Forest Fire Management Training in Creswick

Forest Fire Management Victoria have been training statewide crews of fourteen UniMog Tankers recently at the University of Melbourne site in Creswick and surrounding bushland. These Mercedes-Benz vehicles cost around \$500,000 and appear to be state of the art at crossing tough terrain. The cabin roof displays an innovative protective barrier to reduce the risk of the crew of four being injured from falling trees and branches in a forest inferno situation.

The UniMog has a water carrying capacity of 4,000 litres, an ultra-high pressure firefighting pump, water fording capability of 800mm high, superior 4x4 capabilities, a water deluge system over the cabin for further protection of the cabin crew from an overhead fire.

It also has in-cabin firefighting capability, in-cabin fire curtains, and overall ergonomic design; a very impressive vehicle.

Review of the Hepburn Shire Council structure

An opportunity for residents to have a say

A review of the structure of the Hepburn Shire Council commenced on 30 October undertaken by the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC). Such reviews are held about every twelve years. This review will examine the following:-

- The number of councillors
- Whether the council should remain subdivided into wards
- If subdivided, the number of wards, ward boundaries and the number of councillors per ward

The review will not consider the council's external boundaries or whether it should be combined with another council (or separated).

The Electoral Commissioner Warwick Gately, AM, in announcing the review indicated that such a review is an important way of ensuring all voters can have a say. 'I encourage you to get involved. Public submissions are a vital part of the review process, providing valuable local knowledge and perspectives' he said.

A submission guide and fact sheet outlining the process information and all the relevant information are available at *vec.vic.gov.au.* The closing date for preliminary submissions is Wednesday 27 November 2019.



Bag Ban has begun in Western Victoria

From 1 November, all lightweight plastic shopping bags have been banned from local retailers including supermarkets, fashion boutiques, fast food outlets, convenience stores, service stations and more.

The ban includes all lightweight plastic shopping bags with a thickness of 35 microns or less and includes bags made from degradable, biodegradable and compostable plastic.

An overwhelming number of responses during community consultation by the State Government indicated people are concerned by the impacts of plastic on our environment and would support a ban on lightweight plastic shopping bags.

There is growing evidence of the damage caused to the environment by plastic bags. They can end up in our waterways, lakes and oceans posing a significant hazard to marine life and contaminating our recycling systems.

THOMAS JOSEPH RUSH 17 February 1922 - 11 October 2019



Thomas Joseph, known as Tom, was born in Creswick on 17 February 1922, the youngest son of Thomas Joseph and Margaret Rush (Donegan). The couple arrived in Creswick in 1914 and in 1922 purchased a house at Camp Hill. The house still stands at Camp Hill and the story goes that when being moved to its location by horse drawn jinker it got hopelessly bogged, so it was just unloaded and left where it was. It is still in the same place! It was a modest house with three bedrooms and an open fireplace. The kitchen was without running water.

Thomas and Margaret had four children, Michael Thomas, John known as Leo, Mary Ann known as Mollie (Preston) and Thomas Joseph. The children, including Tom, went to St. Augustine's School for their primary education with the nuns from the first year to Grade 8. Times were hard then. However, there were pleasures like the Saturday night dance and being taught ballroom dancing, and the swimming pool at Calembeen Park in the summer time.

Tom's early memories were of a family with very little money. The family's only holidays were going out to the Donegan farm at Gordon and watching the cows being milked. There were two younger Donegan cousins and their parents. Tom's memory of school days was of walking about two miles every day and he was told that he went through primary school without missing a day. Most of Tom's clothes were hand-me-downs, too big when he got them, and he wore them until they were too small. Tom thought he was lucky to have a big sister, Mollie, to look after him.

In 1937, Tom left school and worked at the local chemist for 15 shillings per week. He cut wood for Lady Peacock in part of his lunch break for 5 shillings a week, and on Sunday mornings he would cut a week's supply for the Lindsay family for 5 shillings a week. Tom was raking in 25 shillings a week and when he purchased a new Healing bike, he paid it off at 5 shillings per week.

As the recovery from the Depression improved, Tom can remember the great heap of bills being paid off by his parents, one by one, until they were all settled.

Thomas Snr and his sons all played in a Premiership team with Creswick Football Club and Thomas Snr was Captain of the Creswick Team in 1923. Youngest son Tom played in the 1940 Premiership team when Creswick defeated Smeaton by two points. At this year's celebrations of the 150th Anniversary of the Creswick Football Netball Club, Tom was the oldest living past player present and the only living player of that 1940 Premiership Team!

In 1941, Tom went to work in Mt Eliza. On 11 October 1941, he enlisted in the Citizen Military Force. Eventually he joined the regular Army in November 1941 and joined the AIF on turning 21. At the time, parental permission was needed to join the AIF before you turned 21.

Tom went into the Army at Mt Martha and this was where he met lifetime friend, Doug Clark. They shared the same tent and were friends until Doug's death, spending time in the Army together and later on working together for many years. The day before Tom joined the Army he went to the Melbourne Cup and his only win was when *Con Naru* ran third in the last race. With no photos in those days, they had to wait for ages to collect the small amount it paid as a dividend. After a few months in Mt Martha, Tom went to New South Wales and then to Toorbul Point in Queensland. After 1,157 days Tom was discharged from Royal Park in January, 1945. The three Rush brothers, who all served in the Army during World War II, are remembered on the plaque situated in front of the RSL Hall in Albert Street, Creswick.

After the War Tom lived and worked in Melbourne. He became involved with Doug Clark and his rubber interests and together they opened the Clark Rubber retail shops with the first one situated in Bridge Road, Richmond. Through tennis and social activities at a Catholic tennis club Tom met and eventually married Ruth Wright in 1948. After some years in Melbourne, the family with three sons, Kevin, Terry and Peter, moved to Creswick in 1955 and lived here for five years.

Tom bought an Austin truck and with the assistance of brother-in-law, Ken Preston, worked in many areas including carting hay, potatoes, and pine logs from the surrounding pine plantations onto railway trucks and carting firewood from the surrounding forests. After five years, Tom said that the truck was worn out and so was he. Tom, Ruth and family moved to Ballarat and Tom worked in various fields, including as a travelling salesman. Clark Rubber stores

decided to expand to the country and Tom was offered the job of managing the Ballarat shop; firstly in Sturt St and then in 1974 in a larger property in Bridge Street – soon to be turned into Bridge Mall. Almost straight away the work began on ripping up the tramlines, road and footpath proving a difficult time to start running a business.

Tom retired in 1984 as Manager of Clark Rubber in Ballarat. Retirement brought other fields of interest for Tom. About retirement Tom said, '... retirement was a signpost pointing one in another direction, not a stop sign but where one could have more stops and view life more leisurely, there was something about the sunset making way for a new sunrise'. Tom and Ruth enjoyed travelling and especially going north to escape the cold Ballarat winters.

While living in Creswick Tom started playing with the Creswick Bowls Club. When the family were living in Wendouree Tom joined as a founding member of Webbcona Bowls Club. Tom enjoyed playing bowls and had many roles with the Webbcona Club including President, Club Champion, Super Veteran, Life Member and Club Historian.

In retirement, Tom was involved in the community and was active in the St. Vincent de Paul Society. He was President of the Regional Council for a number of years. Tom was also involved with the Ballarat Sub-branch of the RSL, being a Life Member and a hospital visitor in Ballarat for over twenty years.

At the age of 95 Tom joined the Ballarat group *Rebel Elders*, a group of eight Ballarat residents aged 75 to 95 who took part in a ten-minute film that was projected onto a Ballarat building as part of the inaugural *White Night Festival*. In the film, Tom, depicted as a well-dressed, upper-class British toff, was dressed in a dusty pink suit with a top hat and surrounded by a posse of eight small dogs. Tom commented on why he took part in the film, '*It's about getting the best out of your life in your old age. You never know, you might have a few laughs and make a new friend along the way'*. (2017, Old Charm Lights up Night, The Ballarat Courier, 18 February)

Tom also appeared in *The Ballarat Courier* just after ANZAC Day 2016 when he struck up a friendship with a young Ballarat boy, Oscar then aged four, after attending the ANZAC Day Service where a speaker urged those attending to shake the hand of a veteran. This handshake left a lasting impression on both of them and a friendship was formed between Tom and Oscar that lasted until Tom's death.

Tom's wife Ruth died seven years ago and his family indicated that Tom's resilience after her death was inspiring. Tom spent the last fourteen months of his life at the John Curtin Aged Care Facility in Creswick. He had come back to his childhood hometown and with a big crowd in attendance, was buried recently after a service at St. Augustine's; the church where he had been baptised. Vale Tom Rush.

A BROKEN FAMILY IN A BROKEN GRAVE

'Joe, I tripped getting out and fell. I tried to throw myself clear.'

On 25 March 1912, Creswick's Clarence Townsend had his leg crushed during a shunting accident at the North Melbourne railway yards. At 3.00am the next morning, he succumbed to his injury. He was twenty-two years old.

Thirteen months earlier Clarence had married Alice Tank at Creswick's Victoria Street Methodist Church.

The happy couple left for Inglewood by the evening train, carrying with them the good wishes of a large assemblage of persons who attended at the railway station to see them away, and who liberally showered them with confetti. (The Creswick Advertiser, 1911)

Perhaps unknown to Clarence, at the time of his death Alice was pregnant with their daughter Clarice, no doubt her name representing Clarence and Alice's union.

Heartbreakingly, in August of 1913, at barely one year of age, the infant Clarice joined her father in his grave in Creswick Cemetery.

Four months later, in December 1913, Alice also passed away, joining her husband and daughter in their grave and tragically bringing to an end this young family. Alice's father too had died the year before.

The deceased had, within a short space of time, suffered heavy bereavements in the loss of husband, father and child. The cause was heart failure, supervening on debility and exhaustion. (Alice's Obituary, The Creswick Advertiser, 1913)



If you could die of a broken heart, surely this must have been the case with Alice Townsend.

Over the years the marble gravestone deteriorated to such an extent that it had collapsed into the grave. Clarence Townsend was an older brother of my grandfather Sydney Townsend, whose ashes are interred in the next grave. When I saw this broken family in their broken grave, it touched me very deeply. Two years ago my younger sister Lorraine and I decided to reassemble the pieces of their gravestone so that this young family would not be lost to memory. The reassembled pieces of the broken gravestone can be seen in the Methodist section of Creswick Cemetery. Lorraine and I wish to thank Wendy Ohlsen of the Creswick Cemetery Trust for her help.

Finding Local Gardening Information People, print and online

The first important contact I made when moving to Creswick was the Creswick Garden Club annual leaflet advertising cheap fruit trees suitable for Creswick conditions. Because they were local and knowledgeable, I knew I could use what was listed safely. The Community Garden at the Creswick Neighbourhood Centre is also great for meeting and working beside a range of people who have worked with local conditions. I also found CDN an excellent source for what is happening in all local garden groups, including workshops, garden visits and local gardening events.

Facebook is a very useful social networking base for finding local gardening groups and businesses. I have joined and put up photos, for example, of plants showing symptoms of a problem on the Ballarat Permaculture Guild page, getting responses ranging from sympathy and guesses to professional or highly experienced and often with links to other useful sources. I love the feeling of community this engenders.

Another source was Flora Work, a local environmental consultant suggested by another after I posted a photo of a plant that suddenly appeared in my garden. I liked her approach, she is good for identification and ideas, and also

posts great photos of regional flora and fauna taken in her daily work. Because I dream one day of having a pond to support wildlife into my garden, I also find Bell's Water Gardens' (Newlyn) page informative and hugely enticing.

These sites are chosen to suit my particular needs and I mention them only to show how Facebook can be used. There are countless other useful social networking groups and businesses out there so it's important to tailor it to your specific interests and needs, using the search option at the top of the screen to explore.

Google also helps. By searching the term 'Creswick native plants' when trying to find a source of local native plants recently, I found Goldfields Revegetation (Mandurang) which specialises in Central and Northern Victoria Indigenous plants. As a result, I found plants I have been searching for for ages.

Local and regional books are rare so I always grab them when I find them. Online sources are great but cannot replace the magic of reading outside in a sunny spot with a cup of tea and cake. I have omitted non-local or regional sources but will talk about them next time.

Personality JENNI SEWELL

When I came to work at John Curtin Aged Care facility in Creswick in 2008, I had decided it was my retirement job and that I would stay for maybe three years. It was a homecoming of sorts for me and the community welcomed me as if I had never left the Shire. I was tired from my previous work role and thought that I needed a change and a less demanding position. What I learned very quickly is that residential aged care is one of the most demanding industries in which to work. It is a hard slog, it is underfunded and the compliance requirements are enormous. Add to that the general emotional rollercoaster that I, staff and carers travel with families, life and death, illness and accident.

Still now, if my phone rings in the night, I immediately assume someone I care about has just died.

So, I found not a job, but a home full of eccentric and loveable ageing humans. Together, we laughed and cried through ten and a half years, not three. There was always something important to do, or something to 'fix' or figure out and in a blink, there I was. The years had galloped past.

To psychologically prepare to retire, in 2016, I moved to my dream location, a beautiful old house on best Newlyn soil, surrounding myself with chooks, cats and strangely (for me) a dog. Add a vegetable garden, many new fruit trees, nuts, olives and berries and a decorative garden as well; I had no spare time to speak of. I loved it so much that I wanted to be home all the time. Such a short commute and so private and peaceful to return to.

This is my third spring here and I think I may have lemons this year. Last year a highlight was my first ever passionfruit crop, of which I was ridiculously proud. I love to pickle and preserve and I have rediscovered my jam making skills. I now have a pickle fridge and it still boasts jars of last year's zucchini, jalapeno, beetroot and cucumber pickles. There are also tomatoes dehydrated, sauced, chutneyed, frozen, green, red and yellow.

I did some calculations and figured out I could finish working in March 2018, if I did not have any holidays and nothing got in the way. Well some things must have got in the way because I was finally able to lock in the end of the year – December 31, so I could have Christmas one more time with the residents and their families. One beloved resident wrote our Christmas show, which included a solo for me, *Getting to Know You*, from *The King and I*. Sadly, she died before the show, but that made us all more committed to the production. My Christmas mornings for the past ten years had been spent at John Curtin, setting up the dining rooms and lounge rooms for Christmas lunch, an event when the staff welcomed many family members who joined us. This was my eleventh Christmas set up and the carols had a little hint of something else with them this day.

The agreed date arrived and midst more laughter and tears, including an amazing thunderstorm at my farewell party, I brought home my cups and pictures. For a few weeks, I behaved as if I was on holidays and my days had little form. Summer gardening and preserving, catching up with family, walking and swimming - lovely relaxing holidays. I decided to take a trip as a symbolic and formal acknowledgement to myself of this new phase of my life. Two of the things I like the most are singing and bushwalking, so when I heard of Sing Trek New Zealand that was it! Ticked all the boxes. I joined twenty people I had not met before in Wellington one Sunday in April to hike the Queen Charlotte Track and learn some songs and singing techniques. Two weeks later, the group entertained the travellers on the Inter Island ferry as we returned from the glorious Marlborough region to Wellington.

I sing weekly with The Seven Hills Singers, now in my seventh year. This year, as I have no day job anymore, I was able to participate in the July pantomime for the first time and I am directing the Christmas Show, *Miracle on 34th Street – A Musical Radio Play*, for the theatre.

People ask me if I miss working and I think about this. I think that I will not miss working for a long time yet, if ever. I thank the residents, their families, the Independent Living Units residents, the staff new and old, the new CEO Mary and my Board members for ten great years.

I say when life gives you lemons – preserve them in salt, they are amazing in Middle Eastern cuisine.
