Marie was Grandmother to nine and Great Grandmother to twelve. Marie said her secret to a long life was keeping her brain active, playing sport, eating bull boar sausages and drinking mineral water. #### **JOHN RIORDAN 1840 – 1905**

John moved to Creswick in 1865 and was an energetic and involved citizen, as a founding member of community, sporting and welfare organisations.

John Riordan was born in Snug River Tasmania in 1840, the fifth child of ten to James Riordan and Mary Ann O'Connell. James and Mary travelled to Tasmania as free settlers in 1837, aboard the *Bussorah Merchant*. James and Mary started the voyage with two young daughters. Mary gave birth to another daughter on the voyage, but sadly, the two youngest daughters died of measles on the voyage.

At age twenty-five, John came to Creswick in 1865, with his younger brother Michael, two years his junior. Their intention was to mine. John began purchasing shares in Spring Hill mines starting with one share in the United Extended Standard Bearer Quartz and Alluvial Gold Mining Co, followed by the purchase of shares in numerous other companies. John did very well in mining as a speculator. When researching John Riordan, there were numerous references to his hotel hosting mining company meetings and also to him being a director of mining companies. All these meetings and social activities promoted by John contributed to ongoing employment and social stability in the community.

John married Bridget Ryan (who was born in 1847 in Limerick, Ireland), on 7 August, 1867 at St. Augustine's Church, Creswick. In 1868, John and Bridget had their first son James, who died at ten months of age. John and Bridget had seven children: James, John, Mary, William, Thomas, Catherine and Edward. The children attended St. Augustine's school, Creswick State School and Creswick Grammar School.

Bridget died in 1889 at Creswick and was buried in the Roman Catholic section of the Creswick Cemetery with three of her children. After Bridget died, John married Maggie Herd, on 30 November, 1891, in Creswick. They had no children.

In 1868 John purchased the Farmers Arms Hotel in Albert Street, from Catherine Murray. In 1869 he sold the Farmers Arms back to Catherine and built a new hotel next door called the Harp. He owned the Harp Hotel until 1882 when he sold to Mrs. Catherine Douglas, who renamed the hotel the Australasian, as her late husband was the manager of the Australasian No. 2 Mine prior to the disaster of December that year. Sadly, just days after renaming the hotel, the Australasian Mine disaster happened.

John led a very full and productive life in Creswick. He was one of the original members of the Creswick ANA (Australian Natives Association) and was involved in setting up a branch in 1879. ANA Branch Number 11, was successfully launched by March, 1880, with John Riordan being elected as Vice President as recorded in *The History of the ANA in Australia*. ANA branches were involved in welfare work and delivered educational lectures and debates. One debate held was, *Are the Chinese desirable colonists?* Another was *Smoking, is it injurious?* 

John is listed as an inducted member of the Creswick Havilah Lodge in 1879. The lodge met at The American Hotel until they moved to their new building in 1890. John, active on committees, was a member of the Creswick District Hospital Committee, and a proud member of the Creswick Volunteer Fire Brigade for over fifteen

years, joining in 1867. John was Lieutenant in 1873 and then Captain in 1876 until 1880. John was involved in the setting up of, and was a member of, the Creswick Horticultural Society from 1876.

Along with others, John made efforts in 1875 to establish a Gas Works, to be known as the Creswick Gas, Coal and Coke Company. Progress was very slow, the *Advertiser* reporting that the *'Proposed Directory being evidently determined to let grass grow under their feet'*. By June 1881, the gas works was still under discussion and by November, a gas company had been successfully floated at Maryborough — the *Advertiser* wrote: *'When will Creswick follow?'* Another first reported in May 1881 was for the formation of a Mining Exchange with John as a member.

In 1877, a Grand Cricket Match was held between the publicans and butchers with John Riordan named as a player. The price of admission was sixpence, for the benefit of the Cricket Club and the Bowling Club. Football was also becoming very popular and the Riordan name appears as team members in most local events. John was appointed a Vice President in 1878. On two occasions, the *Advertiser* invited interest in a Fancy Dress Football Match at Prince Leopold Park, later Hammon Park. Admission to the ground was again sixpence. Reports of cricket matches are numerous in the late 1880s, though whether this was his son John or Michael cannot always be determined.

John was a foundation member of the Creswick Hurling Club, formed in 1878. So what is hurling? A traditional Irish sport, hurling is one of the oldest field sports, played for more than eight hundred years. It has been described as a mixture of hockey and war! A curved wooden stick with a flat end is known as a hurly or hurley, and the ball or sliothar is about the size of a tennis ball. Fifteen players on the field aim to get the sliothar through a goal or a net and scores are made

accordingly. The sport in Creswick was played on the football ground, when practice would occur during the evening. Modern Hurling players are required to wear helmets, as the game is fast and dangerous.

What a good sport – John Riordan is reported in the *Creswick Advertiser* on numerous occasions as playing lawn bowls for Creswick. Many social events were recorded and always there was the return game, mostly with Buninyong, Allendale and Learmonth.

In 1893, a committee meeting of the Creswick Amateur Turf Club was held to organise a race meeting, for which a number of entries had already been received. Arrangements were made for the train to stop at the course on the day. John's involvement is again mentioned.

John was thoughtful to others, was an annual subscriber to the Creswick Hospital, Creswick Benevolent Society, and donated to the Indian Famine Relief, Distress in Ireland, Jubilee Brass Band, Ballarat Benevolent Asylum to name a few, and every year helped with the annual sports, raising money for the Creswick Hospital.

He was an entrepreneur, a mining speculator, an active businessman and Creswick citizen, also living in Ballarat and Tasmania for short periods.

Moving away from Creswick, John became a 'Gentleman' and resided in Ballarat in Doveton Street North, owning and running hotels. While there his son, William, died of a heart complaint and was buried with his mother in Creswick. By the early 1890s John had moved to Portland and taken on the license of the Portland Inn and became a councillor of the Borough of Portland. John lived there until his death in September 1905 and is buried in the South Portland Cemetery. His death was reported in the Portland, Ballarat and Creswick Newspapers.

An energetic and involved citizen, John Riordan's contribution to the community development of Creswick is worthy of acknowledgement.

#### The Art of Living

If only I could be a writer instead of a painter. Forgive me the many grammatical mistakes that I am sure I make, I am most definitely not a writer. Or, if only I could play a musical instrument, or dance, or make fantastic mathematical equations.

Then I would not require a studio with all my paints and easels and canvases. If I were a poet instead, I would just need my notebook to write in. If I were a cellist, my cello and my music would be my world. If I were a dancer, my own body would be my art. (Very glad to say that is not the case for me!) If I were a mathematician, I would dance across a blackboard.

Surely, I am not the only person who dreams of a different path through life. However, here we are - as we are. Just now, as I sit at my desk trying to write something meaningful, a flock of galahs flew overhead and vanished into the distance. Do they have any idea how lucky they are to be able to fly? They don't of course - they just do it. It is just transport to them, getting from one place to another. Or is it? Maybe birds do actually revel in their ability. I just looked up revel in my old Chamber's Dictionary to make sure I was using the word correctly – 'revel, to feast in a riotous or noisy manner'. Anyone else got a better description for the galahs?

Searching for other birds recently, I have been spending a lot time on the swamps near Clunes. All manner of waterbirds are out there at the moment following our long wet winter. As I sloshed my way through water and mud in my trusty gumboots, binoculars in hand, something else drew my attention. The trees.

Throughout these swamps are some of the most spectacular and ancient red gums I have ever seen. Many young ones, and that is great to see, but it is those towering, sometimes crumbling, wooden monoliths that really impressed me.

Then another revelation came. From the edge of one grove of tangled trees, I stared across yet another deep marshy bit to wade. My first impression of the distant line of gums was another tangled mess to pick my way through. As I drew closer, this tangled mess revealed itself to me in all its glory. This was not mess, this was poetry.

I saw the tree line showing itself to me as tree writing. What at first seemed haphazard was in fact perfect design. I found myself seeing in these trees a most precise calligraphy - like the wonderful poet calligraphers of the Ottoman Empire.

I have always admired the ability of calligraphers to bring the art of the word and the visual together so elegantly. After all, the poetry is all around us.



#### **BOOK REVIEW**

#### Australian Garden Rescue: Restoring a Damaged Garden

CSIRO Publishing, Collingwood, Australia (2014)

This book is about gardens with issues rather than creating new gardens. What I particularly liked was a subtle air of forgiveness. Other works seem to suggest if things are done properly from the start then all will be fine. From experience, however we know that is not always true.

The cover and title is what attracted me to it initially. Firstly, the fact that it is Australian and it is the CSIRO, so I trust it implicitly. Secondly, neglected gardens have always fascinated me. They are living echoes of history left behind, making you wonder about the absent gardener. There is a wistful magic about a lone geranium growing in a paddock near the remains of a brick chimney. On this cover is a weathered Adirondack chair almost totally submerged by an overgrown mass of plantings. A variety of pot plants in various stages of neglect sit on its concealed arms. Above that, three smaller images: cracked, dry earth, an anonymous plant with multi-hued, badly chewed leaves, and a fat, contented slug. Basics covered.

The book is dedicated to, 'the resilience of the human spirit, epitomised by all those who have ever had to begin again: a patch, a garden, a life'.

Part One looks comprehensively at soil neglect, followed by plant decisions to suit specific places and promote biodiversity, and concludes on drought proofing the garden. Part Two is titled *Rescue Rollout* and covers what to do in temperature and weather extremes, looks at bushfire preparedness, pests, fungus and plant diseases. It includes a comprehensive chapter on weeds including useful weeds, weed tea and a range of techniques to control them. The final section, *Gardens to the rescue*, is about how plants and gardens rescue us.

#### **Denise Longmire and the Power of Art**

Denise Longmire was, until very recently, an Art Therapist specialising in the area of palliative care. Denise explains art therapy as using the creative process of art making to improve wellbeing and help resolve emotional difficulties. Art Therapy incorporates art into a therapeutic relationship, as a means of communication, self-expression and understanding. In palliative care, the use of art therapy helps improve the mental health of patients as well as helping them to express their feelings, as they move through their illness in a safe, nurturing way.

When asked how she came to be an art therapist, Denise explains it was a two-fold process. Firstly, her own husband was diagnosed with cancer some years ago and whilst receiving therapy, Denise noticed that the music therapist never entered his room. Then, much later, when attending a botanical art class, the teacher was also an art therapist at the Royal Children's Hospital. 'This was a light bulb moment for me.' Denise went on to do a two-year Masters degree at La Trobe University. Her thesis explored her own journey with her mother's dementia using art.

After gaining her degree, Denise worked for ten years at Gandarra, the Palliative Care Unit of Ballarat Health Services. She even learnt to use a Reverie Harp when one was donated to the ward, moving from just art to arts therapy and she trained as a Grief Counsellor after her husband's death.

Denise is also a practising artist in textiles and paint. As an artist, Denise is clear that she also has to eat. 'I've proved you can make a living from art!' though she would not describe herself as a prolific artist.

Interestingly, Denise did not pass Art at school. She maintains that the education system does not have a wide enough view of art and students are discouraged from exploring their own talents, which do not always present themselves in a formal school setting. If she had her time over again, Denise would have loved to be an art teacher – 'but that's what I ended up doing in a different kind of way'! Over the years, Denise has helped all kinds of people in their journey. One young man who could no longer use his arms asked Denise to actually paint things for him as a way of expressing his feelings. Denise has brought some of those paintings to our meeting today - silent but evocative testaments to his feelings during the final stages of his journey.

Having started her working life in a bank, Denise married a local and has lived in the district for thirty-two years. Now retired, Denise has offered to volunteer as an Arts Therapist/Grief Counsellor at Shannon's Bridge. 'In my work, I considered it an honour to be part of someone's last days.'







#### **UP AND AWAY WITH MARK**

In an otherwise unremarkable garage in Creswick, Mark Wilson has been building an aeroplane.

After indulging his need for speed with an MG and then a Harley motorcycle a few years ago, Mark started looking around for another project. He heard about a small, single-seater kit aircraft called the *Rutan Quickie*. These were originally designed in the mid-70s by a team led by Burt Rutan in the USA. They are still quite rare – there are only four flying in the US and two in Australia that Mark knows of. Made of fibreglass-coated foam and originally powered by a small Briggs & Stratton 18hp engine, they were made to look like X-wing fighters from Star Wars.

Mark finally found a Q1 Quickie in Yendon. With no major plans, just guidelines, Mark has worked on it for eleven years so far. With help from many locals and interstate experts, he has re-laminated the fuselage, installed a more powerful engine (a 53hp *Rotax* engine), designed and built the instrument panel from scratch, and has spent countless hours working out the best configuration inside the cockpit.

Mark expects to finish within the next few weeks, when he plans to take it to Ballarat Airport for testing and readying for airworthiness. Mark learnt to fly at age sixteen, and has been taking extra flight training in Lethbridge in readiness



for the big take-off. Mark said, 'Of course, I won't want anyone else watching when I finally take her up for the first time!'

Originally from Ballarat, Mark has lived in Creswick for fifteen years. His enthusiasm for his project is engaging, and he acknowledges the many locals who have helped him with their time and expertise (not necessarily in aeronautical engineering). We look forward to looking up to see an X-wing zooming over Creswick sometime soon.

# Gardening Sources of information

It is always in the back of my mind as I write here that my gardening is personal and not professional. Because I have no formal training I am always very careful about the accuracy and reliability of what I say here in terms of ideas on what to do, for example my previous writing about hydrophobic soil and how it might be tackled.

I enjoy the search process for information I need; the pleasure of exploring things of which I know little, and stumbling across new things in the process. There is so much more to gardening than meets the eye. It heals, it toughens you up and it gives peace. It is about sharing and personal history and learning to work with what you have. There are many like me whose skill is based on years of slowly building up knowledge through falling in love with plants, dealing with what is at hand, and trying things out.

Professional help is always an option but it is not always affordable, available or even desired. All gardeners have their sources of information. Utilising other gardeners with a bit of *Gardening Australia* thrown in does it for many of us. I use family, friends and neighbours. One neighbour is brilliant for natives, another is advising me on how to save an ailing *spygocactus*, and a close friend who could propagate a dead leaf. I have learnt from strangers on the Melbourne train, at markets, and recently someone sitting next to me at the Red Cross Centre donating blood.

Gardeners love to share what they know and good, accessible information is available from many different sources, so I'm going to look next at the whole picture — at what is out there especially useful to a small regional town gardener with our particular needs in mind.



The Garden Club continues to grow with three new members welcomed recently. At the September meeting, Helen Lovel from Neutrog Fertilizers introduced club members to the wide variety of garden products from her company. Expect some blooming gardens around Creswick soon!





#### Friday October 3 1919

The first general meeting of shareholders in the Springmount Quartz Gold Mining Co., Creswick, will be held at the American Hotel tomorrow (Saturday) evening, at 7.30 o'clock. Included in the business will be the adoption of the rules and regulations, and the election of manager, directors and auditors.

#### **Tuesday October 7 1919**

A meeting of ladies and all interested in the Creswick Football Club will be held in the A.N.A. hall next Thursday evening at 8 o'clock to make arrangements for a wind up social and presentation of medals.

#### Friday October 10 1919

Since our last issue, the Gallipoli Strollers – a talented company of returned soldiers – completed a most successful season at the Creswick town hall on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings.

#### **Tuesday October 14 1919**

Those interested in the success of the Olympia Club's sports on New Years' Day are reminded of the meeting to be held this (Tuesday) evening, in the A.N.A. hall, when the programme will be adopted. The club is meeting with a good deal of encouragement.

#### Friday October 17 1919

Smeaton- All members and intending members of the Smeaton Brass Band are requested to attend a special meeting next Monday evening, at 8 o'clock. The annual inspection of band property will take place.

#### **Tuesday October 21 1919**

When the complete history of the Great War has been written, the most important part of women's work will be found under the heading of Red Cross Workers. They never tired, they never slackened their work; week after week, year after year, they would be found making garments, knitting, gathering together many other comforts for our sick and wounded soldiers, energetically supporting every patriotic movement.

#### Friday October 24 1919

Captain Matthews and Sergeant Tom Kay started on their flight to Australia just before noon on Tuesday under excellent weather conditions. Many Australian and British airmen assembled at Hounslow aerodrome, and cheered as the Sopwith machine rose. (Sergeant Tom Kay is a native of Springmount)

#### **Tuesday October 27 1919**

The bowling season was opened in Creswick on Saturday last, under delightful weather conditions. There was a good attendance of bowlers, ladies and onlookers, and the Mayor and Mayoress (Cr. And Mrs. W. B. Grose) were also present. Judging by the eagerness of the bowlers, a successful season is anticipated.

#### Friday October 31 1919

Mt. Prospect A.N.A. Hall

A meeting will be held on Monday evening next, at 8 o'clock to arrange a Welcome Home to Sergeant A. Atkins and Private W. Johnston. L. W. Stephens, Secty.
