

CRESWICK TRAILS AND HAMMON PARK TRAILHEAD UPDATE

The planning work is continuing on the Creswick Trails Network, an exciting project which will see delivery of 60km of mountain bike paths and a trailhead at Creswick, with Council expecting to begin works next year.

Along with the world class mountain bike trails, the trailhead at Hammon Park will serve as a community and youth precinct focusing on accessible play, cycling safety, cyclocross, and a site for local, regional and national events.

Permits and consents for the trails to be built are going through the required process. Once a permit is considered and approved, a construction tender will be advertised.

The detailed design of the masterplan for the Hammon Park Trailhead is proceeding and is around 80% complete. This necessary step provides the detail required for construction firms to quote and construct the trailhead.



Personality

KATHY BURGUM - A Well Travelled Life

Training with a small accounting practice in my hometown of Bolton provided an overall appreciation of most business activities and gave me an insight into psychology. I chose to specialise in taxation to help clients strategically structure business operations and minimise tax costs. I became one of the first women Chartered Accountants in England and most of my future career was with major international accounting firms based in capital cities which included London, Brussels, Hong Kong and Singapore, before settling in Australia in 1998. It was here that I attained a



Master of International Tax degree at the University of Melbourne in 2003. Obstacles experienced along the journey fortunately became learning opportunities which resulted in success and life enrichment.

In my chosen field, I have been privileged to work with leaders, both women and men, privately and family owned businesses along with multinational corporations. I trained and mentored multicultural team members in their career development and professionally presented to business audiences.

There are many stories to tell based on living and working within different cultures and I have chosen a few of the highlights to share with you. Mahatma Gandhi once said 'You must be the change you want to see in the world'.

While based in London, my most interesting assignment was to analyse the financial accounts of a multinational company which was the target of a takeover. This involved providing a written report to the Board of Directors of the acquiring company. As the project was highly confidential, I was provided with an office of my own overlooking Lake Geneva, Switzerland. I enjoyed the challenge and developing my investigatory, written communication and documentation skills, but missed the lack of verbal communication and social connection due to the secrecy surrounding this assignment. It was a bit like living in minilockdown.

In Singapore, one major project was establishing a new group to prepare tax returns for United States citizens who worked within the Asia Pacific region. The main client was a US oil company based in Indonesia with an office in Jakarta, Java, and two oil-based sites in the midst of the Sumatran jungle. One of the sites contained a small village which included a school and accommodation where most of the management employees were housed. The other mining site, about an hour's drive into the jungle, was

reached by driving along a road made of oil and soil. This was treacherous when it rained. I often closed my eyes when I got into the car trusting the driver would deliver me safely to my destination. Most of my time was spent meeting the American employees discussing items to be reported in their US income tax returns. I spent over a year in Indonesia. As the client's business grew, I trained additional staff in Singapore to prepare these returns. I will always remember the challenging environment.

During a routine job performance

review with one of my team in Adelaide, I explained that frequent talking about non-work-related issues was disruptive to the team's efficiency. I asked the employee whether they enjoyed their work. During this discussion it became apparent they were in the wrong job and, after reviewing their talents and interests, they chose to pursue a career in engineering. Although seemingly a prosaic interview, it had a profound effect on me when I realised that change was inevitable in life. I foresaw a need to communicate this vision - to empower individuals to live life fully, with harmony in each area of life and without limitations in order to become the best version of themselves. Subsequently, I drafted the skeleton for a book.

After leaving full-time employment in 2011, I chose to study, practise and experience the science of Yoga, which expanded my heart and mind with a deeper sense of ongoing awareness. I qualified as a Yoga teacher. Coincidentally during that time I met a publisher, who was interested in reviewing the book draft. *Celebrate Your Gold Within* was published in 2018, a unique workbook that also includes my life story.

With the help of social media, I am developing a course, based on the vision of the book, to empower a global community to attain their ideal lifestyle, to transform obstacles into limitless opportunities during difficult times, whilst maintaining peace of mind and happiness during daily turmoils.

I enjoy living in Creswick, connecting with the locals, being a Panel member on the Hepburn Community Vision and Council Plan and a volunteer mentor with Ballarat Regional Multicultural Council, along with other organisations. My hobbies include travel, designing jewellery, the arts, and hot air ballooning.

CROSS 4 a CAUSE

Recently, the VOGA Cycle Club of Creswick hosted two Cyclo-Cross (CX) events at Hammon Park in Creswick, a competitive event as part of the National CX series sanctioned by the *Union Cycliste Internationale* (UCI). A series of fun events was held later in the day, in support of Motor Neurone Disease Victoria's **Cross 4 a Cause.**

Motor neurone disease is the name given to a group of diseases in which the nerve cells, neurones, controlling the muscles that enable us to move around, speak, breathe and swallow, fail to work normally. It is also known as Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), Lou Gehrig's disease or Maladie de Charcot (Charcot's disease). In Victoria approximately 400 people are living with the condition at any given time. Life expectancy, post diagnosis, can be as short as eighteen months.

The VOGA Cycle Club's **CROSS 4 a CAUSE** event aimed to raise money for MND Victoria to assist in the research into the causes of MND and to fund equipment to support those unfortunate enough to have contracted the disease. It is also hoped to assist families and partners of MND sufferers.

COUNCIL AWARDS COMMUNITY GRANTS

Congratulations to Creswick and District Senior Citizens, Daylesford and District Horticultural Society, Daylesford Lawn Tennis Club, and Sprung Circus Incorporated, who will share in \$8,559.42 as part of Hepburn Shire Council's first round of grants for 2021/2022.

Council is supporting a project to celebrate spring; a display of historic images, information and memorabilia related to the Daylesford Lawn Tennis Club; an update to the seniors' kitchen at Creswick; and an end of term performance for young circus performers.

Badge found in Creswick goes home to South Australia



A couple of weeks before Christmas 2020, local Ken Winnell, whilst prospecting with his metal detector, came across what he thought was a war medal at Park Lake Creswick. Ken passed the medal onto a member of the Creswick-Smeaton RSL, who then handed it to Phil Greenbank the RSL's

Memorial and Memorabilia Officer earlier this year. Research showed the medal was a badge originally issued in WWI, then later in WWII.

There were three types of badges issued each with a registration number on the back.

- 1. Returned from Active Service
- 2. Discharged Returned Soldier
- 3. Mothers and Widow's badge.

This badge is the *Returned from Active Service* with Registration number 218391. It was originally assumed that it belonged to a Victorian soldier from WWI. After checking the number in the registers for Victoria WWI then WWII, no match was found. Then a search was started in the registers of other states for both wars. Finally the number was found in a WWII register for South Australia.

The number belongs to Milton Vivian Leitch born 18 January 1904 in Naracoorte. He was living in Penola when he enlisted, on 20 July 1940, in Adelaide, with Service Number SX9199. Milton Leitch served with the 2nd/14th Field Regiment and held the rank of Sergeant when he was discharged on 8 January 1946.

The badge was issued after he was discharged. It is not known how the badge ended up in Victoria unless Milton travelled to Creswick at some point.

An article about the finding of the badge and seeking the next of kin, was sent to the local newspapers in Penola and Naracoorte in South Australia which published the story. The article was seen by Bill Leitch, the great nephew of Milton. Due to COVID travel restrictions the local RSL was unable to present the badge to Bill and family personally. The Creswick-Smeaton RSL contacted the President of the Coonawarra/Penola RSL, Peter De Garis, who was happy to present the badge on behalf of the Creswick-Smeaton RSL. The badge was posted to Peter and presented to Bill Leitch and family at a special dinner on Friday, 13 August, 2021.

The family have no idea how the badge ended up in Creswick as Milton had no family contact here.

CRESWICK WARD UPDATE

CRESWICK TRAILS & HAMMON PARK

The planning work is continuing on the Creswick Trails Network, an exciting project which will see delivery of 60km of mountain bike paths and a trailhead at Creswick, with Council expecting to begin works next year.

Along with the world class mountain bike trails, the trailhead at Hammon Park will serve as a community and youth precinct focusing on accessible play, cycling safety, cyclocross, and a site for local, regional and national events.

Permits and consents for the trails to be built are going through the required process, and Mayor, Cr Lesley Hewitt, said Council is looking forward to constructing the projects once approvals are in place.

"This will be a great asset for our community, both offering locals the opportunity to get active and explore our beautiful bushland, and the economic benefits that come from people visiting our Shire," said Cr Hewitt.

Council has publicly advertised the planning permit and received a number of submissions.

While the planning permit process is undertaken, work is underway to finalise the construction documentation for tender. Once a permit is considered and approved, a construction tender will be advertised. We are expecting the tender to be advertised at the end of January 2022 and Council will consider awarding the contract at a Council meeting shortly thereafter.

"A lot of the process for constructing trails relies on approvals from other agencies, so we're doing what we can to keep this project moving," said Cr Hewitt.

"While the process may seem slow, it is a legislated and necessary part of the pre-construction work to ensure that what is built meets or exceeds requirements associated with constructing on Crown Land," she said.

"We are grateful for the Victorian Government's commitment of \$2.1M towards the Hammon Park trailhead through the Regional Tourism Infrastructure Fund – Stimulus Round."

The detailed design of the masterplan for the Hammon Park Trailhead is proceeding and is around 80% complete. This necessary step provides the detail required for construction firms to quote and construct the trailhead.

The masterplan includes details such as the precise location of features, services and paths, materials and testing details against known estimated costs.

"Once this work is complete we can release a construction tender for the trailhead. Should all go according to plan, we hope to award the contract at our December 2021 Council meeting, and that construction on the trailhead will start early next year."

A tender to construct a new public toilet and Changing Places facility at Hammon Park is currently advertised, and closes in early October, with construction dates set around events scheduled for Hammon Park later in the year and contractor availability.

"We are committed delivering the Creswick Trails and Hammon Park trailhead. These important infrastructure projects will drive the economy in Creswick and surrounds," said Cr Hewitt.

"This is particularly important considering the impact of COVID on local business, and we look forward to delivering these projects for the community," said Cr Hewitt.

STREETSCAPES

Council has commenced the planning work to deliver stage 2 of the Shire's Streetscape Plans. The planning for Creswick and Clunes is funded in this financial year.

The Streetscape Plans were developed for Clunes, Creswick, Glenlyon, Trentham and Hepburn, with significant input from the community, and adopted by Council in 2015. During this financial year work will focus on developing Stage 2 of the Clunes and Creswick streetscape concepts to detailed design with a view to construct in 2022/2023. This follows on from the completion of Stage 1 works.

Days for Girls Team We believe in a world where periods are never a problem

Recently, a small group of volunteers gathered at the Verey Chapel to pack 200 menstrual kits. These kits are a safe, reusable solution to help manage menstruation for girls and women around the world. The kits include a washable, reusable pad, absorbent liners, carry pouch for transport and washing, panties, soap, washcloth, a care and use sheet which are all packed in a drawstring bag.

Days for Girls Australia Limited (DfGAL) and World Vision Canada (WVC) are working together to reach girls and women in refugee camps in South Sudan and Somalia. There are another 200 kits in storage which were made during COVID lockdowns. All these kits will go to this refugee project.

The team has over twenty volunteers offering their time and enthusiasm to make kits but support is needed to source the necessary materials. Daylesford Rotary over the past two years has generously donated cash allowing the purchase of goods required.

Donations of fabrics have come from many different people in the community which is a big saving. However, there is always a need for 100% cotton fabrics for the pads and cotton polyester fabrics for the hold all bags. If anyone has fabrics that are hiding in the back of cupboards, to check if they might be suitable for the kits, please ring Terri on 0414 657 461.

Residents at John Curtin Aged Care in Creswick have helped with putting the kits together by sorting and folding over 3,000 liners.

Providing 400 menstrual kits to the refugee project is a result of the community working together, so thank you all.

October 5, 1921

Residents of the town will be pleased to know that a brass band will enliven the proceedings during the "home-coming" week in November. A large number of members of the Smeaton band have joined with those of the Creswick Victory Band, under the conductorship of Mr. Percy Northcott, and they have commenced practicing. It is believed the united band will consist of fully 30 members.

October 8, 1921

Allendale – A full muster of members of the local fire brigade assembled on Monday night to bid farewell to Apparatus Officer R. Svanosio, who has been a member of the brigade for many years. Capt. Geo. Hobill presided.

October 12, 1921

The honor of Creswick is at stake. The "BACK TO CRESWICK" movement must be made a success. Assist to retain the name your town possesses by taking part in the work of arranging a monster reception. Meeting on Saturday night, in Council Chambers, town hall.

October 15, 1921

Football- The Camp Hill Stars played their final game of football last Saturday when they defeated Smeaton on

the Allendale ground. The central umpires were T. Wingate and L. Crane. Scores – Stars, 5 goals, 6 behinds; Smeaton 5 goals, 5 behinds. Best players for Stars – Revile, Featherstone, Peters, Riddiford, Ryan and Robson; and for Smeaton, S. Mitchell, Dial, Kennedy, Collins and Leishman.

October 19, 1921

Residents are reminded of the social to be held in the Rechabite hall tomorrow (Thursday) evening, in aid of the linen fund of the local hospital. A good programme will be given, including songs, games, dancing, etc.

October 22, 1921

District schools have been making a collection of eggs for the Creswick District hospital. North Creswick State School collected 45 dozen. The collection at the Springmount State School totalled 13 dozen.

October 26, 1921

Creswick Bowling Club – Members and intending Members, together with their Lady Friends, are invited to be present at the Ceremony of the Opening of the Green for the Season, to take place on Saturday, 29th October, at 3 pm. D. Dimsey, President; W. S. Northcott, Secty.

October 29, 1921

Mr. H. R. Jordan notifies that he is opening a cash bakery and small goods business next Tuesday. It was Mr. Jordan's intention to commence yesterday, but delay in fitting out the shop at the corner of Albert and Raglan streets prevented this.

MY GARDEN What's in a name? By Rhonda Cotsell

We experience individual plants in many different ways, from its particular requirements to exactly why we chose to have it in our gardens. Different plants also affect how we physically experience the coming and going of seasons. Each year as winter comes to an end some people who live with a garden can tell when spring is on its way, regardless of the date, because of a particular plant. My daphne, a pretty basic evergreen bush most of the time, annually signals winter's retreat by flooding my back door with a fragrance nothing short of divine.

Despite this annual olfactory garden celebration supreme, I know nothing about my daphne, so looked further. It was a bit of a shock to discover that all parts of my daphne are poisonous to humans and some domestic animals, especially the berries, and that contact with the sap can cause dermatitis in some. There were references to daphne being useful for treating a range of ailments but nothing conclusive so, given its toxicity, this needs more investigating.



Originally a native of China and Japan, the inner part of its tough, leathery bark was historically used to make fine quality paper and rope. In Japan its name is jinchoge, or sweet *daphne*. My favourite is Korean its name, *chullihyang*, which means thousand mile scent.

Mine is a *daphne odora*, meaning fragrant. Its name, daphne, also comes from the Greek word for laurel, coming from the family Thymelaeaceae, genus daphne. In the language of flowers daphne represents immortality. The word daphne also comes from Greek mythology and means naiad, a female nymph associated with sources of fresh water. The natural habitat of the daphne plant is woodlands, which perhaps explains why mine doesn't mind the white hardenbergia which sprawls over it.

In Greco-Roman mythology Daphne is the daughter of the river God Peneus and the object of an infatuated Apollo (victim of a curse by jealous Cupid). She begs her father to protect her from his attentions, which he does by transforming her into a laurel.

So now as I step outside for my daily daphne hit I also check for signs of little red berries, or broken limbs leaking sap, and imagine a wood nymph crouching under the white Australian hardenbergia concealing her from both me and the love-struck Apollo roaming somewhere in my garden.



THE ART OF LIVING

I am sitting in my studio surrounded by an exhibition that is not going to happen. Not this year anyway. Thanks to COVID. This exhibition was planned well over twelve months ago, back then we all thought COVID would be a byline in history by now. The show should be hanging on the walls of the gallery in Melbourne right now. The invitations have been printed and mailed out. Then lockdown number *whatever it is*, happened. It's ok, I am

not whining about it. Things happen. There are billions of people in the world worse off than me at this time. In fact, I am really lucky to be living here with my minor problems.

The exhibition was to be a celebration of the twenty-five years that I have been showing at *Stephen McLaughlan*

Gallery, in the iconic Nicholas Building on the corner of Swanston Street and Flinders Lane. We had selected paintings, drawings, prints and sculptures produced over that period. So, here it all sits, in my studio, with one viewer - me. And, I have to say, that as the sole viewer, I am greatly enjoying the experience! Of course, it will be shown eventually, sometime next year. A bit disappointing, but not the end of the world.

Actually, the whole year preparing for this exhibition has been really interesting for me. Looking back over twenty-



five years of work is both strange and refreshing. Sometimes I have found a drawing that I had completely forgotten about, but then recalled the day, the weather and how it was made.

Picking up a sculpture, I remember the source of inspiration for it from so many years ago. Choosing to show, finally, some paintings that had not been shown previously because they were special to me for one reason

or another. I can't help but think these strange days can hold as much good for us as it does the bad. I choose to think of the good and I could talk for a week about that. Isolation can be very instructive when we allow it to be. Reflection, noticing the small things as well as the large.

Memories. I am currently reading a book that I have known about my entire adult life, yet never actually read -*WALDEN*, written by an American, Henry David Thoreau in the years 1845-47. For those two years, he took himself into deliberate isolation at Walden Pond in Massachusetts. He built his own cabin in the woods and grew his own food. In *WALDEN*, he discovers the world around him, and himself.
