2005 said, 'Lady Millie had lost her husband of thirty-two years on 7 October, buried him on the tenth at a State Funeral and then made political history as the first woman elected to State Parliament on 11 November. It must have been a tumultuous time for a lady in mourning'.

### LADY MILLIE GERTRUDE PEACOCK

Lady Millie was the first woman to be elected to the Victorian Parliament and only the third elected to a Parliament in Australia. When she took her seat the gallery was crowded with women.

Her only speech to Parliament was on 5 September 1934 moving support for the *Factories and Shops Bill*, which had been of particular interest to Sir Alexander. She emphasised the plight of female outworkers, praising her husband's role in establishing the Wages Board system to fix fair wages and conditions for Victorian workers, concluding 'I feel very proud that I have been able to stand up in this House, which is truly representative of the people and give my support to this legislation which I feel is not only due and necessary, but reflects the highest instincts of humanity'.

She served her Parliamentary term and did not renominate. She is recorded as saying, 'Parliament is not a place for women'. The book, Women in the City, published by the Victorian Women's Trust, said 'During her term, she made fundamental contributions to the community as a champion for women and workers' rights ... and she made fundamental contributions to the Melbourne community by bridging the gap between formal and practical access to public offices for women in Victoria and Australia'.

Lady Millie and Sir Alexander had no children but she enjoyed her nieces and nephews and was close to the Holden side of the family. They were regular worshippers at St John's Anglican Church in Creswick. Both were strongly motivated by their Christian faith.

The obituary in the Creswick Advertiser of 13 February 1948 stated, 'for nearly half a century, she has been part of the life of Creswick, intimately knowing all its people, mixing with them in happiness and in sorrow'. Lady Millie Peacock was held in high regard, respected and loved by the community of Creswick and district, and Victorians generally. From her arrival as a young bride in 1901 until her death in 1948, she worked tirelessly for all.

In 2002, Lady Millie Peacock was added to the Victorian Honour Roll of Women. There are plans for one of the tunnels being built in Melbourne to be named after her.

#### **100 Years Ago** Complied by Creswick Museum

#### July 4, 1922

The light fall of snow last Thursday morning was followed by more at night, and again on Friday night. In some parts of the district snow was visible for three consecutive days.

#### July 7, 1922

Blampied – A new floor has been laid down in the Blampied R. C. School, and to celebrate the opening, a grand long-night ball is to be held next Tuesday evening. There will be good music, an efficient M.C., novelty dancing, etc., and refreshments will be provided. The admission for gentlemen has been fixed at 3/.

#### July 11, 1922

We are pleased to note that Mr. Oliver Wood, son of Mr and Mrs W. Wood, of Creswick, has been successful in passing the Commonwealth Accountancy examination held in May last.

#### July 14, 1922

It was reported to the Creswick Borough Council at the monthly meeting that the lease of the Dean Reservoir farm expires on  $1^{st}$  March, 1923. The Mayor moved, and Cr. Gray seconded, that applications be called for the lease. Cr. Cushing advocated a longer lease being provided for, and the tenant to carry out improvements and repairs. Cr. Wall did not agree with the latter proposal. It was finally decided that a committee comprising of the Mayor, Crs. Oswin, Cushing and Merritt, prepare fresh conditions of

lease, which will be reported to the council at the next meeting, after which tenders will be called for the lease of the farm.

#### July 18, 1922

Depositors in the Commonwealth Savings Bank are reminded that passbooks should now be submitted for examination and verification of balance. The local postmaster will accept and forward books to the branch where the account is kept.

#### July 21, 1922

NOTICE – An extraordinary meeting of shareholders in the Broomfield Alluviums Pty. Co. Ltd, will be held in the A.N.A. Hall, Creswick, on Saturday, 29<sup>th</sup> July, at 3 p.m. Business – to receive the Directors' Report and decide on the future operations of the Company. R. H. Nott, Sec.

#### July 25, 1922

An effort is now being made to raise funds to erect shelter sheds at the Creswick State School. In aid of that object, a grand picture show is to be held in the town hall tonight (Tuesday), and promises to be very successful.

#### July 28, 1922

Creswick Junior Football Club. Next Saturday (29<sup>th</sup> July, 1922) – Leopold Park, Creswick. Grand Charity Football match. Redan second eighteen v. Creswick juniors. In aid of the Creswick District Hospital Steriliser Fund. Admission – Sixpence. F. Bailey, Hon. Sec.
