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Dear Editor,



Before leaving Daylesford we did the 3km Sailors Falls short walk. Both being in our mid-eighties, we found this quite hard as all the way round it seemed either up or down with very few flat sections. Arriving at the Creswick Motel we met the proprietors Bill and Louise who were very welcoming and provided lots of info on local attractions. They told us that prior to taking over the motel about a month ago, they had previously managed post offices in Queensland and Tasmania. That night we had dinner at a rather up-market local pub. On Sunday morning we did a 6km walk through the town and round the St Georges Lake loop. On the way back we visited the local Museum which completed a morning full of interest and easy walking through attractive terrain. On the recommendation of the local tourist bureau, after lunch we did the 2.4km Victoria Heritage La Gerche walking track which is described as a lesson in reclaiming degraded landscape (in this case due to gold mining), and a celebration of the life of little known forester John La Gerche. We liked the walk so much we did it again the next morning before setting off home.

We found Creswick an enjoyable walking area within easy reach of Melbourne.

HONOUR ROLL INDUCTEE 2018 JOHN STEPHEN JAMES 1870 - 1950



Creswick Fire Brigade Uniform worn by John James c1920

A lifelong resident of Creswick, who gave exemplary service of fifty -four years to the Creswick Fire Brigade, and many years to the Mechanics Institute and free Library.

John Stephen James was born in North Creswick on 8 January 1870, to John Thomas James and Sarah Jane (nee Brown). The family lived in King Street and John Thomas was recorded as a miner and a drover. The other children of this marriage were Henry and Agnes (Mrs F Dean).

John Stephen was also known as 'Jack' and lived all his life in Creswick,

residing at King Street, Prince Street and Napier Street.

He married Eliza, daughter of Richard and Jane Woolcock who had moved to Creswick from Daylesford when Eliza was a young girl. Eliza and John had four daughters, Dorothy, Ivy, Pearl and Dulcie.


John was a grocer, a Commissioner for Taking Affidavits, a Mining Registrar from 1913 until his death and, at one period an Electoral Registrar.

Electoral rolls show he was a Librarian at the Creswick Mechanics Institute and Free Library for at least twentyeight years and also served as Secretary for many years. In their 2015 book *These walls speak volumes* Pam Baragwanath and Ken James said, '*Mechanics Institutes were local, independent, self-funded and self-help institutes. They were the first voluntary systems of libraries, educating and community-building in Victoria'* ... an important place in the development of the Creswick community.

On 28 June 1894, aged twenty-three, John joined the Creswick Fire Brigade and for the next seventeen years he served the Fire Brigade as a fireman at a time when the main means of extinguishing a fire was a ladder, a hose and a container of water. The men had to pull the hose reel to the fire site before fighting the fire. It was many years before rural Brigades became mechanised.

On 1 January 1910 John was appointed Secretary of the Fire Brigade, a position he held until his death in 1950. The duties entailed in being Secretary were to convene and hold meetings, to make records of the meetings and to deal with correspondence. He was commended annually for the meticulous way in which his books were maintained. In 1920 John was appointed to the position of Treasurer, a post he held for the next twenty-seven years, once again being praised for the manner in which he performed his duties.

In December 1920, John was appointed Station keeper for the Brigade, which required keeping the fire fighting equipment clean, safely stored and in good order, as well as



making sure the Hall was clean and neat. He continued in this role for fifteen years, until 1935. In all, John James gave the Creswick Fire Brigade fifty-four years of continuous service.

Mr James also played in the Creswick Drum and Fife Band as a boy, probably at nine or ten years old, and then played in the Creswick Brass Band. In 1896, while John was still in the band, a Bazaar was organised which made enough money to buy uniforms for the whole band.

John became more involved with the Fire Brigade and less with the band as band practice and fires sometimes clashed. In the *Creswick Advertiser* 'Personality of the Month' it was reported that Ralph Featherstone, the Band Master one day said to him, 'one or the other Jack, if you are going to stay in the band, you can't go marching off with the firemen on band nights.' He chose the fire brigade!

As well John was Master of the Creswick Havilah Masonic Lodge in 1910 and Lodge gardener in 1918. The garden was later turned into lawn.

It was very clear that he was highly respected in all the roles that he undertook. In the Minutes of the Creswick Fire Brigade 1923 Annual Meeting, Mr B Grose, a member of the Country Fire Brigades Board said, 'To say anything about Mr James would be like gilding refined gold or seeking to paint the lily.'

At the Centenary of the Fire Brigade Dinner, four years after Mr James' death, Mr C Daw, the Chief Officer said, 'I must mention one officer who has passed on. Your late Secretary, J. S. James, who gave so many years of faithful service, even to the end his books were well-nigh perfect.'

John James passed away on 23 December 1950, aged 80, and was buried in the Creswick Cemetery with Jane, who had predeceased him in 1947 aged 72.

Glen Park Street Library — Share the Joys of Reading



Street libraries are becoming very popular especially in the US and New Zealand. They are starting to become popular in Australia with over 600 officially registered. Glen Park is the first school in Ballarat to have a street library and only the fourth in the city.

The Street Library organisation says on their website:

Street Libraries are a beautiful home for books, planted in your front yard. They are accessible from the street, and are an invitation to share the joys of reading with your neighbours. Street Libraries are a window into the mind of a community; books come and go; no one needs to check them in or out. People can simply reach in and take what interests them; when they are done, they can return them to the Street Library network, or pass them on to friends.

There have not been mobile library visits to Glen Park in many years. Lately many young families have moved into the area and we wanted to not only provide access to quality junior fiction for those families but to also showcase the excellent library to the whole of our local community. The Glen Park School value reading and quality literature and want to make that available to pre-schoolers and those who don't even (yet) attend our school.

Currently there are brand new classic children's fiction including books suitable for pre-schoolers and for teens in the Street Library situated at the front of Glen Park school on Ralston's Road. So if you are passing Glen Park, stop and see what there is to borrow. The library will be updated regularly and have an adult reading month every July with books suitable for adults and a family month with books that might be interesting to parents of school age kids and adolescents every September.

THE ART OF LIVING

Fence lines, like song lines, define the rural landscape, linking moments of activity and events. These webs of wire and wood tracing across the countryside, some now so old and made with forgotten hands and tools. Encompassing, keeping in, keeping out.

To perceive the essence of these structures is to comprehend our tie to the land – as settlers and farmers – wanting to own and to belong. Before European occupation, the indigenous peoples had their own 'fences' – not of steel, wire and wood – but they knew exactly where the boundaries lay between different groups, families and tribes, and, would seek permission to enter other peoples' lands.

Our fences run across the land like calligraphy, or like musical annotation. They rise here, fall there. They link other interesting features – gates, sheds, stock ramps. Sometimes they seem to make no sense at all - running straight through a swamp or down a cliff face – just because some bureaucrat somewhere drew a line on a map! I have often marveled at how some of these fences, gates and stock ramps were built. When I think of that back breaking effort needed to cut hardwood, sink the postholes by hand and notch the timbers for the classic post and rail fence. Unbelievable.


I have drawn fence lines that run for hundreds of kilometres across gibber plains in the outback. Chipping out post holes in that country must have been hell. Not forgetting, of course, the incredible dog and rabbit proof fences constructed years ago but still needing regular upkeep.

At one location along the dog fence that is the Queensland, New South Wales and South Australian border in Sturt National Park – in the brick red sand near the scattered ruins of a fence keepers hut, I found a small bronze Australian Military Forces button. The story I have in my mind, is of a soldier returning from the noise and carnage of the First World War, taking up a job in one of the quietest and most peaceful parts of the country, near Camerons Corner on the three state border. My soldier still wears his army tunic as he rides the fence line making repairs. Of course, I can't prove any of it – except for the button in my hand – but it is a good story. I know that is where I would head for. It remains a favourite place of mine for that very solitude.

After many years working on mechanical themes in my art – mining, earth moving, construction – I find now I am increasingly drawn toward the organic, the handmade, the accidental, the incidental.

I am less preoccupied with how significant we are in the landscape, more with how insignificant we are.



Creswick a Living History logo Forestry History Art Conservation/Nature



Many people will have noticed that the revamped Creswick Hub now features a logo on the upstairs fabric of the building which is visible from the street. Titled *Creswick a Living History*, it was developed by the former Creswick Development Committee with community consultation in 2006 and funded via a Streetlife program. The logo was designed for multiple purposes with a suite of designs and products produced which included banners, poster template and a style guide. A Creswick brochure, printed business directory, Creswick website were also developed.

All logo designs are available free of charge for community groups to use if they wish to promote a Creswick event or with their own Club logo, or on printed matter related to Creswick. FAREWELL TO ST THOMAS AQUINAS CHURCH, CLUNES

In April present and past parishioners, members of St Augustine's Creswick congregation, those of other faiths and the people of Clunes gathered to bid farewell to the church of St Thomas Aquinas, Clunes.

Judy Houston, Assistant Director of the Organs of the Goldfields Festival, spoke of the historical and musical significance of the French harmonium from the mid-19th Century which has been gifted to the Clunes Museum. For the last time within the bluestone walls of the Henry Caselli designed church, which opened in 1874, former organists of the parish, Mary Loiacono (nee Power) and Anne Marie Culvenor, played the harmonium.

Meg Barry of Ullina spoke of all who had been part of the St Thomas Aquinas parish with its churches at Smeaton, Talbot and Lexton. They were the pioneers, the townsfolk and the miners from the golden days of Clunes, the farming families from the district, including her own family, who are remembered in the stained glass window behind the altar. She made special mention of the stained glass windows – the jewels of the church in memory of local families.

Research into the history of the church is ongoing and photographs have been taken to be placed in the Clunes Museum so the story of the parish will not be lost. Meg told of the women of the parish who did the flowers, polished the brass, the dedicated housekeepers of the presbytery, the choirs and the organists, the hard working Committees of men and women, who organized the many fund raising events, the Boxing Day sports. There were the parish priests who guided their flock and the teachers in the once thriving parish school. Who could forget the annual Catholic Ball at the Town Hall with the legendary suppers with tables sagging under the weight of cream cakes and sponges and the gallons of coffee boiled in the copper - no cappuccinos or lattes then!

On a lighter note with apologies to John O'Brien of Around the Boree Log, Meg recited,

'The Saint Thomas Aquinas congregation stood about,

Coat- collars to the ears,

And talked of stock, and crops, and drought,

As it had done for years'

There may have been more than one Hanrahan well known for his forecast of disaster

'We'll all be rooned before the year is out.'

There is so much to remember with gratitude from the early years of the small wooden chapels. It is fitting that the parish of St Thomas Aquinas has come full circle and now returns to the parish of St Augustine's where it all began. Many of those present adjourned to the Warehouse, adjacent to the Museum, cut the cake, shared memories and renewed old friendships. So it is farewell to the parish of St Thomas Aquinas Clunes.

Sincere thanks is extended to the many people involved in the organising and running of a very successful day.

June 4 1918

Ratepayers in the Borough of Creswick are reminded that unless their rates are paid before or on the 10th day of June, their names will be omitted from the ratepayers roll.

June 7 1918

In connection with the billeting of the men coming to Creswick on the itinerary tour arranged by the State Recruiting Committee, 30 out of the 35 billets necessary have been provided. The secretary (Mr. Down) would be glad if any willing to accommodate any more of the men would let him know today or tomorrow.

June 11 1918

Kingston- Potato Digging- Potato digging is in full swing throughout the district. Many good crops are being harvested. The weather is favourable, the farmers ought to have good results.

June 14 1918

A Local Land Board will sit at the Shire Hall, Kingston, next Tuesday at 10.30 am when Mr. Charles J. Joy (land officer) will hear evidence regarding the proposal to revoke the reservation of the Smeaton Racecourse and Ullina park.

June 18 1918

An urgent appeal is being made by the Australian branch of the Red Cross Society for the collection of petrol, benzine and kerosene tins and cases, for 6000 of these tins are needed each month to cut up to make smaller tins in which to despatch biscuits to prisoners of war; and the cases are needed in which to pack goods for the front, 1000 being needed immediately. In addition, 7lb treacle and golden syrup tins are required. The Creswick branch will be glad to receive donations of any of the above.

June 21 1918

A 'working bee' is set down for tomorrow (Saturday) commencing at 11 am to erect the tree guards in connection with the Creswick Shire Avenue of Honor in recognition of those who have gone to the front. It is hoped that there will be a large attendance of shire residents to take part in the work.

June 25 1918

Ullina – Despite a rather tempestuous evening a fair attendance of residents assembled at the Mechanics' Institute last Monday evening, for the purpose of considering the advisability of planting an avenue of honor in memory of the sacrifices made by the boys who enlisted from and have been associated with the district. After some discussion, in which the argument was brought forward that the planting of a local avenue of honor would be tantamount to repudiation of the shire avenue, it was unanimously decided that an avenue be planted. The idea of the shire avenue being planted on a lonely road south east of Kingston has not appealed very strongly to district residents, consequently the proposal to plant one locally is sure to be taken up enthusiastically, and carried out with patriotic thoroughness.

June 28 1918

Some time ago we announced that Corporal John L Mounsey had been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for gallant military conduct. – When a signal station near to his position was destroyed by shell fire he showed great promptness and resource in dealing with the situation. He laid a new line, and was the means of re-establishing communication with as little delay as possible. He had always shown great skill and determination at his work. Corporal Mounsey is a native of Allendale, and is 27 years of age. He is the eldest son of Mr Fletcher Mounsey and grandson of the late Mr. John Sloan and the late Mr. Lancelot Mousney.

A great night was held in Creswick Town Hall, for Heritage Week, when the Creswick & District Historical Society held its annual Honour Roll dinner. Three past citizens of the town were acknowledged for their contribution to the community - Mrs Cora Cartledge, Mr Douglas Lindsay and Mr John James.


