




Spring has finally arrived

HONOUR ROLL INDUCTEE 2018

CORA MEDILL CARTLEDGE 1911- 1994

For her lifetime of voluntary service to numerous community organisations and causes in Creswick



Cora Medill Pollard was born at Rutherglen, Victoria, the third daughter of Richard and Jessie Pollard, on 30 April, 1911. She was the granddaughter of Joseph Pollard, the grower of a hybrid peach and almond tree (*Prunus Pollardii*), still famous in Creswick today.

In 1933, Cora married Cecil John Cartledge, who had been raised in Ballarat and Creswick, and they spent their early married life in Melbourne before moving to Creswick, via Ballarat, in 1938. By then they had four children Francis Rita (Bisby), Dorothy Norma (Clifton), Lesley Raymond, and Neville Cecil Cartledge. The family was increased to five children shortly after, with the arrival of Rodney Alfred. Their house was in Melbourne Road, Creswick and from early times it was an 'open house' with visitors dropping in and families suffering hard times or illness receiving care.

During the Second World War, Cecil was sent to the Northern Territory as part of the Civil Construction Corps and Cora capably managed the family of six, when a nephew from Melbourne came to stay.

When the children were settled into school, her lifelong inclination for community and charity work came to the fore. Her first venture was to join the Creswick Primary School Mother's Club in 1945 where she was Treasurer in 1945 and 1950, and Secretary in 1946.

Cora's next undertaking was to attend a meeting in 1950 to re-form the 1st Creswick Scouts, a Committee she was involved in for many years. She encouraged her children to join the Scouts and both Neville and Rodney were dedicated members. Her son Neville has continued her legacy by his active interest in the Creswick and wider Scouting movement.

Also in 1950, Cora was one of the Foundation Committee members of the Creswick Ladies Bowling Club where she

served as Ladies Secretary from 1951 to 1956 and as Lady President from 1958-61, 1966-68 and 1971-72.

Cora next joined the Creswick District Hospital Ladies Auxiliary where she served in total for forty-one years and was President for twenty-two of those years (1959-1981).

This was a very active role and fund-raisers conducted included: Debutante Balls, Australia Day, Miss Creswick, Swimming Club Carnivals, Garden Parties and Sweeps being held annually. Funds raised went towards medical and other hospital equipment, ward furnishings, and amenities for patients, nursing home residents and staff. Cora was presented with a plaque in 1994 acknowledging her forty years of service to the Auxiliary. Cora's daughter Norma still serves on the Hospital Ladies Auxiliary.

Cora joined the Creswick District Hospital Committee and continued as a member until 1983 when she retired, but then joined the Interim Board and then the Foundation Board of the John Curtin Aged Care facility. Cora was made a Life Governor of John Curtin Aged Care in 1986. She retired from this Committee in 1993.

Cora's next project was the Creswick Elderly Citizens Club where she was Treasurer from 1979 to 1992 and was also made a Life Member. In addition to these admirable causes, Cora gave great service to the Creswick Red Cross, the Creswick Band and the Creswick Football Club Ladies Committee.

In her book *Following the Bands* Maureen French acknowledged Cora as one of the ladies of the Creswick and District Band Ladies Social Club, saying, 'these ladies worked so hard.'

Cecil passed away on May 14, 1986 at the age of 79, and during the remainder of her life Cora was well supported by her family and friends. When in hospital in 1994, she was delighted when grandson Richard and wife Leanne came to tell her they were expecting a baby and hoped it would be a boy to carry on the Cartledge name. As the pregnancy was at an early stage, she was asked not to tell anyone. What a reliable Grandmother! She didn't say a word until next morning and by the end of that day most of the hospital staff knew. Great grandson Ethan Lewis was born on April 16, 1995.

Cora passed away on 23 August, 1994 aged 83 and is buried with Cecil at Creswick Cemetery.

PLANTING THE SHIRE OF CRESWICK'S AVENUE OF HONOUR AT KINGSTON 10 AUGUST, 1918

Tree Planting Day was held four months after the Shire President, Captain Parkin, presided at a public meeting, in early 1918, to discuss 'The Avenue' suggestion from State Recruitment Committee of Victorian municipalities. A second Meeting, on April 27, agreed to set the Avenue along the road to Springmount rather than from Picken's Corner to Kingston, or South from the Showgrounds to Kingston. Creswick's

A Committee was formed, of representatives from Allendale, Broomfield, Cabbage Tree, Campbelltown, Dean, Eastern Hill, Greenhill, Hollinwood, Kangaroo Hills, Kingston, Kooroocheang, Mollongghip, Moorookyle, Mount Prospect, Newlyn, Rocky Lead, Smeaton, and Ullina, and the Presidents of all Red Cross Branches in the Shire.

Working bees occupied several Saturdays, digging holes to take trees seven feet high. Tree guards, three-feet square, were transported from the railway station, and erected.

On August 9, *The Creswick Advertiser* drew attention to the following day's monumental activity, urging a solid attendance. The August 15 report occupied four and a half columns and reported 1,000 people planted 225 trees, drains dug, tree guards and name plates installed. The weather had been excellent, a large crowd attended, Sir Alex Peacock declared the day open and commented that, *'The Avenue should be a very fine one in time to come.'* Captain Thomas Parkin organized the planting groups. Afterwards a Red Cross afternoon tea was provided in a large marquee set up on Cr Leishman's property.

The prediction that the trees would have a life-span of forty years has been proven wrong, helped by their recent restoration by Kingston Friends of the Avenue, the local community and the Hepburn Shire Council.

One hundred years later, the Shire of Creswick's Avenue of Honour at Kingston stands as a living memorial that honours men and women who ventured into World War I. It is a locale for reflection for descendants and for all of us. The Avenue is also a testament to the community endeavour involved in its establishment and to the community efforts to preserve it.

The Avenue's 100 years and the Armistice Centenary will be commemorated and celebrated on Sunday 11 November 2018, at Kingston.

Postscript

The planting of the Avenue was a remarkable effort considering the population of the Shire was approximately 5,000 at that time. In excess of 1,000 were serving overseas or had died in the War. The holes and drains were dug with shovels and 'elbow grease'. Bullock and horse drawn drays transported guards and trees from the Kingston Railway Station.

On 24 August 1918 another twenty-five trees were planted but the Avenue was not complete until 9 August 1919 when the last thirty-six went in to make up the total of 286 trees. The Avenue was planted 'on that long dusty road' in Kingston because the Creswick Shire Offices were there.

Lastly, can anyone shed light on the current location of Picken's Corner?

Creswick Garden Club Learning Day with ABC's Jerry Coleby-Williams

From sharing stories of his grandfather's natural pesticide recipes, to discussing the predatory nature of good and bad bugs, ABC *Gardening Australia's* Jerry Coleby-Williams, enthralled the Creswick Garden Club's Learning Day audience with his captivating charm.

The focus of Jerry's presentation was his move to Brisbane in 2003 and the establishment of his organic garden on a bare suburban block. Jerry is more inclined to think small to make great transformational changes. He admits to being slightly obsessive and from lessons taught to him by his family of gardeners and farmers, keeps records of successes and failures. 'All life is a bit of an experiment and every time I grow something I see that as part of my research. And I always keep records', Jerry said.

His passion about what can be achieved in a small patch of land has been a powerful message and he has presented twice at the United Nations. Phyllis Wright, President of the Creswick Garden Club, said she was delighted when Jerry accepted the invitation to present at this year's Learning Day. 'Every participant came away with knowledge of how to improve their gardens and what can be achieved in a small space. It was a fantastic presentation. Jerry might have worked at Kew Gardens and Sydney Botanic Gardens but the message he gave us was relevant to the smallest spaces', Phyllis said.

Sharing his Grandfather's natural recipes for pest disease management, Jerry said that anyone could become an organic gardener. 'These recipes are cheap and effective and won't cause damage to the environment. I believe that gardeners are eco-system engineers and that together we can develop sustainable horticulture.' Jerry employs integrated vermin control in his garden, whereby different species take care of rats, possums and bad bugs.

In a relatively short space of time, Jerry has created an organic garden, giving life to numerous flowering plants, shrubs, trees and vegetables as well as 520 species of insects and interesting reptiles and mammals. He has achieved an ecological balance by simply observing, listening to old knowledge and taking notes for record keeping. 

THE ART OF LIVING

As we say goodbye to Winter and witness the change to Spring, I have to say, I have really enjoyed the bare branches of the deciduous trees through the Winter. We get a chance to see the structure of the trees. My native trees however, are ready to burst into new growth. I have watched them for a while now ... just waiting, tiny new leafs, waiting for a few more degrees of warmth and a little more sunshine.

Let us reflect on the nature of change.

Whilst record breaking temperatures have baked the European summer causing bushfires in Portugal, Greece, even Sweden of all places, the enormous wildfire in California broke new records for fire in that state. Back home in Australia, half the country is in the grip of drought, and NSW bushfires were blazing in Winter.

Lately, I have been thinking a lot about the changes that happen in our society.

Our history, and present, may have been very different indeed. There were many explorers sailing around these shores in the 17th and 18th centuries. There are Chinese maps from the 16th century showing the north Queensland coast. If the Dutch, Portuguese, French or Spanish raised their flag here first, what kind of society may we have been now?

We may have been a Creole nation to start with. French, Spanish and Portuguese colonists often married with indigenous peoples from Mexico to Brazil to the Pacific.

Reflect on that for a moment. What would our people, our architecture, our crops and food look like if we had been colonized by any of the above mentioned explorers?

Our post WWII immigrants, Italians, Greeks, Polish, Dutch, and folk from so many lands helped build our wonderful multicultural society. The Snowy Mountain Scheme would not have been built without them, (nor the Overland Telegraph, nor the inland mail without the Afghan camel trains). And of course the Chinese who walked from Robe in South Australia to the Central Victorian goldfields, who not only worked the gold but set up the market gardens to provide the food. Apologies to any people I have forgotten to name – I am sure there are many.

Above all, I must acknowledge our very first settlers, the indigenous peoples here, for some sixty thousand years at the very least. What must they have thought when they saw the First Fleet arriving in 1788?

My elderly father often asks, 'why does everything have to keep changing'? His own parents were born into a world without electricity, they witnessed two World Wars and a man on the moon. That's a lot of change in a lifetime.

All things pass and all things change.

So, my friends, enjoy the last of Winter and celebrate the change to Spring – and the new growth everywhere.





September 3, 1918

The Salvation Army, Creswick – A splendid Band, consisting of 24 boys from the Salvation Army Box Hill Home, will give a very interesting programme of Music, Singing, Drills, Pyramids, etc. in the Town Hall, Creswick, Friday, September 6th, at 8 p.m. Admission 1/-; Reserved seats 2/-. Proceeds in aid of Self Denial Fund. L. HIckton, Captain.

September 6, 1918

Football- A match will be played at Springmount on Saturday, when the Springmount team will try conclusions with the Kingston team, and as the ground is in good order, a good game is to be expected. The team to oppose Kingston will be picked from the following:- Flynn (3), Slade (2), S. Mason, H. Bourke, James (2), O'Brien (2), Rush, Ryan (3), Slater (2), Ross, Crosbie, Redford, Lang.

September 13, 1918

Mr. T. Fish, of Raglan Street, announces in our advertising columns that he has purchased the livery and letting stables recently carried on by Mr. M. Canning. Cabs will meet all trains, and all orders will be promptly attended to at reasonable rates.

September 17, 1918

A fancy dress display, interspersed with musical items, will be given by pupils of Miss Spunner's Physical Culture Class in the town hall next Saturday evening in aid of the patriotic fund of the Creswick State school. A short dance will follow. Tickets for the display are 1/ each, and seats may be reserved at Mrs. Arch's on payment of 6d extra.

September 20, 1918

WANTED:- 40 girls for Knitting Factory, Clunes. Starting shortly. Splendid opportunity for energetic girls. Wages to commence – 16 years and under 10/ per week; 17 years 12/; 18 years 15/; 19 years 18/; 20 years 20/. Apply by letter to Mr. P. Rowe, Service Street, Clunes.

September 24, 1918

Ratepayers in the Borough of Creswick are reminded that all rates – general, water and sanitary – must be paid by the 30th inst. The town clerk will attend at the office daily from 10 am till 5 pm and from the 26th to the 30th from 10 am to 9 pm for the purpose of receiving payments.

September 27, 1918

Smeaton- Euchre and dance- another of the series of euchre parties and dances in aid of the Smeaton honor roll will take place in the Mechanics' Hall on Friday, 4th October. A new feature will be a waltzing competition.

Mobile Phones



MILESTONE FOR CRESWICK TRAILS PROJECT

Mountain Bike Trails

A major milestone was recently reached for the Creswick Trails Project that plans to build 100kms of mountain bike trail in and around Creswick. Meeting at the RACV Goldfields resort, five organisations came together to officially commit to work together to deliver the project. The project has been made possible with a \$2.56 million grant from the Victorian Government.

In attendance were Regional Development Victoria, DELWP, Parks Victoria, HVP Plantations, Hepburn Shire Council, Melbourne University and several community members.

Mr Bruce Lucas, General Manager Infrastructure at Hepburn Shire Council, provided an update on the project's progress. Mr Lucas indicated that the various land managers had worked together closely to finalise the Stage 1 trail alignment that allowed the project to move to the tendering stage for construction.

It was confirmed that construction of the Pump-Track at Hammon Park would start in late September. Mr Lucas congratulated community members and acknowledged their crucial input to the projects development.

The Project Governance Agreement is a key document that sets out a commitment from each organisation to work with Hepburn Shire to deliver the project. The project aims to build and formalise a trail network across six land tenures in plantation forest and gold field areas, making the project both complex and ambitious, which is why the signing of the document is such an important milestone.

In addition to the land managers involved in the project, RACV Goldfields resort pledged their support for the project indicating that mountain biking was included in their future strategic direction and have recently committed to further mountain biking infrastructure at the resort.

With the support of Regional Development Victoria, the project now has five organisations who are committed to the project's success.
