Youthrive Victoria Supporting young people and the community

Youthrive Victoria, located in the Old Post Office in Creswick, supports young rural Victorians and their communities.





Build It ... and They Will Come?

While in the process of trying to find a suitable indoor facility to introduce pickle ball to Creswick, it occurred to me that the lack of any multipurpose indoor sports/ recreation facility is a glaring deficiency for the Creswick people. Clunes has one and Daylesford's large complex is also part of the school (limiting day time access for the general community). These facilities offer basketball, netball, volleyball, squash, martial arts and fitness programs.

I understand that previous attempts to address this lack of amenity for the Creswick community have halted, particularly after government funds went to Ballarat. Now, before the process commences again, a committee formed and funding sought, I would like input from Creswickians about their views of the need and benefit for such an indoor facility.

I envisage that such a facility would offer a variety of sports and services including: basketball, netball, futsal, volleyball, badminton, pickle ball, table tennis, squash, fitness and exercise classes along with pre-school sports and dance sessions. There may also be provision for some hobby activity based rooms as well as an open area for art shows.

The actual services that would be provided would be subject to demand and further analysis. Some of these services are currently offered through the Creswick Neighbourhood Centre and Creswick U3A. As I see it, the land is available at the Doug Lindsay Reserve next to the bowls club. I would really appreciate the community's input about making a concerted effort to get Creswick a multi-purpose indoor recreation centre.

The annual House Athletics were held in Ballarat at the Llanberris Reserve track, where all the students came together to compete in the many events that they had previously practised. Whilst many things can be controlled the weather is not one. Horrendous conditions were endured on the day with rain, sweeping winds then patches of sunshine breaking through. Yet the smiles and the enthusiasm from everyone never waned. Staff were soaked through at times, students sought shelter constantly but families and friends continued their support. This again demonstrated the *community spirit* that is part of Creswick Primary School. The high jump needed to be postponed until the next day so the overall results were held over, with Drummond finally being announced as the victorious House for 2023.

Kingston, Friends of the Avenue Inc. Great Grant News

The Hon Natalie Suleyman MP, State Minister for Veterans recently informed Kingston, Friends of the Avenue that they had secured a \$46,509.00 grant under the *Restoring Community War Memorials and Avenues of Honour Grant Program*. This is to complete essential work in the Avenue. Hepburn Shire Council assisted in the preparation of the application so the Friends thank them for their input.

Most of the grant goes towards the urgent, high and some of the moderate priority tree works identified in the *Tree Management Plan (TMP)*, with \$4,024 set aside for replacing twenty-seven plaques and installing fifteen plaque mounts. Hepburn Shire Council will oversee the tree work.

The *TMP*, prepared by *Homewood Consultancy* and commissioned by Kingston, Friends of the Avenue in 2022, has identified fifteen trees that need to be replaced over the next three and a half years. The grant allows work to

commence on the eleven identified as most urgent. The life expectancy of an elm is 120 years and The Avenue trees are now 105 years old. Every attempt will be made to contact families associated with the trees that are to be removed, and where possible, involve them in the replanting. Soil testing assessments can now also be carried out.

On 31 May, members of the Ballarat South Probus Club came to lunch at the Commercial at Kingston to experience the *Kingston Remembers* Resource Centre and to learn about the Avenue. People who hadn't travelled through the Avenue before spoke of its overwhelming beauty. One person said, 'thank goodness for the overcast weather. It has made the autumn leaves glow'.

CRESWICK TOWN HALL



The Creswick Town Hall upgrade project was completed in mid-June with scaffolding being removed unveiling the varied and amazing skills which have gone into this conservation project.

The caretaker's cottage, projector box and a chimney were the last items to be finished off. The clock faces and mechanism have been cleaned, painted and serviced, and are back in use.

The paint, flagpole, roofing elements, glasing replacement, joinery work, clock tower access ladder, cast iron cresting remediation and chimney works all look incredible and have secured the building for future generations.

This project has been funded thanks to the Victorian Government, the Australian Government and Council.

CRESWICK MECHANIC'S INSTITUTE AND GOLD OFFICE

The condition upgrade is complete with scaffold removed, new gutters and downpipes, roof and flashing repairs, path and stormwater remediation all complete. Now there will be a period of settlement to commence before further works are completed in the coming years. This project was funded by Council.







CREEK CLEANING

We have been working with our Community Recovery Committee, established in response to the January and October 2022 storms, on a community-led approach to recovery and future planning. We are progressing with important works such as the creek clean-up in Creswick. This important group is made up of 10 appointed community representatives along with Cr Tim Drylie, Cr Don Henderson and Council officers. We sincerely thank committee members for their continued contribution.

Introducing Dr Elizabeth Boulton

Is Creswick the way to Destination Safe Earth?

Both life-experience and scholarly research have led Dr Elizabeth Boulton to believe that community is the key to surviving a global disaster.

Liz was born in Melbourne but moved with her family to Ballarat in 1987 where she and her siblings (two brothers and a sister) attended Ballarat High School. Keen on rowing, her mum once suggested she consider joining the Navy, which somehow seemed linked! She did join the Navy, but whilst undertaking Officer Cadet training at the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA), she learnt more about the Army, decided it

was a better fit for her and transferred. Being keen on bushwalking and rock-climbing and prone to sea sickness, might have had something to do with this!

Liz served with the Australian Army from 1990 to 2005. She was with the first contingent to East Timor in 1999 and also served in Iraq. Achieving the rank of Major, Liz's time in the Army gave her a good grounding in leadership skills and logistic strategy and planning.

In 2004 she read a book about climate change. Further research told her that nothing was being planned about preparing the world for a climate emergency. As she puts it: 'No one was joining the dots'. After leaving the Army, Liz completed a Master of Climate Policy at the University of Melbourne then worked at the Bureau of Meteorology.

Dr Boulton's interest in Creswick began at Ballarat High School while studying Australian History. Her history teacher, Jimmy Stewart, suggested she do her main assignment on historical oral transcriptions which described interactions between European and Chinese miners during the gold rush. Liz concluded that the Creswick goldfields had little incidence of serious problems between the two groups, in part due to a number of key community leaders who kept calm amongst the local populace. This early realisation laid the foundations for Liz's later thinking about how to tackle a possible existential threat in the future. This may also be the reason Liz decided to settle in Creswick in 2017. It was her safe place when personal issues got too much and she needed a refuge.

Liz subsequently completed a PhD at the Australian Nnational University. Her research developed the idea that, considered together, global warming and general environmental degradation constitute a new type of threat



which she calls a hyperthreat, needing a new strategy. Dr Boulton applies military analytical and planning tools to consider how to contain this hyperthreat. She proposes a solution, Plan E, a climate/eco-centred security strategy with a civilian-led Hyper-Response Force. It takes a layered approach to mobilisation (which is different from militarisation) focusing on action at local levels.

Liz spent many hours working towards her PhD and walking around our lakes, thinking and healing. The local community, the RSL and St Andrew's Uniting Church in particular, were great

supports, and cemented in her mind that a strong local community was not only important to an individual's emotional health, but was also vital to any plan for combatting the effects of a global emergency.

Boulton's research has been acknowledged internationally. In the USA, the US Marine Corps published her Plan E, while in the UK, she is a research affiliate at the Climate (in)Security Project involving Oxford University and the British Army. Until recently, she believes the Australian Defence sector had not come to grips with her sophisticated thinking. This changed, however, in April this year when she ran a war-gaming activity at the Australian National University which explored a severe heatwave crisis in South East Asia. The Australian Army supported and participated in this activity.

She has had numerous articles published in academic publications and has provided reports and submissions to a number of government reviews and inquiries. Dr Boulton is also happy to speak to community groups and organisations. In March, she was invited as the key-note speaker at Hepburn Shire's International Women's Day event.

Her ideas are certainly big picture, requiring big picture planning and solutions, but Liz will be the first to tell you that action at a local level, a bottom-up approach, is key to these solutions. She has now decided to move back to Melbourne to be closer to family, but it is gratifying to think that her time in Creswick, in the arms of what we know to be a kind, supportive community, may have led her to Plan E, a way to reach Destination Safe Earth.

100 Years Ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

June 1, 1923

The long heralded production "Peck's Bad Boys" with lovable little Jackie Coogan as the Star, will be the feature shown at the Creswick Pictures on Saturday night. The popularity enjoyed by this splendid picture of boyhood days, with this six year old screen favorite, has seldom, if ever, been equalled by any other production shown here.

June 5, 1923

The official opening of the works at North Creswick of the Creswick Brick, Tile and Potteries Limited took place yesterday afternoon, and, despite the inclemency of the weather, passed off successfully, there being a good attendance. Mrs. M. T. Batkin (Wife of the managing director) started the machinery, and Mrs. S. Fiddian (wife of one of the directors) laid the commemoration stone.

June 8, 1923

Smeaton Coursing Club – First meeting for season, Saturday, 16th June.

Puppy Stakes - 8 at £1/1/- each. Winner £5. Runner up, £2/12/-

All Aged Stakes - 8 at 30/ each. Winner £7. Runner up, £3/16/-.

Creswick Visitor Information Centre

Last month the Creswick Visitor Information Centre (*CVIC*) had more than 600 visitors.

The *CVIC* is staffed six days a week, 10.00am to 4.00pm, including weekends and public holidays. It is currently closed on Wednesdays. Volunteers work in pairs for three hour shifts. Some have been doing this for a very long time and some dedicated volunteers work two or more shifts per month.

The most common queries from visitors are to do with walks, bike tracks, prospecting and mining history. Often, people come in who are looking to connect with family members who once lived here. Then there are the practicalities like where to camp or park caravans and what accommodation is available locally. The *CVIC* volunteers provide local and regional maps, and can tell visitors what's on today and where. Then there are

the random questions like 'Why does Creswick have so many dogs?' and 'Where can we eat?'. When answering the latter question, strict impartiality is Information Centre policy.

During the year, volunteers visit newly established or previously little known attractions in order to keep up with what could be of interest to visitors. This ensures that volunteers provide accurate and up-to-date information. A recent visit was to the new *Research Centre* for the Kingston Avenue of Honour which showcases a wonderful display of WWI memorabilia. This display is located just off the bar at the Commercial Hotel, Kingston.

New volunteers are always welcome so if you are interested do come in, meet those volunteers on duty and pick up an

application form. Application forms can also be found on the Hepburn Shire Council website. New volunteers are initially paired with more experienced people until they feel confident. This is a great way to meet new people, both fellow volunteers and visitors, and to learn more about our beautiful town and surrounding regions.
