Through this experience, the grade 5/6 students experienced first hand the hustle and bustle of a large city and the many interesting aspects that it has to offer everyone.

# Gardens and Health By Rhonda Cotsell

We all know that gardening is good for us, but there are also benefits not as obvious as fresh air and tomatoes straight from the plant. For example, I came across an item recently that said there was something in the soil that acted the same way as antidepressants. So I checked and found more than one article, research based, that described how each time our hands are in the soil our skin is exposed to *mycobacterium vaccae* – a bacterium which can act on a part of the brainstem (near the bottom of your brain at the back of the skull) which affects our levels of serotonin by increasing how much is released into our bodies. This affects how our body works and our behaviour, including how we react to stress.

There are other benefits beside helping us cope with sadness or stopping us from throwing things. Exercise - in our garden we are constantly moving. We lift, carry, bend, walk, haul and stretch, using many parts of our bodies. We breathe fresh air under a Vitamin D showering sun. We, and those we live with, gain from the nutritional benefits of eating vitamin and mineral rich fresh fruit, vegetables and herbs, including edible weeds and flower heads. All chemical free whether picked fresh on the run or cooked, pickled, preserved, sat on the bench for a bit, or stored where applicable. There are also other psychological benefits apart from increased uptake of serotonin. Stress can be relieved in the regular routine tasks, or in resistance and strength building activities like hauling, digging and pushing mowers.

What works for me especially is hand weeding, but there is also pruning and its disposal and spreading compost and mulch. Another psychological benefit is social. When you get the gardening bug you are joining an enormous tribe that will chat with you at the drop of a hat about anything garden related. Another thing I found while checking the relationship between soil and antidepressant effect was that flowers also have the power to calm us by decreasing our levels of the stress hormone cortisol through smelling, pressing, planting, creating flower arrangements and making topiaries. But none of this is entirely new as everyone who gets to mess about in a garden already knows that to garden is to be blessed.





Animals are a very important part of our lives. St Francis of Assisi Day is on 4 October. His celebration of the whole of creation and that animals don't worry about food, clothing or getting ahead is a good reminder for us all.

You are invited to bring your pets. Please ensure they are appropriately leashed, in proper carrying containers as we don't want any mishaps. Some animals may need to be outside rather than in the hall. (No crocodiles or venomous snakes, please - although they are precious in God's sight!)

The blessing will be part of a service of Christian worship held in the Church Hall. It will be in a cafe style. Morning tea will be served. Masks are encouraged, especially for any singing.

### **Recipe for a Healthy Brain** Dr Roy J Hardman (Phd), Cognitive Neuroscientist

Is there such a recipe and can it be implemented? From my own research in this area (published world wide) and the scientific press the answer is yes! There is an unrealistic fear in the population that ageing leads to dementia. This is not the case. Even though ageing may be a causative relationship to dementia it is neither predictable nor an inherited occurrence unless your parents had early onset dementia before the age of sixtyfive years.

Everyone's brain ages, however, there is no set timeframe and our brains all age at a different time pending the impact placed on it by the internal and external environment. Currently there is no treatment for dementia. The best option is to reduce the incidence and understand that many of us have mild cognitive impairment which is not dementia. As we age it is normal to lose some memory, however, how fast or under what circumstances is somewhat dependent on how we have treated our brain, where we live, what we eat, how fit we are and an overall cardiovascular health profile.

Just consider, you do not put diesel fuel in a petrol car and expect it to operate effectively. Then why do we place high fat, high sugars, trans fats and cholesterol producing foods into our body and expect the brain to be fit, healthy and operate to its optimal performance? Over time, the brain will become sluggish, lack energy and we expose the brain to harmful inflammatory responses. If we are not giving the brain the precursors to work effectively such as high intakes of fruit and vegetables, fish, minor red meats and whole grains then where is the fuel going to come from? You would have read about fad diets, shakes, slimming tablets, starvation, fasting, all manner of health kicks and pre-manufactured food to assist you, however, what are these doing to your brain?

The most common form of dementia is Alzheimers which is generally assessed by a Neurologist, noting the formation of plaques in the brain. You may be able to slow this process, however, there is no turning back and there is no magic medical cure available to date to reduce the incidence of plaque formation. The only known way is prevention, making lifestyle changes in one's forties or fifties to ensure that there is minimised potential for dementia onset.

Dietary patterns have also been considered. My research has focused on the Mediterranean style of diet. You may say we are not in the Mediterranean. However, it is the style of eating that is the key regardless of the country you live in.

The Mediterranean style of diet is a low inflammatory diet and when followed and ensuring the extra virgin olive oil is your main source of fat, then you can be assured that your brain is going to receive all the nutrients it requires to assist you against the ravages of our environment today.

# BBBBB PROJECT UPDATES

SHIRE COUNCIL

Works on the Calembeen Park change facilities are progressing with the refurbishment of the amenities in full swing. The project includes three accessible changeroom toilets and showers, accessible footpaths, landscaping and furniture. It will be completed very soon.

Hammon Park Trailhead is under construction and will include a bike jumps course, learn to ride areas, play areas, a changing places toilet facilities and more. Hammon Park will be the trailhead for the Creswick Trails, a network of 60km of mountain bike trail through the parkland and forests near Creswick. Council will look to award the contract for the Creswick Trails in November, with construction expected to begin in early 2023.

These projects are being delivered by Council in partnership with the Victorian Government.

### Environmental Effects Submission to AusNet's Western Renewable Link Project

Kingston Friends of the Avenue invites readers to share their personal stories about the Avenue of Honour in Kingston.

Each avenue of honour is different but each tells the story of local people. Many avenues have faded away as their connection with the local community has been lost. The Avenue of Honour in Kingston is an exception. Kingston Friends of the Avenue works hard to preserve the beauty, dignity and history of the place because the community connection runs deep.

Kingston and the surrounding district face major change as a result of proposed electricity projects, starting with the Western Renewables Link project and the Victoria to New South Wales Interconnector West project (VNI West). The proposal is that the district will be transformed into an energy powerhouse centred on a big terminal station in Mt Prospect.

The plan for multiple overhead power lines connecting to the terminal station is of concern to the community. The lines and terminal station will have an adverse impact on valuable agricultural land, significant landscapes and the well-being of the community. In addition, battery energy storage systems and other electricity sector projects will be built close to the power infrastructure, creating an industrial blight on the landscape and fundamentally changing the district.

Kingston Friends of the Avenue is preparing to lodge an Environment Effects Statement submission. The submission will be prepared by volunteers. It will explain the adverse impact that the Western Renewables Link (and the other projects) will have on the Avenue of Honour and also on the heritage of Kingston and the surrounding district. It will also cover the impact on the heritage trees around historic Kerrin's Bridge in Kingston which will be directly under the power lines.

Friends of the Avenue ask for contributions in readers' own words, and photographs, about their personal connection with the Avenue of Honour in Kingston to help them capture local knowledge of the region in their EES Submission. Hepburn Shire Council's insert *Make Your Voice Heard* came in our rates notice. It is a practical guide to preparing your personal responses. It can also be found on the website *participate.hepburn.vic.gov.au*.

### 100 Years Ago

Complied by Creswick Museum

#### September 1, 1922

A large audience at the town hall last Tuesday evening had a real musical treat, when the Creswick Victory Brass Band made its first appearance after reorganisation. As previously reported, the band almost suffered extinction some time ago, but enthusiastic endeavors were put forth by several residents, with the gratifying result that the band was placed on a much firmer footing.

#### September 5, 1922

A grand fancy fair is to be held in Wesley Hall on Wednesday and Thursday of next week. The opening ceremony will be performed by Lady Peacock on the Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock. There will be the usual stalls, as well as competitions. The admission has been fixed at 6d for each night.

#### September 8, 1922

It is hoped to complete on Monday next the work of removing the improvements from the former show ground site at Smeaton to the new site at Kingston. All workers are requested to attend at 9 am sharp, and teams are required for the carting. A meeting of the committee will be held at the shire hall at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

#### September 12, 1922

#### Mining News – New Ristori

Good progress has been made with the erection of the surface plant at the New Ristori alluvial mine at Allendale by the contractors. Messrs. Delaland Bros. of Ballarat, who have earned much commendation from the directors and company management for the workmanship and quick methods they have practised during the erection.

#### September 15, 1922

The Creswick Borough Council has decided to call tenders for leasing the Dean reservoir farm, returnable at the December meeting. The present lease expires on  $1^{st}$ March next.

#### September 19, 1922

The pupils of the Creswick State School will give a grand children's entertainment in the town hall on Thursday evening, when the proceeds will be in aid of the Soldiers' Memorial Fund. The programme will consist of action songs, physical drill, musical items etc.

#### September 22, 1922

Newlyn – An important meeting of subscribers to the newly formed Mechanics' Institute and Free Library was held in the Newlyn hall on Saturday evening, to elect new trustees for the present building and for a new hall, the proposal for which is being taken up heartily by the residents of the district.

#### September 26, 1922

The Creswick Junior Football Club, winners of the district premiership, will celebrate the occasion by a ball in the A.N.A. hall on Wednesday (tomorrow) evening.

#### September 29, 1922

Dean School Fair – to be held on Thursday (afternoon and evening) and Friday (evening)  $5^{th}$  and  $6^{th}$  October in the Dean Hall. To be opened by Lady Peacock at 3 pm on Thursday. Come and join in the fun and help the school. Stalls, Items, Competitions. Social on Friday evening. Admission 6d. Children 3d.

I am writing this in the first week of August. This is the time of the fire pit – my go to place in the garden on these cold afternoons. I prefer to be outside as much as I can, surrounded by my native bush garden and birds. Gazing into the fire is magical, almost hypnotic, watching coals glow – they seem to hum in a visual way. The flames just dance and dance. The fire awakens childhood memories of burning mallee roots and briquettes – thankfully we

don't burn those anymore!

Over the years, I have made many paintings and drawings that have had elements of fire. Yes, fire can be destructive in the loss of life and possessions. It also



brings renewal to our native plants, many of which need fire and smoke for their seeds to come alive. And of course, the indigenous folk did gentle cool burns to keep the country clean, open, and bring on new food for the animals they hunted.

My dear old mum, long gone now, used to say she would rather a fire than a flood 'a fire and everything is gone, start again -a flood, endless cleanup'. Wow, doesn't Creswick know about that as well.

It is no small wonder that so many civilizations have a large culture around fire and its transformative capacity. Actually, I think the very first Pitjantjara word I learnt when working with the Mutidjula Community at Uluru in the early 1980s, was in fact Waru – fire, followed by Kapi – water. Now there's a ying yang if ever there was one.

I would love to know some of the local Dja Dja Wurrung words for these. In mediaeval times, trial by fire meant different things to different cultures, from proving one's innocence to proving one's faith, and many other things between. Many cultures consider fire and smoke as cleansing – especially here in Australia where the oldest continuing culture in the world practise the Smoking Ceremony as a cleansing and Welcome to Country.

> For me personally, as a very innocent, young and green kid from the city, forty-two years ago at Uluru, I learnt the power and importance of fire when I was invited to an Inma, the Pitjantjara word

for a corroboree. Many folk had gathered at Uluru for ceremonies and business. It was a cool, pitch black night. There were many small campfires around which women and children sat. The women began beating sticks on the ground to mark rhythm. As I recall, singing also started. Suddenly, spinifex was thrown onto a campfire centre stage creating a huge burst of light as ghostly, painted dancers appeared out of the dark to perform and story tell. This was repeated over and over into the night. That experience is quite literally burned into my memory. It must be so much more so for the Aboriginal people.

So, when I stare into my fire pit, it is not just for warmth and entertainment – I see, smell, hear, thousands of years of human history and knowledge.
