Dr Jim Edgar 11.1.1940 – 4.1.2022 Former Principal Victorian School of Forestry, Creswick

James Graham (Jim) Edgar was described in moving tributes, upon his death, as a quiet, intelligent man with a good academic brain, who loved the bush, held a strong sense of justice and believed in helping those around him.

Jim grew up in Warrnambool, one of six children, and completed his schooling at the local High School. Jim's father was killed in a logging accident in 1947 when Jim was seven. The impact of this had a great influence on him which helped shape his character especially as his father asked him to 'Look after your mother'. Evidence was seen of his caring nature later in life, as mentioned by daughter Elizabeth, in his special care and attention of both his wife, Margaret and Elizabeth.

Statistics during 1966-68. In 1968 Jim moved from lecturing to establishing and managing the first Creswick Research Station with an emphasis on native forest silviculture and growth modelling. Jim's native forest research was put on hold when, during the early 1970s, he was awarded a Rockefeller Fellowship at the Institute for Environmental Quality and School of Natural Resources at the University of Michigan, USA. Jim's studies and research in the area of natural resources economics and modelling culminated with him achieving his PhD (Thesis title: A multiple objective approach to planning and use of public forest lands. University of Michigan). Unfortunately,

Jim's research and findings were never fully acted upon.

Jim's mother knew the importance of a good education and worked hard to give her children every opportunity. After matriculating, Jim attended the Victorian School of Forestry (VSF) (now the University of Melbourne School of Ecosystem and Forest Sciences) on a Forests Commission Victoria scholarship from 1957 to 1959. After graduating in 1959, Jim and some of his student colleagues remained in touch over the years. They were able to have contact with him when, in recent months, Jim was in care in Geelong. Jim completed his Bachelor of Science in Forestry at the University of Melbourne in 1962-63. His early forestry career saw postings to the Casterton Forest District (FD), the Phasmid Survey program (studying the extent of stickinsects affecting eucalypts) in north east Victoria and the Forest Districts of Barmah and then Orbost, at the time the resources of the Errinundra Plateau in East Gippsland were opened up.

Jim and his wife, Margaret (Solly) from Porepunkah, met at a dance in Bright. They married in Bright in 1963. The couple had four children Stephen, Matthew (dec), Elizabeth and Paul. In their early years they lived in Orbost till they moved to Ballarat for a short time before settling in Creswick.

In 1966 Jim was transferred from Orbost to Creswick as a Lecturer and taught Silvics, Silviculture (the growing and

His son, Steve, remembers with gratitude and affection their time spent in the USA living and experiencing the life of America. He has memories of his dad in their apartment spending hours typing up his thesis, using two fingers, on an old typewriter.

Returning to Australia, Jim continued to expand field research at Creswick and across Victoria until he was appointed Principal at the Victorian School of Forestry Creswick in 1978, a position he held until 1981. During this time, Jim oversaw the graduation of the first female VSF students and the last VSF diploma graduates. Jim also managed the transition of the VSF Diploma course to a joint VSF and University of Melbourne operation and the first University Bachelor of Forest Science Degree course.

Former lecturer and researcher, Barry Tomkins, remembers working with Jim as a Principal who supported the staff and had confidence in their ability to carry out their work and research. Another colleague, Dr Kevin Tolhurst, AM, remembers how Jim was willing to delegate authority to his staff for their own professional development even though he had the capacity to do the work himself. Jim was a good leader, but acted with the interest of others at the forefront of his mind.

For approximately the next twenty years after his role as Principal, Jim pursued his career in the Victorian State Government in various departments and roles. Initially, he was appointed Deputy Director General of the then new Ministry of Employment and Training with responsibility for a range of employment programs, TAFE funding and apprenticeship programs. With subsequent State Government changes and re-organisations, Jim was appointed to senior executive positions in the new Business and Employment and Industry Services Ministries. During this time Jim and Margaret continued to live in Creswick and be involved in the local community.

In 2000, Jim returned to forest research in a managerial role at the Forest Science Centre, School of Forestry, Creswick. The following is an extract from an article which appeared in the *Creswick District News* in January, 2001.

'Forest Research is Booming

Few people in the district realise that Creswick is now the centre for a forest research organisation of world repute.

The new Forest Science Centre sits high on Eastern Hill, at the top of the School of Forestry campus. Building on over 100 years of forest history at Creswick, the Centre is now the headquarters of a research alliance with some 120 research staff. It brings together all of the basic, applied and post graduate forest research activities conducted by the Department of Natural Resources, Centre for Forest Tree Technology and the Creswick, Melbourne, Dookie and Burnley campuses of the University of Melbourne.

At that time, Interim Director of the Forest Science Centre and former Principal of the School of Forestry, Dr Jim Edgar said, 'This is just one, very visible sign of a series of leading edge research activities now taking place in Creswick'.

Forest fire, sustainable native forest silviculture, plantation and farm forest management, watershed management, forest nutrition and pests and diseases are other areas where research teams of the Centre are at the forefront of developments.

Again he became involved in a transition phase of the amalgamation of DNRE/DSE research (Department of Natural Resources and Environment and Department of Sustainability and Environment) with the University of Melbourne.'

On retirement in 2005, Jim started and ran an agribusiness consulting company in areas of which he had great knowledge, expertise and experience of forestry, water, wind and agriculture. With his strong interest in native forest silviculture and growth modelling and multi– resource forest development, Jim authored or co-authored papers, reports, and consultancies over his career and taught many younger foresters the rudiments of the craft.

Apex Involvement

Jim was a Founding Member and member of the first Committee when the Apex Club was formed in Creswick

during 1967. At the time Jim was on the staff of the Victorian School of Forestry. Apex was a young men's service club and Jim became very committed. He believed strongly in helping others in the community and took part in many working bees and fundraising. A thoughtful man, Jim was very astute at meetings when the discussion wandered off the point and a quiet comment from him would bring the members back to the point being discussed. Jim was also a member of the successful Public Speaking and Debating Team of the Club.

On leaving the Apex Club Jim joined the local OASIS Club (Old Apexians Still Interested in Service) where his service to the community continued for a number of years. Advancing years saw club members mainly enjoying each other's company socially. Jim is remembered by OASIS members for his generosity at the Dutch Auctions where money raised was given to charity.

After Margaret's death in 2016, Jim lived on at Creswick until ill health saw him make the move to Aged Care in Geelong. **Vale Dr Jim Edgar**

COUNCIL NEWS

COM LOCAL PROJECT UPDATES

Hammon Park trailhead: Council has awarded a tender for construction of the Hammon Park Trailhead, with works set to start in coming weeks. The community space will include a cycling jumps course, learn to ride circuit, additional parking and more. Hammon Park will be closed to the public during some parts of construction.

Creswick Trails: In January, Council formally issued a planning permit to construct 60kms of mountain bike and shared use trails in Creswick. This is a significant milestone for the project. Council is now finalising land manager consent to construct, with the view to go to tender for construction in 2022.

Council received a \$2.1 million grant from the Victorian Government for Hammon Park Trailhead and \$2.65 million for the Creswick Trail Network. Find out more at https://creswicktrails.com.

Pearman Street works: Works will start in March to improve a section of Pearman Street between Water and Victoria streets in Creswick. It includes upgrade to the road, drainage, kerb and channel, and construction of a footpath to connect Calembeen Park and Creswick Community Park with Hammon Park. The upgraded section will become one-way to traffic (south to north) with exceptions for emergency vehicles.

WINEW PLANNING SCHEME

The Minister for Planning has approved the C80Hep Hepburn Planning Scheme amendment, which builds on the significant work of Council and the community in recent years. The amendment protects our towns from inappropriate planning and development and bring the scheme up to current planning standards. It also sets out strategic work that will be undertaken over the next few years.

There will be opportunities for the community to get involved in structure planning for each town. We will share more information on this in coming months.

Ongoing works at the Cemetery have seen the dangerous gum trees removed near the front of the cemetery. It is hoped to replace these, in the planting season, with a row of flowering gums behind the rose garden. This will give people the option of having ashes interred near the trees.

A big thank you to the volunteers from the Trust who have been helping with repairs and maintenance around the cemetery. This is much appreciated.

What a fantastic feeling to start Term 1 with a lot of 'normality' happening across the school.

The Foundation students commence full time attendance this month, which is very important for their learning routines as they now experience both classroom and Specialist (Art, PE and LOTE) subjects. They have also been linking in with some of our older students as their Buddies

100 Years Ago

March 3, 1922

Memories of the mining disaster at Creswick 40 years ago are recalled by the death at Oxley of Cornelius Quirk, a retired railway employee, aged 64 years. Quirk, who had lived in Victoria for 62 years, went to work at the age of 22 years in the Australasian gold mine at Creswick, and was in the terrible catastrophe that occurred in that mine in 1882. He was one of the 27 men who went below on a memorable Sunday night, and were all shortly afterwards entombed by the inrush of water from the old workings.

March 7, 1922

Three new life governors of the Creswick District Hospital were appointed at the meeting of the committee of management last Thursday evening. Mr. John Clifton, Mr. Jas. McKay and Mr. John Miles.

March 10, 1922

Kooroocheang Energetic League

A meeting of the Kooroocheang and District Energetic League took place on Saturday evening last, in the Kooroocheang State School, to make arrangements for their annual wood sawing at the Creswick Hospital.

March 14, 1922

Mounted Constable Mason, who has done duty in Creswick for over five years past, has received notice that he has been appointed to take charge of the Gordon Police Station. His successor will be Mounted Constable Montgomery, who will come from Gordon.

March 17, 1922

The Clunes Knitting Mills (Cuttle Pty. Ltd.) will shortly have two vacancies for female clerks. Full particulars may be obtained from the firm.

March 21, 1922

Residents are reminded of the public meeting convened by the Mayor for tomorrow (Wednesday) evening, in the council chambers, to make arrangements for the commemoration of Anzac Day.

March 24, 1922

The firemen were called out on Wednesday afternoon by the ringing of the bells. The location of the fire was at Frenchman's Gully, where furze, etc., had become ignited. The fire approached very close to the residence of Mrs. Tute, and the roof caught alight, but the firemen extinguished it at once.

March 28, 1922

Cricket – Junior Match

Long Point played the combined schools last Saturday, the scores supplied showing a win for the former by 25 runs. Long Point made 45 and 130 (Ellis, retired, 87) and the schools 55 and 95.

March 31, 1922

Parents and the public generally will be interested to learn that in connection with the Kindergarten recently formed, a demonstration of kindergarten work will be given next Sunday afternoon in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Sunday School, at 3 o'clock, by Miss Johnston, of Ballarat. A cordial invitation is given to all to be present.
