'For over a century now, stories have been told of young men and women who volunteered from nearby towns to serve in far-off places throughout the Middle East and Europe. Far from the rural idyll of life here in this district, each of these volunteers were plunged into a world of unspeakable conflict. All too soon, the effects of this conflict reached the home and town of every volunteer. The far-off places where they served — and where so many of them still lie — have become enshrined in our hearts.

The name of each volunteer commemorated in this Avenue of Honour forever ties these sacred places, so far away, to homes nearby where these women and men were born and raised, where loved ones waited and prayed, and to towns where they were schooled and worked. The service and sacrifice of all who went – as well as their loved ones left behind – are recalled here in the place names woven together in these two signposts.

Let these place-names take you on a journey of remembrance.'

The above text forms Jeff Meager's tribute, which accompanied his art installation acknowledging the community of the former Shire of Creswick in 1918, and the locations where they served.

The Avenue of Honour and Armistice Centenary event held at Kingston on 11 November was the result of an enormous volunteer effort over many, many months. It was powerful seeing the spirit of our first volunteers come to the fore in preparation for the event and the enthusiasm of the younger generations involved was highly valued. ## **Armistice Day 11 November 1918**

The first edition of the *Creswick Advertiser* for 1918 carried a message sent to the Prime Minister (Mr Hughes) from the Prime Minister of Great Britain. 'At the beginning of the New Year I wish to send on behalf of the War Cabinet to the Government and people of Australia a message of good will and confidence. We are now far on in the fourth year of the war. But despite many setbacks and disappointments, we are also on the path to victory.....' Unfortunately his optimism of peace would be months away.

The Germans launched their Spring Offence in March and although the Germans were successful at first, slowly the Allies were to take the upper hand. At the beginning of the year the five AIF divisions had been amalgamated to form the Australian Corps. Appropriately on ANZAC Day 1918 they recaptured Villers-Bretonneux from the Germans. Fighting was to continue with the loss of Creswickian lives until, on 11 November 1918, Germany signed an armistice to end the Great War.

False hopes of an armistice had been reported on Friday, 8 November, 1918 in the edition of the *Creswick Advertiser* and had caused much jubilation in the district and many other places in Australia. The school children got sent home from school early after celebrating at the band stand.

The *Creswick Advertiser* printed for Tuesday, 12 November gave details of the abdication of the Kaiser and the discussion of peace talks. A prominent news item in that edition was the successful Smeaton Show which had been held on the Saturday, in glorious sunny weather, before it was known that Germany would sue for peace. Speeches made at the Society's dinner had made reference about those away from home fighting overseas.

It was not until Monday evening that news of peace reached Creswick, by telephone, just after 8.00pm. There was much ringing of the fire bell in Market Square (the band stand area). Soon the crowds started to gather in Albert Street and quoting from the *Advertiser*, 'a procession was formed, and for two or three hours the excitement



was intense'. St. John's held an evening Service of Thanksgiving. The Councilors immediately made arrangements for a public celebration the next day. Celebration for the children would be held in the afternoon and a monster public celebration in the evening.

Tuesday was to see even more rejoicing. Bells were frequently being rung, buntings and flags were flying everywhere, and shops observed a half day holiday. Strangely, on instructions of the State Commandant, the hotels were closed on both Tuesday and Wednesday. Children were given a day's holiday. At 2.00pm the children assembled in Albert Street near the band stand, some carrying the flags of the Allies. After marching up and down Albert Street they retired to the Town Hall to listen to speeches and sing patriotic songs and to celebrate that they were not going to be under German rule. Among the choruses they sang were, 'We're from the Land of the Gum Trees, Rally Round the Flag Boys, Australia's Sons, and Keep the Home Fires Burning, finishing with Rule Britannia'. At the end of the proceedings all the children were given sweets.

The main celebrations started at 7.00pm with many people from the Shire joining with the Borough's celebration. In the processions were the Senior Cadets, the firemen with Big Lizzie mounted on the hose reel. The ladder carriage of the fire brigade, drawn by a horse, was utilized. The firemen carried torches providing additional illumination. In the absence of the band (disbanded because of the war) music was provided by buglers and drummers from the Members of the public dressed in national schools. costumes or fancy dress with students from the School of Forestry dressed as Red Indians. After the procession speeches and music took place in the Town Hall. The crowd was so large that some people had to be accommodated on the stage and an equal number were assembled outside the hall. After the proceedings in the Town Hall were over a fireworks display took place with the main feature the burning of the effigy of the Kaiser. It burnt very well and quickly as tar had been poured over the bonfire. On both Monday and Tuesday a dance was held in the ANA Hall.

It was the edition of the Creswick Advertiser published on Friday, 15 November, which gave details of the peace

agreement. The headline was PEACE WITH VICTORY. The article said that the Prime Minister of Britain announced that the Armistice was signed at 5.00am on the Monday morning and hostilities ceased at 11.00am. The paper carried a message from the King to his people overseas. Although the Armistice ended the fighting, it needed to be prolonged three times until the Treaty of Versailles, which was signed on 28 June 1919, finally took effect on 10 January 1920.

Over 400,000 Australian men and woman had offered their services for the war and over 60,000 were killed and 156,000 wounded, gassed or taken prisoner. 3,000 nurses offered their services, with 2,000 serving overseas, many serving near the front line. Volunteers from the Shire and Borough were over 900 and of that number 134 are known to have died overseas. Before all were repatriated that number was to increase with the flu epidemic spreading across Europe. Many returned servicemen and nurses returned broken from their years of service. The return to Australia was slow and it would be many months before mothers could greet their sons and daughters again.



#### CRESWICK STREET TREES

#### Originally published in The Ballarat Star 1911

History is continually repeating itself. Time was when Creswick was a tented field, and before the streets could be formed the trees had to be got out of the way. At a later date the *ecualyptus globulus* was planted along the sides of the principal streets; and to-day the axemen are at work, converting what are fine specimens of our bluegum into firewood, to clear the way for the development of the Oriental planes that were planted last season.

The gums, in addition to the fact that they are not shade trees, have proved unsuitable for a main business street. On account of the gum being an evergreen, the street has been kept wetter in the winter season than is desirable from a road-making point of view. In the early days of settlement in Victoria our forebears came to a country in which they were to find apples growing wild in the streets. The terrible advances made in municipal socialism will be realised when it is now stated that the borough council grows trees in the main thoroughfares to present to the ratepayers!

What may not happen next? There is a fine avenue of well pollarded gums along the Clunes road, but this is an exceptionally wide thoroughfare, and there is ample room for them. The borer, however, is at work on them, and they will probably be available for those who read "The Star" in the homeland and are attracted to Creswick by the information that our council grows firewood in the streets for the citizens.

#### **Community Newspapers Conference**

On 13 October the *Creswick District News* President, Barbara Spencer, welcomed members of the Community Newspaper Association of Victoria (CNAV) to its 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference at the RACV Goldfields Resort in Creswick. Representatives from many of their sixty-six member papers attended, including four from *Creswick District News*. The CNAV is the peak body representing not-for-profit community newspapers across Victoria.

Community newspapers vary from a few A4 pages published monthly to large glossy broad-sheet papers published weekly. A common thread is that they are all produced by very dedicated, enthusiastic volunteers in order to keep their communities informed about local activities. The Conference workshops and group discussions provided a wonderful opportunity to share ideas, learn from expert professionals and discuss the many challenges encountered in publishing a regular community newspaper.

Staff from the State Library Community Newspapers Archive gave the keynote presentation which reminded the meeting that copies of all published works in Australia must be deposited with both the state and national libraries. In the past all newspapers were stored in hard copy but the State Library is now moving to storing these as digitised copies. This makes these papers available to a much wider public as people can search the online Library catalogues to find newspaper articles. The *Creswick District News* is working towards submitting digitized copies of all its 239 editions published over the last twenty years.

#### THE ART OF LIVING

AMAZE (To confound with surprise or wonder – astonishment: perplexity)

I confess - I am amazed.

I am amazed by so many things — by a jet plane moving through the sky, or the height an eagle can soar to, or the strength of a spider web.

I am astonished by the fragility and complexity of the wildflowers.

I am amazed watching clouds or beetles. I am in awe of the geological history of every stone that I pick up. There is a hell of a lot around us to be amazed by.

There was some pretty amazing art on display recently in Ballarat for the inaugural Biennial of Australian Art (BOAA). Art not just to be found in galleries, as usual, but also in unexpected places — churches and old industrial buildings, a former convent, and around the lake.

Art can sometimes resonate even more powerfully when you come across it in unexpected places.

Last week, I re-installed a large artwork that I created for the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne way back in 2005.

Titled EVERYMAN after a poem by Siegfried Sassoon, this installation of twenty-six calico banners is my visual response to the words of the First World War poets Sassoon and Wilfred Owen. Some of the most moving poetry that I have ever read.

Although the installation was originally conceived to last for three months, the public response was very moving. I subsequently donated the works to the Shrine of Remembrance and they have been on display every other year.

Wilfred Owen was killed in action one week before the Armistice.

I also have a personal connection to these poems. Three of my great uncles were there also. George was in the evacuation from Gallipoli, then died on the Somme, not far from Owen, only three months earlier.

This being the centenary of the Armistice seems particularly timely for the banners to be back on display.

The hundreds of thousands of visitors each year to the Shrine of Remembrance all have their own reasons to visit. I am always honored and deeply moved by their response to my work.

One more amazing thing ... for me anyway. This year I will turn sixty years of age. Twenty years ago — in the blink of an eye — I was turning 40. Twenty years from now I will be turning 80. That - I cannot get my head around!


George was twenty-nine years old. Twenty-nine forever.





#### 100 years ago

Compiled by Creswick Museum

#### November 1 1918

Mr and Mrs. Wm. Bell, of Luttet street, Creswick, have been notified by the Defence department that their son, Private Alex Bell, is returning to Australia, after being on active service for nearly three years. Private Bell was attached to the 24<sup>th</sup> Battalion, and was wounded in action. He was in England for some time, but has now been invalided home, and is expected to arrive shortly.

#### November 5 1918

When the news of the capitulation of Turkey and the opening of the Dardenelles came through last Friday morning, the flags were hoisted and the fire bells rung. Yesterday morning it was announced that an armistice had been signed with Austria and that fighting against that country would cease that day.

#### November 8 1918

Germany's Peace Move – Allied terms in Foch's Keeping – Enemy must apply direct.

The British Prime Minister (Mr. Lloyd George), speaking in the House of Commons on Tuesday, stated that the Versailles Conference had requested President Wilson to intimate to Germany that she could obtain conditions of armistice from Marshal Foch and the British Naval representative.

#### **November 19 1918**

A meeting of the Local Repatriation Committee for the Shire and Borough of Creswick will be held in the shire hall, Kingston, next Saturday evening, at 8 o'clock. Any returned soldier requiring help in any direction is asked to communicate with the sub committee in his district.

#### **November 22 1918**

Lawrence- Patriotic gathering- Flower day and the signing

of the armistice will be celebrated at the Jerusalem state school on Wednesday next, during the afternoon. There will be a flower show and a sale of gifts, whilst addresses will be given.

#### **November 26 1918**

Creswick Shire Thanksgiving service - the Thanksgiving service arranged by the Shire Council to give the citizens of the Shire of Creswick the opportunity of expressing their gratitude to Almighty God on the cessation of hostilities between the allies and the Central European Powers, took place on Sunday afternoon in the show grounds at Smeaton. It was a very impressive service and the attendance was extremely large.

#### Friday November 29 1918

At the monthly meeting of the Creswick branch of the Red Cross Society held yesterday the following motion was carried: - "That this society ask the secretary to place on our minute book a special vote of thankfulness and deep gratitude to our great and heroic naval and military leaders, our soldiers and sailors, and those of our Allies, for the great and glorious victory they have achieved. We thoroughly appreciate the good work they have done in every sphere of the war, realising and sympathising with them in all their awful hardships and sufferings. Our peace and liberty, and that of the whole world, was at stake, so we rejoice deeply at the complete downfall of the foe. In the great hour of our victory, we do not forget our fallen heroes, but offer to the sorrowing relatives our heartfelt sympathy and grateful thanks to those brave boys who have made the supreme sacrifice for our liberty and safety."


