A Focussed Forecast

Fair Weather for Jane Bunn





A crowd of over 150 packed the hall at Smeaton Recreation Ground on Thursday, 21 February to experience TV weather presenter Jane Bunn's unique style. A qualified meteorologist, Jane gave a clear and concise explanation of our local weather patterns and what we could expect weather-wise over the next few weeks and months.

Her talk was followed by a presentation from the Dean/Newlyn Young Farmers and their support for mental health initiatives. This event was organised and sponsored by Creswick & District Community Bank[®] Branch and Rural Bank.

Huntley's Supermarket Family was at the 'Heart of Creswick'

Bill Huntley, who passed away in 2003, together with his brother Ian, owned and ran Huntley's Supermarket which was an institution in Creswick for nearly fifty years. Whilst speaking with Ian, Iris Huntley (Bill's wife) and with longterm employees, one is struck by the closeness and camaraderie they still display together – even more than fifteen years since the shop at 47 Albert Street was sold. In fact, as they all agree – it was like they were one big family.

Bill purchased the shop at 47 Albert Street in 1954 from D H Moar. Mr Moar had owned it for five or six years before he retired due to a back injury. As Ian points out: 'Shifting stock in a supermarket is very hard on the body'.

Before 1957, the store was a 'Service Grocery Store' – people would come to the counter and ask for their requirements. This also meant that orders from outlying customers would be taken at their homes and returned to the store to be filled then delivered back to them the next day. Ken Neil, a long-term employee with Huntley's, remembers riding out to get the orders on his bike after school.

Ian and Bill's grandfather opened their original store at 85 Clunes Road, North Creswick (now the location of Flemo's), in 1916. During the depression of the 1930s, their mother took over the store which in those days sold as much animal feed as normal groceries. Ian Huntley continued running that store till it was sold in 1974, then joined his brother Bill at the new store as the 'fruit and veg man'. Indeed, together with his wife Beth, and Bill and his wife Iris, they made a formidable family business partnership.

Innovation was a catch-cry at Huntley's. They became a selfservice supermarket in 1957. In the 1990s Huntley's became the first supermarket in Western Victoria to install new registers with scanners – even before Ballarat had them. Ian remembers that customers were very wary of this new technology at first. Another innovation was seven-day a week trading. Bill and Ian were initially reluctant to extend their hours as it played havoc with family weekend sporting commitments, but by the early 1990s, the store was open seven days a week.

Huntley's had numerous brand reincarnations over the years: *4-Square* in the 1950s, *Goodfellow* in the 60s and 70s, *Rite-way* in the 70s, *Foodway* in the 80s and 90s until finally finishing as *Foodrite* before it was sold in 2003. All these names belonged to *Composite Buyers*, a buying group servicing independent groceries throughout Victoria and the Riverina. Bill Huntley was a Director of *Composite Buyers* for a number of years.

In the early days, the groceries were transported from the warehouse in Melbourne by rail. Goods were loaded on the train, then trucked from Creswick station to the premises. Ian concedes that this kept trucks off the roads, but it was not the most efficient system. The goods suffered damage when rail trucks were shunted roughly from one train to another, and there was also the issue of double handling – bags of sugar and flour could easily burst when delivered first by truck to the train and then taken off the train onto another truck to the supermarket. By the mid 1970s, Huntley's groceries were delivered by road with the advantage of door to door deliveries.

Road Replaces Rail

In 1972 an Enquiry was held in Victoria, set up by then Premier Henry Bolte, into the Deregulation of Road Transport. Bill and local transport operator, David Preston, put together a submission which was presented to the Hearing in Ballarat supporting deregulation and allowing road transport to operate freely in the state of Victoria. Prior to this all freight had to be moved by rail.

In 1974 as a result of this Inquiry road transport was given more freedom to move freight by road and Preston's transport company started carting groceries from Melbourne to Huntley's and has continued to do so for the past fortyfive years including to the present day IGA Supermarket.

As Creswick's population grew, so did customers' expectations. Major extensions were undertaken in 1986, at a cost of \$300,000. The fruit and vegie section was expanded, a new deli was built and fresh meat was added to the offerings. Even the old dunny out the back (which reportedly was also the place for the local SP bookie) was replaced.

Bill's wife, now widow, Iris, was in charge of the accounts her whole married life. She remembers working first on a very old typewriter, but when thinking about changing to an electric typewriter, her daughter frightened her with the story that the keyboard was different on the new machines. It was not long, however, before she taught herself to use computers too.

Huntley's was well-known for employing local young people. Many Creswickians growing up in the second half of the last century were given their very first jobs at Huntley's – packing shelves or working on the registers. Neither Ian nor Iris have any idea how many they took on but think 'it would have been in the hundreds'.

It is clear that Huntley's were very good employers who inspired strong loyalty. Ken Neil worked there for over forty -six years – as storeman, night-fill manager and all around 'fixer'. His wife Joan was there for almost thirty years too, working the registers and being a 'deli-rat'. 'We cooked a lot of chooks!' They still chuckle at the jokes and tricks they played, together with Janette Squires and Tony Ryan, also long-term employees.

Huntley's really was the heart of Creswick. Former customers will tell you that this was the place to see neighbours and friends and catch up with news and gossip. Customers would go in for one or two items and leave an hour later, having caught up with the latest news and footy scores.

The Huntley brothers were well known for their kindness and community mindedness. When the big fire came through Creswick in 1977, the Red Cross was set up at the RSL Hall, making tea and sandwiches for the helpers. Bill Huntley came into the Hall and handed the supermarket keys to the ladies telling them to help themselves to whatever they needed. This sort of kindness engendered a fierce loyalty amongst their customers that lives on today.

Steve Sellars, together with three partners, purchased the supermarket from the Huntleys in 2003. Steve is in awe, and extremely grateful, for the support that the townspeople and staff members continue to show the supermarket, now branded *IGA*. He is confident that his plans for the new store in construction across the road will more than repay their loyalty. Those plans will be detailed in the *CDN* April issue. Stay tuned for the next chapter in this Creswick institution!

Trip to France Representing Hepburn Shire and Daylesford RSL

On 18 April, 2018 both Lilli Bowyer, a senior student from Daylesford College (formerly Daylesford Secondary College) and Penny Ellis, the College Vice Principal, embarked on an adventure that would take them halfway around the world to France. As part of their journey, they would have the opportunity to represent the Hepburn Shire Council and Daylesford RSL at the Villers-Bretonneux Centenary Service. They spent two weeks in France, visiting four towns: Paris, Amiens, Rouen and Le Havre. These locations were chosen for their convenience of access and their cultural history with consideration given to budget and time constraints. Both Lilli and Penny are very appreciative of the opportunity and wish to express their gratitude for the community's contributions, donations, time and interest in this trip, as well as the opportunities and experiences they have had while in France and since returning.

The purpose of the trip to France was to explore the longstanding connection between the Hepburn Shire, especially Daylesford College, and the Victoria School in Villers-Bretonneux. John Grant (a former staff member at the college) and his students, crafted wooden carvings as a gift to the Victoria School to be displayed in the school hall, representing Australia's good-will towards France after the war. The selection process for the Scholarship required a written application followed by a panel interview consisting of representatives from Daylesford College, Daylesford RSL and Hepburn Shire Council.

Villers-Bretonneux is a tiny village town, thirty minutes from Amiens and two hours from Paris with a population similar to Creswick. During World War I, as the Germans made their attack on the Somme, they planned to capture the town of Amiens. For this to happen, first they had to apprehend Villers-Bretonneux, in which the Germans succeeded on 24 April, 1918. In the late hours of the same day, the 13th and 15th Australian Brigades fought and surrounded the Germans, resulting in the recapture of Villers-Bretonneux on



25 April. Unfortunately, the town was left in ruins and with the destruction of many buildings, the children were consequently left without a school. Generously, the school children from Victoria raised enough money to rebuild the school in Villers-

Bretonneux as a proof of their love and good-will towards France. As a result, the school was named the Victoria School. Amazingly, inside the school hall are wooden carvings that were made by John Grant and his students from the then Daylesford Technical School, forever bestowing a connection to our community.

Penny and Lilli were immensely excited to attend the Villers-Bretonneux Centenary Service, which was held at the Australian National Memorial in Villers-Bretonneux. The Centenary was to commemorate 100 years since the Australians retook the town of Villers-Bretonneux. Lilli noted that she underestimated just how cold it would be that morning, but agreed that, 'it is a small sacrifice to make for such a life-changing opportunity'. She continued saying, 'it was emotional yet beautiful to see pictures of soldiers as their faces were displayed.' With the conclusion of the service, Lilli and Penny proudly laid a beautiful wreath, made by volunteers from the Hepburn Shire, during the public wreath laying. You may have spotted them on the ABC broadcast of the commemorations. They had hoped to visit the Sir John Monash Centre in Villers-Bretonneux later that day but were unable to make it due to the severe train strikes throughout France.

Both Lilli and Penny would like to say a heartfelt thank you to both the Hepburn Shire Council and the Daylesford RSL for sponsoring their trip. They expressed that this opportunity has changed their lives in many significant ways, saying that they, 'will hold onto these memories forever.'

The Art of Living By Craig Barrett



When I was about four years old, I was given my first set of oil pastels. Opening the lid on that little box of jewels, I was hooked. I can still remember that oily smell of that small rainbow coloured dozen. I must have been about thirteen when my oldest brother lit the fuse to shape my adult life by giving me a beginners set of oil paints. That brought everything together – the smell of oil and turps, the feel of a brush, and, the colour. No longer bound by the colours supplied by the manufacturers of pastels and pencils, I could now mix my own.


Colour is such an amazing phenomenon. It *colours* our thinking in so many ways. We talk of someone having a colourful past, a colourful personality or using colourful language. I don't know about you, but I even dream in vivid colour. Whether it be the clothes we wear, the flowers we like, or in a myriad of other ways, we express ourselves and our personalities through the colours that furnish our lives.

One famous English maker of artists' paints produces almost one hundred and twenty different colours in oils and one hundred in water colours. Most artists in a lifetime would not use them all. Most of us would probably not select more than a dozen or so. I seem to stay with about ten favourites. So many extraordinary works of art have been created with a very limited palette of colour. The unbelievably rich cave paintings of the first Australians immediately spring to mind, similarly the cave paintings of prehistoric Europe, and both using only black, white, red and yellow ochre. The Egyptians, Greeks and Romans also produced fabulous works with a small range of colour.

Historically, pigments for paint were often very expensive. In the thirteenth century, the gem stone lapis lazuli, which we use to make the beautiful ultramarine blue, was actually more expensive than gold. Many of the pigments used were extremely toxic and probably shortened the life of medieval artists significantly – red lead for example and vermillion, (a wonderful but unhealthy cocktail of sulphur and mercury). I have hanging in my hallway a fourteenth century manuscript written in these pigments. I also have a recipe from a twelfth century French abbot for the making of black ink for manuscripts. In short, it involves the boiling down of bark from acacia trees – reducing and reducing further until a paste remains. The paste is then allowed to dry completely into a solid ink block. When the liquid ink is required it is ground in a pestle and mortar with RED wine - voila!

By the way, we don't all see colour the same way. Many insects and birds see in ultra violet light. For all his peacock glory, his peahen girlfriend doesn't see it. She only sees a hazy purplish display. Must be his dancing that impresses.





CRESWICK DISTRICT NEWS

100 years ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

March 4, 1919

Members of the Loyal Prince of Wales Lodge, M.U.I.O.O.F., are notified that a meeting will be held on Wednesday (Tomorrow) evening, at 8 o'clock. The business is important.

March 7, 1919

Heavy Rain- District Registrations. In the early hours of Tuesday morning a shower of rain took place, and at 9 am the registration at the local town hall was 7 points. Between that time a little after 12 o'clock noon, there was a couple of thunderstorms, which registered 74 points. At 9 am on Wednesday the register was 76 points additional, making 1 inch 50 points for the 24 hours, and 1 inch 57 points since the commencement of the rain.

March 11, 1919

After an extended vacation, caused through the epidemic of pneumonic influenza, the State Schools opened yesterday for the first time since the "breaking up" last December.

March 14, 1919

The annual St. Patrick's Day sports and races at Blampied will be held in Boyd's paddock tomorrow (Saturday) afternoon. This gathering has proved successful for years past, and the indications point to another good meeting tomorrow. Horse, foot and athletic events constitute the programme, and a real good day's sport is promised for 1/-.

March 18, 1919

S. Brinsden and Sons, General Storekeepers, High Street, Kingston, desire to publicly announce that they have sold the business to Mrs. Scobie of Mollongghip. They desire to tender their sincere thanks for support accorded them by the General public for over 50 years, and trust that Mrs. Scobie will receive the same generous treatment.

March 21, 1919

Tenders are invited for the purchase, for removal of a portion of the Bull and Mouth Hotel, Creswick, containing approximately 20,000ft of ½ in and 1 in pine lining and flooring; walls 10, 11, 12 feet weatherboard pine, and hardwood; roofing iron, 6ft to 10 ft sheets. All material in good order.

Tenders, returnable to Geo. Tait, Creswick, on or before March 24, 1919. The lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted.


March 28, 1919

Now reading a book was my favourite pleasure, I still have them all, they're my favourite treasure. But do they need shelves of books like we do? No, you can read your book on your computer too.


