

Local Couple Celebrate Milestone

Maisie and Quentin Turner celebrated their 60th Wedding Anniversary on 11 March, 2021, with their family in Ballarat. They received letters from Her Majesty the Queen, Catherine King MP, Premier Daniel Andrews, Governor General David Hurley, Prime Minister Scott Morrison and Louise Staley, Member for Ripon.



Maisie Shearman and Quentin Turner met in Ararat when they were seventeen and dated for four years prior to getting married in 1961. Maisie was born in England and migrated to Australia with her parents George and Monica Shearman and sister, Monica in 1951. Quentin lived with his parents Ina and Aubrey, brothers Peter and Kingsley and sister Audrey in Ararat. They met each other through two mutual friends, Elaine and Patricia Cunningham at their parents' home.

Maisie and Quentin were married in Ararat at the Presbyterian Church on 11 March, 1961. Maisie's Matron of Honour was Monica Patterson and Betty Powlett her other attendant. Quentin's Groomsmen were Peter Turner and Allan Phillips.

After the marriage celebrations, they travelled to Sydney, staying with Quentin's sister for some of the time.

Maisie and Quentin moved to Ballarat that year where Quentin was employed at Timken as an electrician. Shortly afterwards the couple settled in Creswick, making it their life long home. Quentin had a variety of occupations as the factory's mechanic and electrician on call, Factory Foreman and Human Resource Manager. Once retired from Timken,

Quentin worked as an Industrial Relations Commissioner mainly in Melbourne, principally in dispute resolution matters.

Maisie and Quentin have been volunteers in their community for many years, including their long-term involvement with the Creswick Fire Brigade, Quentin being Group Officer and Captain and Maisie President of the Ladies Auxiliary. Quentin was awarded the Australian Fire Service Medal (AFSM) for his lifelong contribution to the Victorian Volunteer Fire Brigade Association as a member and President of the Board. Maisie and Quentin have travelled all over the state attending many Fire Brigade Association competitions.

Maisie is a life member of the Creswick Netball Club and was a previous member of the Creswick Primary School Mothers' Club. Quentin was a member of the Sportsman's Club and Masonic Lodge. He spent ten years as a board member for the Creswick & District Community Bank. Maisie and Quentin have both volunteered their time to deliver Meals on Wheels, Maisie for thirty-two years and Quentin ten years. Most recently, they have been volunteers at the Creswick Information Centre where Maisie's cakes and slices were enjoyed by all the other volunteers.

Maisie and Quentin have three children, Mandy, Penny and Jason who all grew up in Creswick. They have four grandchildren, Jordan, Hayden, Matthew and Dylan.

PARK LAKE COMMEMORATES 160 YEARS

This celebration stumbled and fell last year, but picked itself up again and there was very happy commemoration of those 160 years. Thanks must go to Hepburn Shire for providing a Community Grant to celebrate this event. About sixty people came to share, listen and (hopefully) learn a little of the life of those people who had cared for this land for many centuries. They witnessed a traditional ceremony, learned smoking meaning and took part in the ceremony itself.

Paulie Ugle was an excellent teacher

and a very charming lady. With Jason Kerr playing his didjeridoo as background music and burning gum leaves from Park Lake's own trees, it could not have been more authentic. Jason had made that instrument himself, hollowing out a long solid length of eucalypt. Its sound was eerily haunting. His son Tom is learning the traditional dances and performed so well supporting his Dad and showing a keen understanding of the movements and rhythm, playing the clap sticks as he danced.

Paulie's daughter Jacee and Jason's younger son, also Jason, watched on, learning and understanding the traditional ways of their people. Paulie explained how important it is for them to perform their traditional ways and have their children learn and take part, handing those important stories on to the younger generation. The bad spirits rose with the smoke and left the Park. It was a beautiful coming together of the traditional owners and European people and a fitting tribute after all those years.

Councillor Brian Hood talked of the Park's history and Councillor Don Henderson re-enacted the presentation of a silver cup to Mayoress Williams some 135 years ago. Everyone helped to plant 180 wild flowers indigenous to Victoria, then partied on together around the barbecue, sharing sausages and birthday cake made by the butcher and local baker. A most happy and fitting commemoration.

A special thank you to Helen Cossenas, who is retiring from her 'pixieness' after many years of service, and to Ron Barron, who also finds the years catching up. Helen's mother, Mrs. Mavis Willis, was a keen supporter of Park Lake seventy years ago. The average age of the Pixies is seventy-five, so some new and vigorous blood is needed. Please contact Val on 5345 1310, if you would like to be a Pixie. Green spaces are becoming more scarce, even in Creswick, as housing blocks become smaller. A vigorous and active presence is needed for Council to give its support.



Aquatic Strategy Consultation Process Begins

Residents and community groups will shortly be invited to meet with consultants for the Hepburn Shire Aquatic Strategy. *Creswick Aquatic Centre* members will be putting the case for an indoor heated swimming pool, with hydrotherapy facilities, to be built in Creswick.

Creswick is a growth area with many young families, active singles and healthy older people making it their home during the last few years. There's not much we don't have here in Creswick. A golf-resort, numerous cafes and restaurants, hotels, boutiques, three primary schools and aged care facilities. Soon we'll have a world-class bike trail network attracting riders and visitors from all over. They will be surprised to find there is no swimming pool.

Total funding for the shire-wide aquatic strategy is \$80,000. It includes \$30,000 set aside by Council, specifically to investigate Creswick's swimming facilities.

Creswick Aquatic Centre members will endeavour to work closely with local councillors to ensure the best case is put

forward for an aquatic centre in Creswick. Creswick currently has no swimming pool. Lakes and former dredge holes are not suitable for swimming lessons, safe lap swimming or medically supervised physical rehabilitation. Currently \$240,000 is spent each year in subsidising the running of outdoor pools in Trentham, Clunes and Daylesford. Creswick ratepayers are paying for outdoor pools they don't use. Creswick is the only town without a purpose-built swimming pool.

Otium Planning Group has been engaged as consultants for this study. They need to hear from **you**. Community pop-up session dates will be released soon and information about locations, dates and times once they're available, will be on the *Hepburn Shire Council* website and *Creswick & District Aquatic Centre* website and Facebook page.

International Women's Day

Local Women Honoured Verena Doyle

Congratulations to Verena Doyle, who was recently inducted onto the Heather Mutimer Honour Roll as part of the Hepburn Shire International Women's Day celebrations.

Verena has been inspirational in her work with Scouts Victoria and her volunteering at 1st Creswick Scouts has been beneficial for many young females in the local Creswick community.

When Verena first began to volunteer at Creswick Scouts there were no girls in the local scout troop. This changed after Verena began and encouraged girls to transfer from Girl Guides to Scouts. She believed that some girls would enjoy Scouting more as they weren't interested in traditionally 'girlish' activities. She opened the way for girls to join what was often considered a 'boys club' and encouraged them to complete activities like kayaking, skateboarding and archery.

Verena started in Brownies in 1965 and continued through the Girl Guide program achieving Queens Guide in 1976 with East Doncaster Girl Guide Company. She was a leader with Girl Guides until 2007 when she was also the Scout Leader at Creswick Scout Group. 'Basically Monday was Scouts, Wednesday was Guides and Thursday was Venturer Scouts, until the Girl Guide Unit was closed unceremoniously by the hall being removed in 2011.'

Verena set up the first Creswick Venturer Unit, which was the first all-female Venturer unit until a boy joined six months later. The first chairperson, treasurer and secretary were all female and this showed the other scouting units that it was possible for girls to lead themselves. The Venturer Unit at Creswick is still running today.

Within only a few years of Verena restarting the unit, Creswick Venturers celebrated, for the first time in nineteen years, a Venturer achieving the Queens Scout Award. This was a highly significant event considering the unit was newly formed and was just starting to forge its own path.

Her focus on supporting young Scouts to achieve their Queens Scout Award has also left a legacy of success in the local group and has given future Scouts a goal to work towards.

Verena acknowledges that being a Scouting and Guiding Leader has allowed her to lead by example, supporting and encouraging young people and participating in some extraordinary activities which included: flood recovery programs; climbing the Swiss Alps; sailing yachts in New Zealand; learning to paddle (and not fall out of) a canoe; abseiling; and even making a Venturer shirt when uniforms just didn't fit.

Verena excelled professionally, completing a Bachelor of Nursing which led her to work at Daylesford Hospital. She then went on to study a Bachelor of

Arts (Rural Social Welfare) with a Graduate Diploma in Chronic Condition Management. At the same time she was working full time as a nurse at Creswick hospital and had three school aged children.

Verena states: 'I have an absolutely amazing husband Tony and we have raised five adult children, have three grandchildren, worked in intellectual disabilities with the Rudolf Steiner Curative Home, studied and worked as a nurse and for the last nine years up to retirement, worked as a Case Manager with Community Services. I have attained a Degree in Rural Social Welfare and a Grad Dip in Chronic Conditions Self Management through Flinders University'. She lobbied for Swinburne Uni to develop a campus in the Yarra Valley. To her surprise this was successful and the Lilydale campus has been well established.

Verena was honoured and humbled to be nominated for the Heather Mutimer Honour Roll: 'I was quite perplexed as I was always taught to support your community and do service quietly, expect no reward and do not promote what you have achieved'.

Currently she is studying Horticulture and runs a micro native nursery at Allendale. The Doyles manage and care for *Mataranka Scout Camp* at Dunolly, the only Scout camp dedicated to environmentalism in Victoria, where they focus on revegetating and rebuilding the camp for future Scouts to enjoy. Verena continues to attend almost every camp at Mataranka which has meant that girls from visiting Scout troops are able to attend to learn new skills as girls can only attend camps if there is a female leader present.

Verena loves living at Allendale and has no plans to move. Creswick is indeed honoured to have Verena Doyle in the district.

Jennifer Anne Turley was born on 3 December, 1954, the second child of Jim and Anna. They lived in a small homely house that Jim built on the outskirts of Barkstead until they moved to Mollongghip.

Jenny attended Mollongghip State School from prep to grade 6 and loved it when it was her turn to raise the Australian flag on Monday mornings and sing the National Anthem.

After Primary School Jenny went on to Daylesford Technical High School which meant catching the bus early and not returning home until late afternoon. While at Daylesford Tech Jenny became an active member of many sporting teams including swimming, basketball and hockey. She represented the school in hockey at Mildura and was proud to travel up on the train with the team.

Weekends meant junior tennis, travelling around to many district courts on Saturday mornings. She moved on from junior tennis to Senior Pennant at the Mt Prospect Tennis Association grass courts in Creswick where she became a member of many Premiership teams. She also represented the Mt Prospect Association in Country Week tennis.

Jenny entered the workforce with her first job at the Venture Store in Grenville Street, Ballarat. She desperately wanted to work in fashion and after turning up at Menzies fashion shop weekly to ask about any positions, was finally rewarded with a start. She flourished in this field with her sense of fashion and honesty in sales. After selling one customer a dress, belt, scarf and some jewellery the husband of the customer gave Jenny his card and said, 'If you ever want to sell cars, give me a call'.

Jenny met Gary Burke at a local dance who asked if he could drive her home but she first needed to get the approval of big brother Robert, who said, 'Burkey, he's ok'. This was the start of their loving life together. They married on 20 January 1979 and throughout the next forty-two years were hardly apart; working together and sharing wonderful times. Her family, dogs, friends, relaxing Sunday lunches or just hanging around in her PJs made Jenny happy.

Jenny continued to work in fashion, managing several stores in Ballarat, until she and Gary purchased the Savoy Coffee Lounge in Bridge Mall. After three years they sold the Savoy and purchased *The Green Village Florist* in Armstrong Street, eventually moving the business to the Bridge Mall and renaming it *Jenny Burke Florist*. Jenny attended numerous workshops and qualified as a Certificate IV Florist and won awards at the Melbourne International Flower Show. There are few people around Ballarat who would not have seen Jenny's floral artistry over the past thirty years. Hundreds of tributes on social media were a testament to the lives she touched and the memories she helped to make at weddings, funerals, special occasions and events throughout the region.

Jenny passed away suddenly on 1 April, aged sixty-six, after suffering a brain aneurysm, and left a legacy of beautiful colourful memories for thousands of people across the region

Morning teas will be available from 10.00am - 12.30pm. This will be a COVID safe event with sanitizer, QR code or manual registration and social distancing.

These six men deserve to be remembered with a plaque and it is hoped funding will be obtained for this, but permission is needed from their families.

When I walk outside the backdoor the air is damp and rich, and at different times of the day and on different days the dampness and richess is a matter of degree and they are all delicious.

My morning vitamin or tranquillity pill for years, if feeling particularly groggy or unhappy, is big lung-fulls of morning winter air. I breathe so deeply I can physically feel it spread from my lungs to my heart. Three will do it. It doesn't take away sadness but it does dissolve much of the stress and it clears my head like magic.

The adjourned meeting for the inauguration of a Town Improvements Committee will be held at the Town Hall on Wednesday (Tomorrow) evening at 8 o'clock. All interested in promoting the progress of the municipality are cordially invited. W. B. Grose, Mayor.

May 13, 1921

Kooroocheang

The Kooroocheang and District Energetic League intend having a "Working bee" on the 18th May, to cart and saw up ready for use Mr. H. Rankin's winter firewood.

May 17, 1921

At the request of the Creswick Shire Council, a further allocation of war trophies has been made to towns in the shire, in the form of a machine gun each for Kooroocheang, Glengower, Kangaroo Hills, and Rocky Lead.

May 20, 1921

The Fire Brigade reel house at North Creswick is to be removed out of the way of the street lamp, the light of which it obstructs. Mr. Curtis has consented to the little building being placed on the front corner of the allotment on which Mr. Fred Simons formerly resided. At the meeting of the Country Fire Brigades' Board on Wednesday, the work of painting the bell tower in the Market Square, near the band stand, was referred to Mr. W. B. Grose.

May 24, 1921

Mr. W. A. Caddy announces in our advertising columns that he has taken over the blacksmithing business of the late James Mann, of Melbourne Road. He hopes for a fair share of public patronage.

May 27, 1921
