Community Supports Community


Creswick & District Community Bank and John Curtin Aged Care

Neville Cartledge OAM Scouting 65 Year Service Award

Neville was one of the original thirty four youths who joined the 1st Creswick Scout Troop on their re-establishment in 1950/51. Obviously he was impressed with what the Boy Scouts Association

had to offer as he is still active to this day. During the sixty seven years Neville has held positions at 1st Creswick as Troop Leader, Assistant Scout Leader, Scout Leader, Senior Scout/Venturer Leader and eventually Wendouree/Central Highlands/Kulin and District Leader.

Neville has been involved as a Member of 'The Lord Baden Powell Society' since 1997, the 'Australian Scout Fellowship,' since 1998 and the Pax Hill Heritage Committee Ballarat since 2001. Neville is a devoted collector of Scouting Memorabilia having attended seventeen Australian and one World Jamboree as well as the 8th World Rover Moot, (similar to a Jamboree for 18-25 year olds Rover Scouts), he has a significant collection. Having retired from Australian Timken after forty years of employment, Neville accepted an Invitation to join the Pax Hill Heritage Committee. He manages the Display Area in the Heritage Centre with a mixture of Pax Hill's and his own personal collection. With the help of members Neville sets up displays in the Gold Museum at Sovereign Hill, Ballarat Library and the Ballarat Agricultural Society Show, and in 2009 was presented with a Sash for the Best Large Indoor Display at the Ballarat Agricultural Society Show in 2009.

Scout Jamborees

Neville's introduction to Scout Jamborees was with seven other 1st Creswick Scouts when they attended the 5th Jamboree, held at Clifford Park Victoria, in 1955/56 and he found it an enjoyable and interesting ten days. The next Jamboree was in Sydney and Neville's enthusiasm continued to the 21st at Elmore in 2007, a total of seventeen plus the 16th World Jamboree in 1988 and the 8th World Rover Moot in 1991.

Neville's roles at the Jamborees included an Assistant Leader, Leader with three Assistants looking after thirty-six scouts. There are several hundred Leaders appointed to staff positions at Jamborees. Neville's appointment was working in the Staff Kitchen and the Scouter Fraternity marquee. At the 14th Jamboree Neville attended, his role was with the Scout Shop, what a great job! His role in the Scout Shop continued at six of the next seven Jamborees plus at the 16th World Jamboree and 8th World Rover Moot.


Chief Commissioner Bob Taylor, who Neville had worked with at Jamborees, presented Neville with his 55 Year and 60 Year Awards and on 18 March, 2018, in the presence of 100 members of his family and guests presented Neville with his 65 Year Award. Neville is only the second Ballarat District Leader to receive a 65 Year Service Award.

Queen Scouts

In June 1967 Neville was Appointed Senior Scout Leader at 1st Creswick and in October 1968 was appointed Senior Scout Leader of Wendouree District while still maintaining his role as Senior Scout Leader/Venturer Leader of 1st Creswick until his retirement in 1998. During his time as Senior Scout/Venturer Leader at Creswick, Neville trained thirty-two Queen Scouts from the first in 1967 to the last in 1995. Venturers travelled from Ballarat and Daylesford to join the active and committed 1st Creswick Unit. He enthusiastically followed their successes and achievements in business and community life.

In a leadership role, Neville co-ordinated seven Venturer Leadership Training Weekends from 1976 to 1988 some at Eastern Hill Camp Creswick and others at Pax Hill Ballarat. This was compulsory training for 272 Venturers as part of their Queen Scouts Award. The majority of attendees went on to become Queen Scouts, while most were from the Ballarat Area, others were Venturers from Cobden, Eaglehawk, Terang, Camperdown, Hawkesdale, Allensford, Simpson and Metropolitan Groups. Neville's role as District Venturer Leader included being Examiner on Initiative Courses and Hiking Expeditions.

Neville was the driving force through Ballarat Jaycee's to build the bush toilets at Pax Hill in 1969. He also designed and made scale models of obstacles for Apex Club Members to use in the construction of the Obstacle Course at Pax Hill in 1981.

Neville's wife, Sheila, has been a great supporter for him during the last fifty-four years attending a number of Scout Jamborees in Australia as well as the 8th World Rover Moot. Their sons, Richard, Nicholas and Bradley have all been active in the Scouting Movement, attending Jamborees and achieving the Queen Scout Award with Richard and Nicholas achieving the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award.

Neville was Awarded a *Certificate for Good Service* in February 1973 and a *Silver Acorn* on Founders Day 22 February 1983. (Both Awards Were Presented by the Governor of Victoria who holds the position of Chief Scout.)

Obviously with his Jamboree Experience, involvement with youth as well as his vast collection of Scouting Memorabilia, Neville assisted Phil Roberts in writing the *Golden Century of Scouting Book* which was launched by the Governor and Chief Scout of Victoria, Professor David de Kretser AC, on 9 May 2009.

What a great achievement over the past sixty five years!

Park Lake Botanical Reserve Information Centre Hears All About It

Last month, volunteers from the Creswick Visitor Information Centre invited Dr Kevin Tolhurst and his wife Rosemary to speak about the history of and current works at the Park Lake Botanical Reserve in Creswick.

The very informative session included a fantastic handout, illustrated with photographs and garden plans from the earliest development up to most recent times. The original plant selection was mostly exotics, including oaks and pines. This handout will be available for perusal at the Information Centre.

Volunteers learned that the current project, designed by Kevin, is known as the 'Indigenous Walkabout'. The area is divided by paths leading the walker through native plantings from Victoria, Western Australia, New South Wales and South Australia. The aim of the plan is to provide a pleasant, quiet, recreational space, being fire resistant and requiring minimal maintenance, and to provide the opportunity to teach people about our native Australian vegetation. After the talk, volunteers carpooled to the Reserve for a 'walkabout'; some never having been there before.

THE ART OF LIVING

Over the past couple of weeks, I have been spending a lot of time wandering around and drawing the Berry Consols. The Consols, with their mullock heaps, washed quartz piles, and the occasional mining infrastructure ruin – bring together for me a number of interests.

Aesthetically, I find them really engaging, rising out of the gentle rolling and sloping landscape to the north of Creswick. From a distance one mullock heap looks the same as the next – seen one, seen them all. Not so! Take some time and get around to see as many as you can up close. They vary enormously in shape, size, texture, and of course, colour.

Their colours are extraordinary, varying from the palest of greys and pinks, chalky ochres to deep russet, all depending on the mineral content of the tailings, how they have weathered over a century of exposure to the atmosphere and, critically, the time of day that you get to see them.

I have found it sometimes hard to draw them in the full glare of the midday sun. The colours and shapes are much enhanced in the early morning and late afternoon when the raking light casts shadows that highlight the form. Some mounds are simple little rounded humps, some look like a beached whale, some take the form of a miniature mountain range. A number of them have been, (and still are), worked again for their quartz pebbles and sands, sculpting and adding a new dynamic to their shape. It must have been quite a sight from the 1870s to the turn of the century when all these mines had massive poppet heads, chimneys and winding houses.

I mentioned in a previous article in *Creswick District News*, I have long been fascinated with mining subjects in my art. I have also worked in the field on the exploration side. In the early 1980s, (seems like a lifetime ago now), I worked as a field assistant for exploration companies around Mt Isa and north west of Townsville. I know first hand just how much energy, effort and money is required just to go looking. To the best of my knowledge, only one project I worked on ever became a mine. It was a very rich little zinc deposit and the mine was worked out in about twenty years.

Unfortunately, modern mining tends to leave a much larger scar on the landscape than the historic methods. Drawing the mullock heaps and ruins, I cannot help but be impressed by the sheer determination and grunt needed to haul such massive amounts of rock to the surface looking for yellow stuff!

On a sadder note, it is a pity that most of the roadside signage pointing out the various mines have fallen into such disrepair. Most are broken, rotted or just overgrown. Such an important part of the history of Creswick.





REGIONAL CENTRE FOR CULTURE

Celebrating the creativity and culture of Central Victoria, the first ever Regional Centre for Culture (RCC) is a year-long program of more than 1,000 events.

Across 2018, RCC will present specially commissioned artworks from Victoria's finest artists, grass-roots community projects, surprise performances in farmers markets, tiny towns hosting giant visual arts installations, urban centres premiering new works, massed pipe and brass band events, an art installation at a flour mill and an all-singing town hall crawl. Everyday places will be transformed through music, dance, projections, art, festivals, podcasts and more.

An initiative of the Victorian Government, the RCC is delivered in partnership the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation, the City of Greater Bendigo and the Shires of Central Goldfields, Mount Alexander and Hepburn.

The program has been 'built' around the six seasonal times observed by the Dja Dja Warrung and Taungurung peoples - April is Murnong (Yam Daisy) and Ngaari (Black Duck) Time, May and June is Datimdatim (Boomerang) and Waikalk (Wattle) Time. July and August is Wanyarra (Water) and Gurri (Kangaroo) Time, September and October - Boyn (Bread) and Lawan (Mallee Fowl) Time and November to December - Giranul (Perch) and Wirrap (Cod) Time.

Jo Porter, a Producer with the RCC, is enthusiastic about the Central Goldfields area. 'We chose this area as the pilot for this program due to the relative density of the population and yet there are so many diverse communities and countryside. With so many talented local artists and producers in the region, it's an ideal place to support these communities to tell their own stories in their own ways,' she stated.

FUN AT THE CRESWICK MARKET

As well as the big-ticket artistic and cultural events, the RCC celebrates *small c* culture such as local markets and local

producers. In February, the RCC came to the Creswick Market where jugglers and acrobats gave impromptu performances. Children were encouraged to participate in a workshop to create a design which was seen on a massive scale at Anderson's Mill earlier this month.

ANDERSON'S MILL



The *Now You See It...* interactive visual arts focus on Smeaton's historic Anderson's Mill was held on the evenings of 11 to 13 May when the Mill was transformed with video/light projections depicting the history of the Mill. The twenty-minute work was generated in two parts one part was created by over 170 primary school kids across Hepburn Shire (see photos), the other by Dja Dja Wurrung Traditional Owners Aunty Marilyne Nicholls, artist storyteller Rebecca Phillips, and musician and composer James Henry in collaboration with lead artist, Castlemainebased Jim from Video Architecture.

COMING UP - SINGING AT THE TOWN HALL CRAWL

Next month, the Regional Centre for Culture is hosting ten free singing workshops in regional town halls in Baringhup, Bullarto, Clunes, Creswick, Dunolly, Glenlyon, Lyonville, Maldon, Maryborough and Talbot across three Saturdays. Each hall will be brought to life, with the workshops culminating in a public group performance featuring the participants and tutors in a celebration of song, voice and community on Saturday 30 June at Maryborough Town Hall.

In Creswick, the event will take place on Saturday, 30 June at 10.30am at the Creswick Neighbourhood centre. Tutor Merrin Torpy will conduct the free workshop.



GALLIPOLI OAKS PROJECT

St Augustine's was one of 600 Primary Schools participating in the *National Trust of Australia (Victoria's) Gallipoli Oaks Project,* by planting a special oak tree within the school grounds.

'At the core of this project is the story of how a young Australian soldier, Captain Winter Cooke from Murndal, near Hamilton, noticed some unusual holly bushes while stationed at Gallipoli that had acorns like oak trees', explains Mr Simon Ambrose, CEO at the National Trust of Australia (Victoria).

'Captain Winter Cooke remembered that his Uncle Samuel in Hamilton was a bit of a tree enthusiast; someone that would be interested in these rare acorns, and so sent a package of acorns to him from Gallipoli almost 100 years ago.'

With the help of Alan Morris from the Creswick RSL, seedlings that are direct descendants of those acorns from Gallipoli, were planted. In doing so, there will now be a direct link to the environment that the soldiers endured during the campaign.



Last week a committee of the Creswick Borough Council dealt with tenders for the erection of a stable and convenience at the town hall. The tenders received were as follows:- R. Gurr, £14/16/6; R. Pasco, £16/5/ The lowest tender was accepted.

May 10 1918

The honor roll in joining with Sir George White Tent, I.O.R., will be unveiled in the local Rechabite hall on Sunday Afternoon, 26th inst., at 3 o'clock, by Bro. A. E. McMicken, P.D.C.R. of Melbourne.

May 17 1918

A hamper containing the following has been sent by the local branch of the Red Cross Society to headquarters – 71 pairs socks, 65 scarves, 16 helmets, 13 pairs mittens, 30 flannel shirts.

May 21 1918

Broomfield- General regret was expressed when it was announced that Mr. Edwin J Redman senr., who is generally regarded as the "grand old man" in this community, has suffered a serious seizure, and his condition is causing his relatives much anxiety, particularly as the patient is advanced in years.

May 24 1918

Wanted Known – That S. Clausen is prepared to quote for removal and reerection of any buildings anywhere in Victoria.

May 28 1918

Allendale State School- An American Tea – followed by a – plain and Fancy dress dance in aid of the State school's patriotic fund will be held in the Dramatic hall, Allendale on Friday May 31, 1918. Commencing at 7 pm. Admission to American Tea: Adults, a gift worth 1/- or cash; Children, a gift worth 6d, or cash. All Gifts to be disposed of at auction. Admission to Dance, Gents 2/-; Ladies, a basket.

May 31 1918

Sir Alexander Peacock has been advised by the Secretary of Lands that the question of making available the Smeaton Racecourse and the Ullina Park for settling returned soldiers is to be referred to the Local Land Board for enquiry and report. Due notice of the sitting of the Board will be given.


ANZAC Day Concert
