

Local, Tony Clark, Awarded Labor Party's Kimberley Kitching Award for Human Rights

The Australian Labor Party has instituted a new award to recognise party members who have made a significant contribution to the advancement of Human Rights in Australia. The inaugural award was presented at the Labor Party National Conference in Brisbane last month to Creswick's Tony Clark.

The award is named in honour of the late Senator Kimberley Kitching, a Labor Party Senator who was passionate about advancing human rights during her time in Federal Parliament, where she was a proponent of Magnitsky-style legislation to sanction individuals who have committed serious human rights abuses.

Kimberley died in Melbourne of a suspected heart attack in March 2022, aged fifty-two.

Tony was selected from a field of several hundred nominations for his work advancing the rights of people living with a disability, particularly the blind in our society and the Labor Party. His list of achievements is impressive. Diagnosed with *retinitis pigmentosa* at age nineteen and declared legally blind at age twenty, he completed his Science degree with Honours. Approaching the Commonwealth Employment Service for help in obtaining a job he was told that '*people like you weave baskets*'.

His first job was working as a fund raiser for the Victorian Relief Committee and then Vision Australia. At Vision Australia, he fronted the consortium managing the Telstra share float to point out that blind people couldn't access any of their information and arranged very significant work for Vision Australia. His next target was the Victorian Electoral Commissioner to complain that he could not cast a secret ballot. Through a number of aids and techniques that Tony and the Commission developed, the simplest of which is a Perspex sleeve with Braille lettering and cut outs for the ballot squares, blind people can now cast secret ballots, not just in Victoria but Australia wide.

Tony stood for Parliament three times to further his belief that people with lived experience of disability are present at the decision-making tables of our country. Within the Labor Party, Tony was the founder of Labor Enabled, a

group of committed members who are seeking to establish, and have passed into party policy, a commitment to set targets and quotas to ensure that the Party's representation in parliaments mirrors that of society as a whole. Somewhere in all this Tony completed a Masters degree in Communication and has become a qualified Member of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

Well done and congratulations Tony, our big blind bloke with the black dog.

Seniors Christmas Lunch will be **8 December**, on a Friday, not a Sunday. Remember to put your name down on the list for catering purposes.



BABY MAGPIE SEASON DRIVERS PLEASE SLOW DOWN

Now that Spring is here, baby magpies will start leaving the nest to spend their first few days on the ground as they prepare for flight. There are many dangers out there for them, but parent birds will be nearby keeping a close watch on their fledglings, chasing off predators and collecting food until the babies get their wings and become airborne.

Magpies are territorial. Unfortunately, many pairs nest year after year in trees along roadsides. This poses a danger to the baby birds. The fledglings tend to gravitate towards the road edge where the parents gather food, and where the bitumen offers some warmth.

In the Kingston Avenue of Honour particularly, there are several resident family groups who nest each year in the elm trees. Tragically, each year, their young are often killed by passing traffic. Drivers, please slow down when you see magpies beside or on the road. While the adult birds are fairly road smart, be aware that it is natural for the baby magpies to freeze at the approach of a vehicle and be unable to fly to safety. It takes even longer for young birds to learn road sense from adult birds.

It's a hard gig for magpie parents to raise their young in the best of conditions. For those that nest along a roadside, it can be year after year of heartbreak. Please slow down and be aware of baby magpies. Thank you.

CresFest 2023 Finalist in


Australian Folk Music Awards

Excerpt From Park Lake Botanical Reserve, Creswick Notes on the history of Park Lake

Park Lake Botanic Reserve – a short history

As part of the development of Creswick as a permanent township, the Creswick Municipal Council, only established in late 1858, sought to establish a Botanic Reserve for the recreation of the townspeople. The first proposal for such a reserve was made by Cr Lees in January 1860 and by September 1860, a deputation from the Council sought to acquire the *Police Paddock* from the Surveyor General. Their application was successful and the area was reserved by the Governor in Council in October 1860 and proclaimed as a reserve in the Government Gazette in February 1861. In 1869, the Botanic Gardens Reserve was handed over to the Mayor, Councillors and Burgesses of the Borough of *Creswick* by a Crown Grant.

From 1861 onwards, various improvements were made to the reserve to make it into an important recreation area for the town. Tree clearing, tree planting, and the construction of an oval, fences, seating, a dancing saloon and other buildings were all undertaken in these early years.

In 1888, Cr W G Spence (of Australian Workers Union fame) put forward the idea of forming a *fish pond* and other improvements in the reserve and these were done. In the same year, George Perrin, the first Conservator of Forests for the State visited the Ballarat-Creswick Forest and the plantation development being undertaken by John La Gerche, local Forester and Crown Land Bailiff (1882 – 1897). During the visit, Perrin was enthused by what he saw and encouraged La Gerche and the local Council to develop a *serpentine drive* from the head of Sawpit Gully to the Castlemaine road where it abutted the Botanic Reserve. As an initial step, Perrin undertook to provide a detailed planting plan for the Botanic Reserve. The trees along the main avenue inside the reserve were planted on Arbor Day, 1890 as a public event. However, La Gerche did not develop the connecting *serpentine drive* from Sawpit Gully to the Botanic Reserve.



Freemasons Give to Hospital Appeal Fundraising Total Rising

Taking advantage of a four to one offer of support from Freemasons Victoria's Charitable Foundation, the members of Creswick Havilah Masonic Lodge contributed \$12,500 to Creswick Health's \$150,000 Upgrade Appeal. This donation aims to fund the purchase of a fully equipped specialised king size single bed and a wanderer alert warning system for Creswick Health's hospital and its aged care facility.

The bed provides its user with an enhanced level of comfort and security, and the benefit of its pressure relieving mattress which assists in preventing the development of pressure sores and skin issues. The wanderer alert warning system will provide an important support to staff in ensuring the safety and wellbeing of confused and disoriented wandering residents or patients, as it will alert staff when someone is attempting to leave the facility unsupervised.

The Upgrade Appeal has now passed \$100,000. With a steady flow of donations coming from Creswick and district residents and a number of fund raising events being held in support of the appeal, it is hoped that it will soon reach its \$150,000 target. Little Voices, Loud Futures

Whilst we participate in a lot of very special events at Creswick Primary School, last month the school was fortunate to host a Multi Age Grouping Day to participate in the National and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day, held on 4 August every year. The theme this year was *Little Voices, Loud Futures*, aiming to raise awareness and support friends, family and classmates to be proud and empowered by their culture.

The day was organised by our Koorie champion, staff member Katelyn Sutton. Two representatives from the Ballarat and District Aboriginal Cooperative (BADAC) assisted in planning and conducting two of the activities. Nikki Bell, the Youth Engagement worker, and Aaron Clarke, the Youth Team Leader, worked with the students throughout the day, sharing their knowledge of culture, story-telling and dance.

Students rotated around four main activities in House groupings. The children enjoyed cooking wattleseed, banana and golden syrup muffins, wattleseed ANZAC biscuits and lemon myrtle biscuits, which were subsequently enjoyed by the chefs. In the Art Room, students used Aboriginal symbols and story-telling to create totem poles in House colours and painted river rocks. In another activity, the children made bush toys from hay, wool and fabric. The creativity in these toys, along with the stories associated with them,

demonstrated a strong connection with culture. The fourth rotation involved Aaron from BADAC showing the students a variety of artefacts, explaining their use, how they were made and the cultural expectations surrounding them. This session concluded with a dance, which the children were given permission to share within their classrooms and at home.

The students learnt a lot of important cultural knowledge throughout the day, which they will follow up in classroom lessons, as well as having a lot of fun in exploring new opportunities and experiences.


100 Days of Prep

September 4, 1923

A public meeting of the residents of the Smeaton District will be held in the Mechanics' Hall, Smeaton, on Saturday evening next, 8th September, to make arrangements, re fencing the old showyards' site at Smeaton. A. Redman, Hon. Sec.

September 7, 1923

Kingston Fire Brigade, A Euchre party will be held in the Mechanics' Hall on Tuesday, 11th inst., in aid of the Creswick District Hospital. Ladies and Gent's prizes. Admission 1/-. C.H. Barker, Captain; A. W. Rickard, Secretary.

September 11, 1923

Newyln – Show stock – Newlyn should be well represented at the Royal Show this year by stock from the well known stud farms of the district. Horses, cattle and sheep are in course of preparation for that important event.

September 14, 1923

To celebrate the winning of the district premiership, the Creswick Football Club will hold a ball in the town hall next Tuesday night. Complete arrangements are being made, so that patrons can depend on an enjoyable time. Campbell's Jazz Orchestra from Ballarat will supply the music and supper will be provided.

September 18, 1923

The second annual reunion of the Old Creswickians will be held in the Melbourne town hall supper room on Thursday 27th September (Show week), at 8 p.m. Country residents down for the show are warmly invited to attend the reunion. Tickets 3/6 each, may be obtained at the supper room door, or from the hon. Secretary, Mr. E. P. Boyce.

September 21, 1923

To the Ladies of Creswick and District

I wish to inform you it is not true that Sister Hay has bought my Private Hospital, and that I am still prepared to take patients as usual. J. Surridge, Church Hill, Creswick.

September 25, 1923

Mounted Constable J. C. Montgomery has been taking action to rid the streets of the borough of wandering stock. He made a raid on Saturday and Monday, with the result that several head of horses and cows were impounded. Owners would do well to keep their stock off the streets.

September 28, 1923

Campbelltown- At a meeting held at Campbelltown, which was presided over by Mr. I. Lees, it was unanimously decided to erect a public hall. Collectors were appointed and a good sum was promised from those who attended the meeting. Newstead was canvassed on Monday and a liberal response to the appeal has been made.

Jean Elizabeth Slade 30/7/1931 – 6/7/2023

Jean Elizabeth was born on 30 July, 1931 to Tommy and Mable Dunne. She was the third child with older siblings Joyce and Max, followed a few years later by Dorothy. Sadly, all Jean's siblings have passed away.

The family lived in Ballarat where Jean attended Urqhuart Street Primary School for a short time before the heartbreaking death of her young mother. This event saw her and her sister Joyce sent to live with extended family in Camperdown. Jean returned to Ballarat aged fourteen and commenced work at Oliver's Boots. She really enjoyed the work and eventually became a floor supervisor. The team of women she worked with provided much fun and laughter. Jean was respected and held in high regard by her peers.

During her early twenties Jean met Ronald Slade, they became friends and eventually married at the Barkly Street Church on 23 June, 1954. Jean and Ron then lived on the family farm at Broomfield. When Ron's father died, to help his mother, he took over the running of the farm. Jean continued to work at Oliver's whilst at the same time caring for her ageing dad. This was Jean, a woman who opened her heart to all those who crossed her path. Her door was always open if anyone needed her help or guidance. She provided endless love, fun and laughter to those privileged to be a part of her world.

Though she and Ron never had their own children, she filled her life with friends, extended family and developed a close bond with her nieces and nephews. Jean loved to travel, visiting many places around Australia and one New Zealand trip with her friend Winnie.

When Jean was seventy-nine, Ron sadly died. Despite this heartache she continued to support others in need. She joined the Creswick pole walking group, was well read and enjoyed watching TV soaps! She also loved watching Geelong play football.

For the past three years Jean lived in the Aged Care Nursing section of Creswick Hospital where she was extremely happy, fond of the staff and looked forward to her regular visitors. These included her cousin Lynn and other family members.

She will be sadly missed but fondly remembered.
